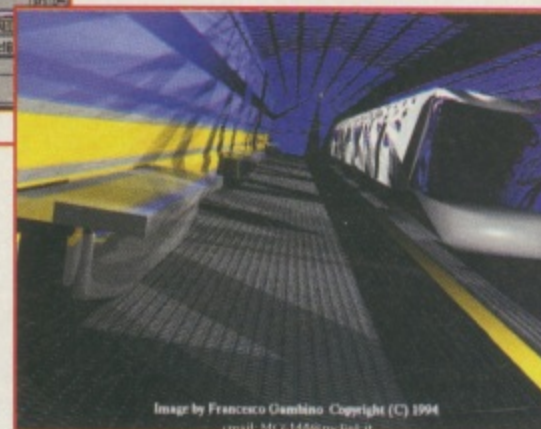
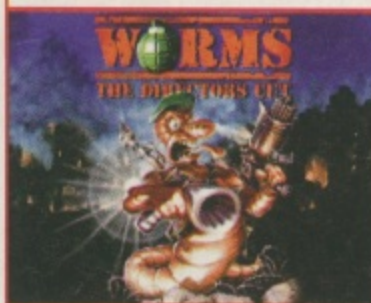

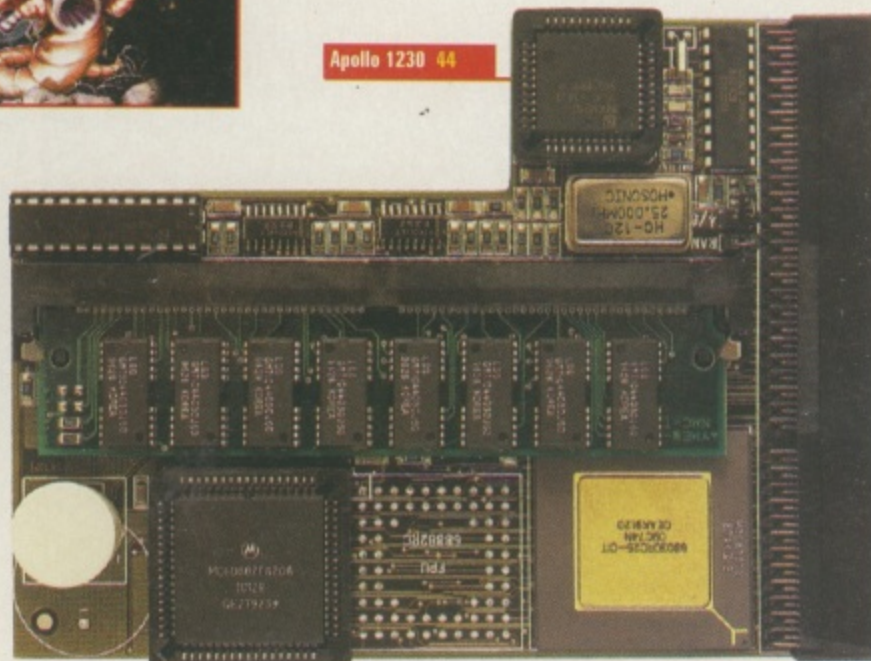

Wordworth Test Drive is a fully working version of the classic word processor and it's on disk 146 (there's an even better version the CD edition with loads of clip art and fonts too). We've also got some excellent IDE CD-ROM software too.

11 **Worms - The Director's Cut**
Now this is just brilliant. You know how good the original Worms is? Well this is much better. And it's got sheep-on-a-rope. And it's got fab AGA graphics. And there's loads of hidden extra weapons. And it's on this month's game cover disk! And now you should go and play it!

DISK 146

Wordworth Test Drive

It's got to be one of the most common things anyone would do on the Amiga. Word processing ranges from the simple act of writing letters all the way to producing full sized posters laden with colourful clip art. Either way, you need a word processing package to do it and that's just what we've included with this month's main covermount application program.

Digita's Wordworth has long been known as one of the Amiga's best word processor packages. On cover disk 146, you'll find Wordworth Test Drive. This is a special unrestricted version of Wordworth which we've managed to squeeze onto a single floppy disk.

The CD obviously has no such space considerations and so the full version of Wordworth 3.1 SE can be found there with extra Intellifonts and clipart. If decide to upgrade to CD-ROM, we have also included the ATAPI_PnP package on cover disk 146 to go with this month's 'CD on the Cheap' feature.



Floppy users get a nifty version of Wordworth that boots and works from a single disk, while CD users get the full Wordworth 3.1 release.

Here's a quick tutorial to get you used to the basic functions of Wordworth. There's a button bank down the left hand side of the Wordworth screen. The large icons perform basic operations so they can be reached quickly. The top page icon launches a new project so a new Wordworth window will appear with the same functions as the original Wordworth which enables multiple projects to be loaded at once. The next icon, a folder with an arrow point out, opens a new document. A file requester will appear asking for a document name.

Printing

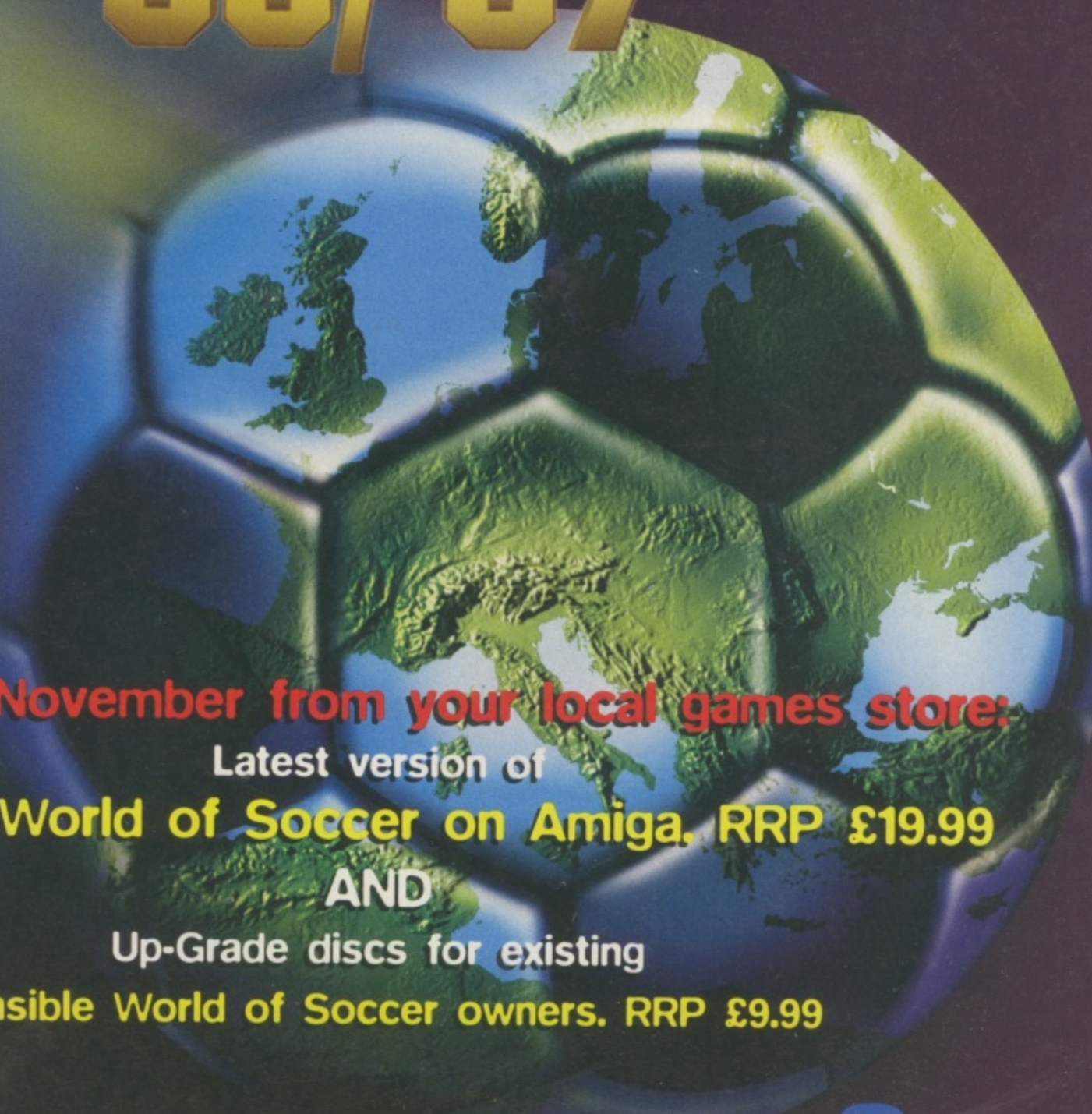
Next a print function and a GUI will appear which wants to know the page range of a print and

whether this is a draft or a letter quality output etc. Note, there's no printer drivers on the Wordworth Test Drive floppy disk so you will need to copy the one you from your Workbench: Devs/Printers/ into the Devs/Printers drawer on Wordworth. To select the printer drive, when inside the printer GUI, press the setup button and select your newly installed printer driver.

The scissors icon cuts any marked text out of the document. The two pages icon copies the marked text to the clipboard where the next icon pastes it back into the document. The second last icon is the all-important Font selector. Once activated fonts may be selected as well as the style and size.

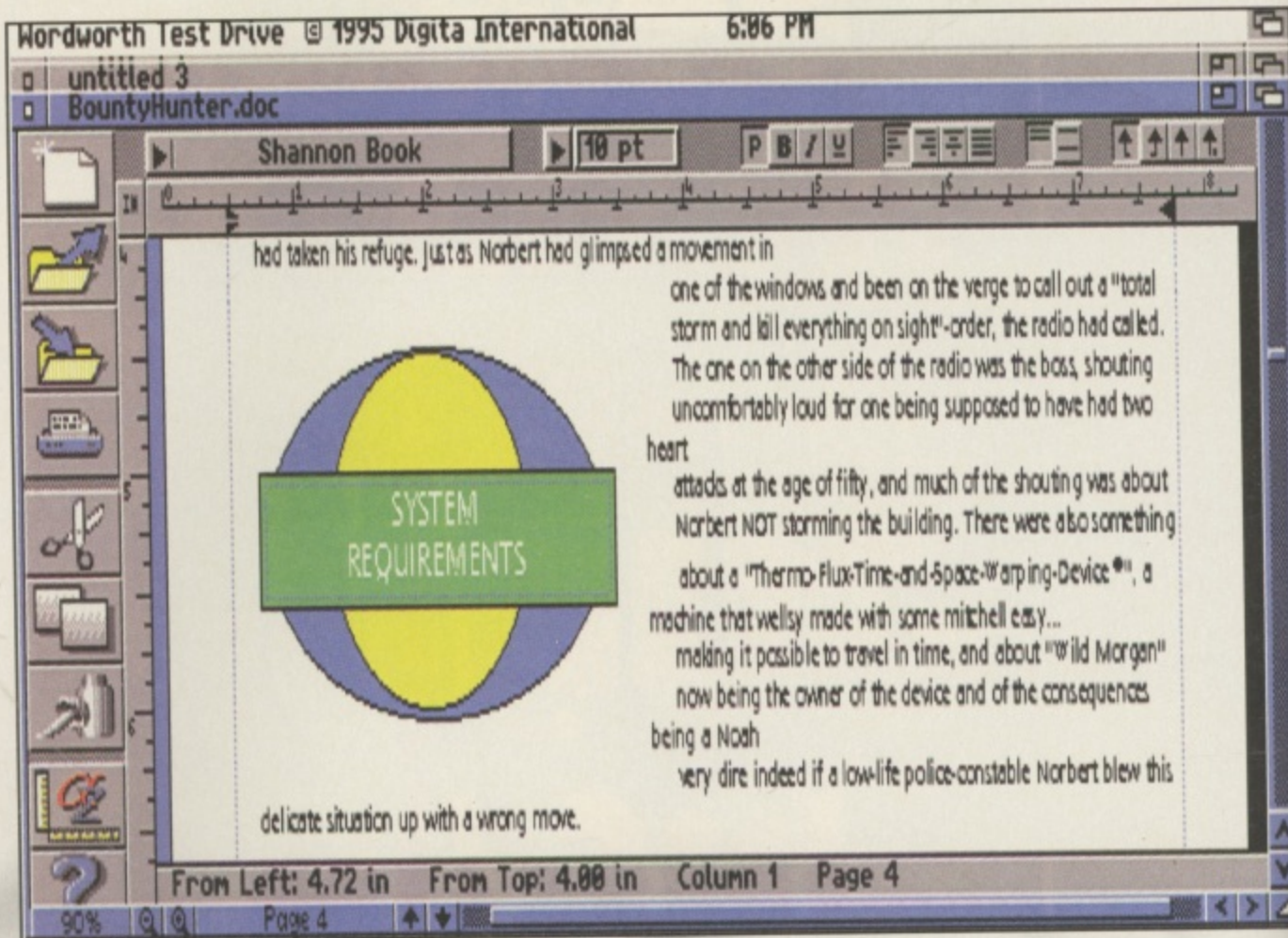

The last icon activates Wordworth's on-line help function and starts on the contents. Help can also be accessed from the Help menu. Here you'll find in-depth help on all of the functions of Wordworth via the AmigaGuide system.

Projects

Creating a project is simple. Select 'New' from the Project menu and a new document will be created. Next go to the Object menu and select 'Create object'. Slide the requester down and select 'Text Frame' and press OK. Drag out a rectangle on the Wordworth screen so that it's longer horizontally, click out of the frame and then double click inside the frame. The 'Text Frame Information' window will appear allowing you to change the various properties of this object. Make fill colour red, border style double line and thickness 2pt.

Next, change the text flow to left. Close the window and click once on the box. Click the Font icon on the button bar on the left and make the text white and a size that will show but not too big. Type what you want and then click on the justify centre button on the top bar of Wordworth. It's the icon second from the right on the group of 4 buttons with little lines on them. You'll see you have the right button when the text you just typed jumps into the centre of the box.



▲ Wordworth is much more than just a word processor, it's also capable of many features often found in DTP packages.

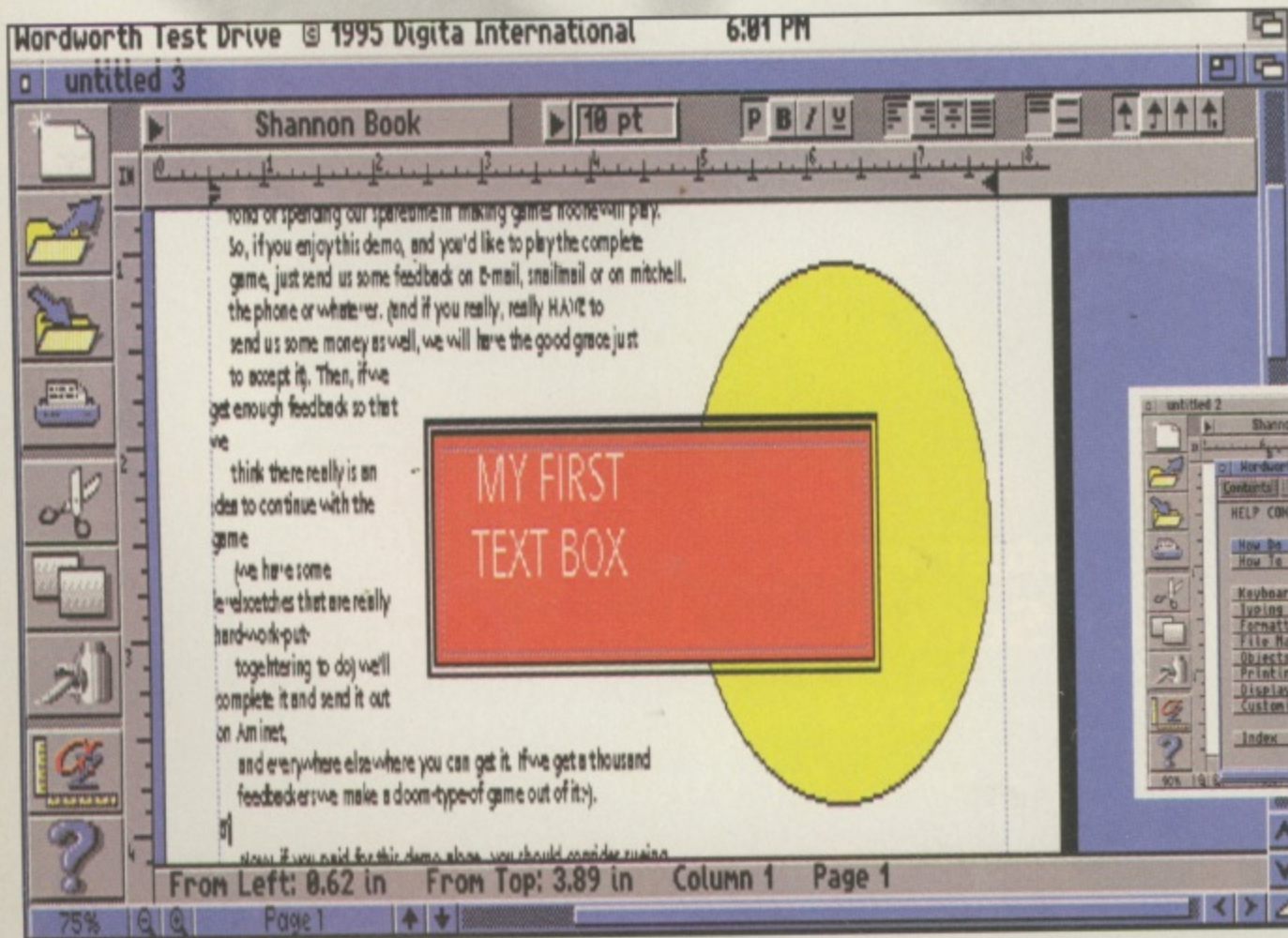
Open the 'Create object' window again but this time select 'Circle'. Drag out a circle that is as long vertically as the text box is wide. Resize it using the points in the circle, until you get it right. Then double click on it for the 'Circle Information' and change the flow to contour left. Go to the object menu and select send to

back while the circle is selected. Move both the objects to the right hand side of the page. You should be able to type around the newly formed objects. In this way it's possible to create graphically impressive documents quickly and easily.

You're on your way to Wordworth perfection!

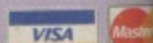

Loading instructions



Disk number 146 Wordworth 3.1 SE

Write protect your Wordworth disk before doing anything else to avoid overwriting the original cover disk. Extracting Wordworth is simple, you first boot your own Workbench and then click on the 'Unpack WordWorth' icon. A DMS file will be copied to RAM and then written out to a blank floppy (this disk does not need to be formatted before-

hand). You'll be prompted to insert a floppy disk and the self-booting Wordworth Test Drive floppy disk will be written to the blank disk. This disk must be left in the floppy drive and booted which will shortly load Workbench with Wordworth appearing a little while later without you having to do anything extra. You are now all set up for Wordworth. See page six for operation instructions and also take a look at the on-line help which should guide you through most areas of the program.

IDE CD-ROM Software

To complement our DIY CD-ROM feature, we've included ATAPI Plug n Play. This is fully working IDE CD-ROM driver software. To install it just click on its icon and follow the instructions. For more details on how to use it, see page 62.

Disk number 147: Worms - The Director's Cut



Before you do anything at all, write protect your original Worms cover disk, so that you can see through the hole in the corner. This stops you accidentally overwriting the disk during the unpacking process. Unpacking Worms - The Director's Cut is a simple affair. First load Workbench or boot from your hard drive. Now insert the Worms cover disk. Double click the disk icon and you'll see another icon which deals with all the unpacking. Double click this and after a short pause

you will be asked to insert the first of your blank disks. Both of these blanks must be write enabled but there's no need to format them. Follow the on-screen instructions and change to the second disk when you're asked to do so. When the unpacking process is complete you can play Worms - The Director's Cut from your newly expanded game disks. Boot the first disk by inserting it into the internal floppy drive and resetting your Amiga. For those who have never played Worms before, the idea is simply to wipe out your opposing Worm armies before they do the same to you, using all kinds of weapons and tricks. See the review of the full game on page 28 for the full lowdown on the new tricks and weapons available in this version.



IF YOUR DISK/CD WON'T LOAD

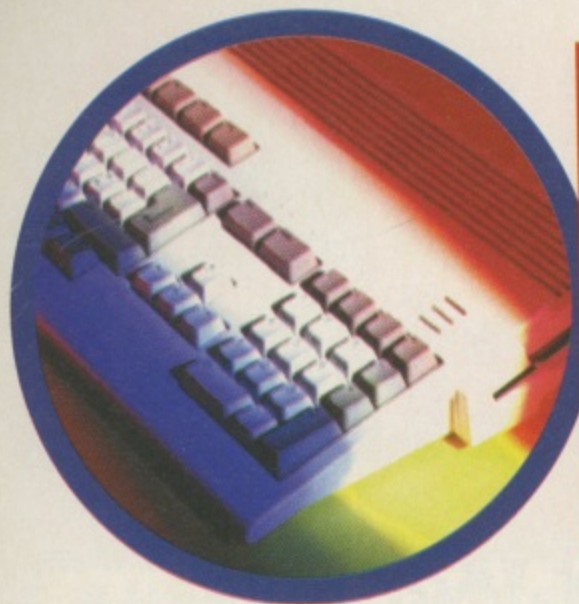

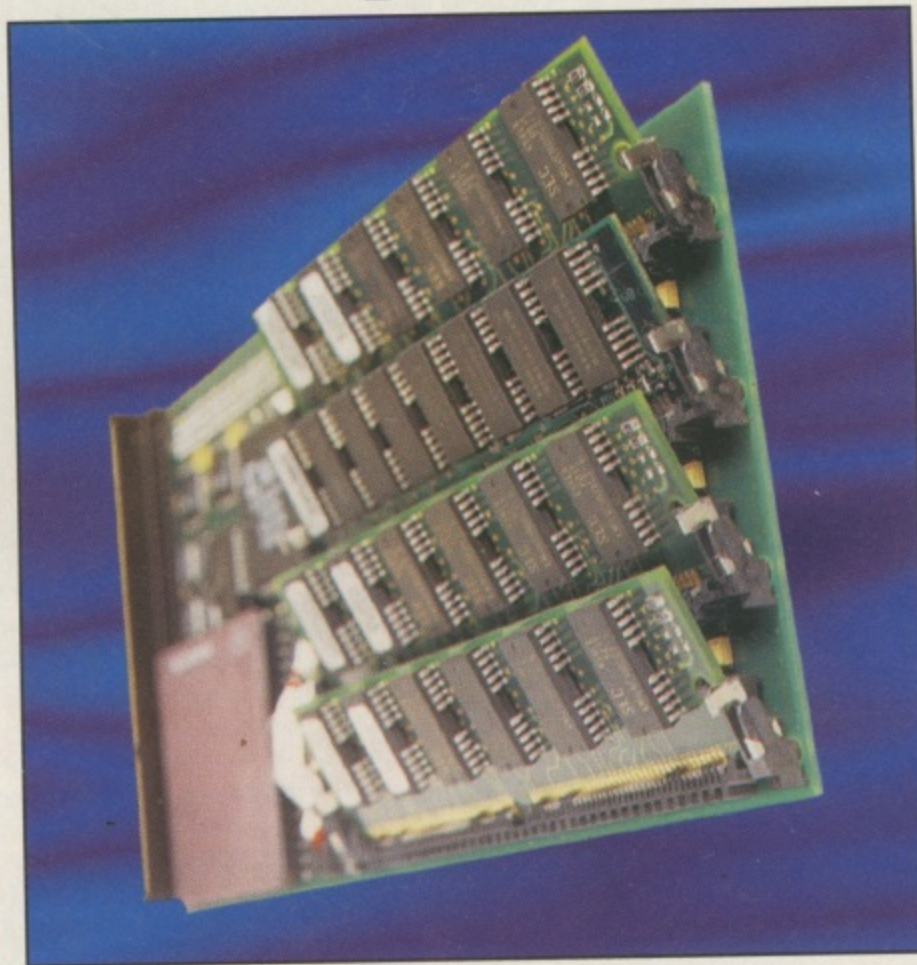

Blittersoft Drops Prices

Blittersoft have announced a number of price reductions on their Eagle Tower Amigas and Phase 5 accelerators. The A1200-based towers, made under licence from Amiga Technologies, range from the Eagle 1200TE at £599 to the 1200TE-60/50 at £999. The A4000-based models vary from the 4000TE priced at £1299 to the 4000TE-60/50 at £1749. Watch out for an in-depth look at the entire Eagle Tower range coming up very soon in CU Amiga Magazine.

A whopping £120 has been sliced off the price of the CyberStorm Mk II 50Mhz 060 accelerator, which has dropped from £649.95 to £529.95. World's Fastest Modem

Smashing the previous modem speed limits, US Robotics' new 'x2' technology allows transfer rates of 56Kbps over standard phone lines. While other developers have been working towards similar goals, US Robotics are the first to announce such a system that is up and running, with the all-important support from leading Internet service providers. Previous limits of 28.8 or 3.6 Kbps will soon be a thing of the past as the x2 technology will be made available as a software upgrade for Courier modems while Sportster modems will be able to upgrade via a replacement chip. Needless to say the x2 technology will be included as standard in future USR modems.

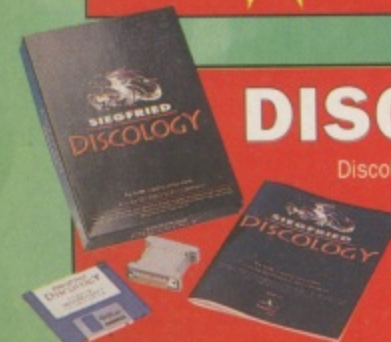

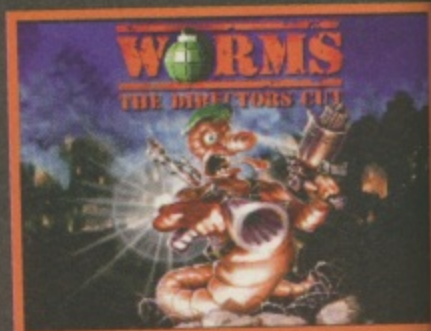

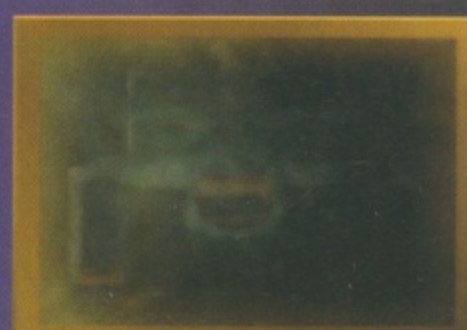

The best of both worlds

Lack of retail support is forcing many software companies away from the Amiga to the PC. However, there is a way around having to make that difficult decision as we found out.

Let's face facts. Less and less quality software is coming out for the Amiga. This isn't because there isn't a market for it. God knows there are hoards of Amiga owners out there desperate for good quality software. However, high street retail shops aren't as convinced. Trying to find any of the current releases in any shop is now becoming almost impossible. PC software, however, although not any better or popular is now replacing Amiga products in the shops. In Europe and Germany in particular, however, Amiga products are storming off the shelves and software companies are inundated with requests for software.

So what is to be done to achieve the same healthy sales in the UK market? We look at one company who seems to have come up with a novel solution.

"We feel that there is no more demand for floppies any more."

Effigy Software, the company behind Pinball Prelude and XP8 are diehard fans of the Amiga and if they had their way would only produce Amiga games. However, financial constraints and lack of retail support is forcing them to concentrate their game development on the PC. However, the team behind game development; Ian Jenkins, Philip Sharpe, Valan Chan and Graham Gray are loathe to do this. So they have come up with a good idea to keep the Amiga software side alive: producing games on a dual format CD. Impressed by this initiative CU Amiga Magazine went to see the MD Ian Jenkins in his rustic hideaway in Lincolnshire to find out more.

What does this unique Dual format mean for the Amiga on the whole?

This basically means the same CD runs on PC CD-ROM, Amiga CD-ROM, CD32

and there are even floppies in the same box for PC owners without a CD drive. We will use that to gauge the market by releasing the PC version first, as we feel that there is no more demand for floppies anymore. Even if we only do a PC CD-ROM version, at first, we can then wait and see how the market is and how the public responds and in addition this gives the Amiga industry a chance to pick up."

What prompted you to make this decision?

Pinball Prelude was a good game and scored great results across the

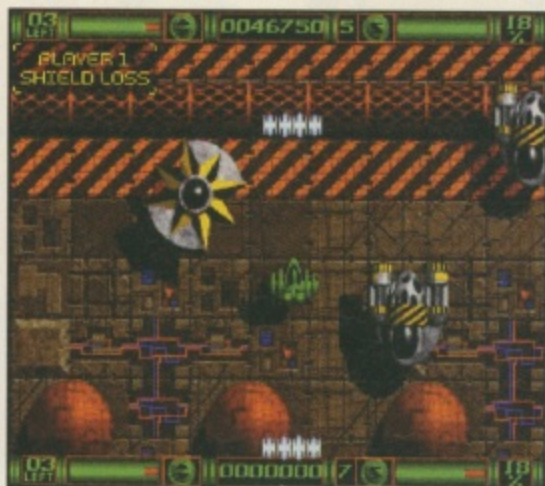
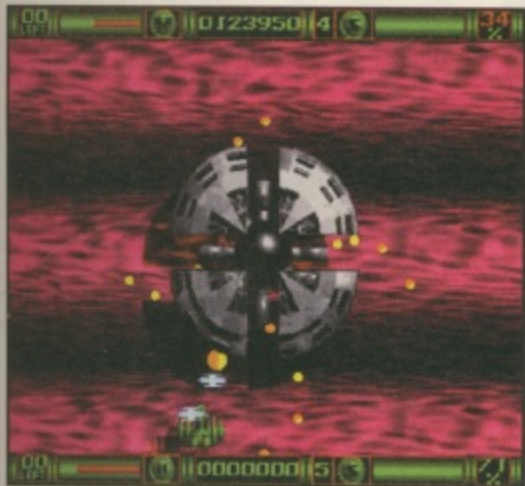


▲ Pinball Prelude, which was very successful on floppy is the first game to be brought out on the new dual format CDs.

Amiga magazines but I recorded that there were more sales on the A500/ A600 sales than the AGA version which was far better. I suspect that that this is due to heavy piracy and that most AGA owners were on the Internet with their big hard drives and modems downloading all the stuff that came free from people abusing the system. The hard facts are that if you don't sell X amount of games or unless you don't buy it, it won't make any money or royalties, it that's simple."

What are you currently working on for this format?

"We've already released Pinball Prelude on this format (see review this issue) and we're working on a game called Ffigy that has been development since last October but really we started it ages ago, so I guess it's been in 15 months of development."

Tell us more about Ffigy?

"Ffigy is our own in-house development

"We believe that demos people create and put into PD are useless."

So you want to sort of invent a new genre of game altogether like Bullfrog did with their Populous and Powermonger 'God' games?

"We feel you won't be able to typecast Ffigy. It's a highly unusual game. It's a control game. We want game players to pay a very deep game and at the same time have a lot of fun indeed"

How do plan to market Ffigy?

"We'll be using five or six techniques for our games like radio, TV, newspapers, even merchandise, to get the Ffigy character up and running."

What other games do you have on the cards?

"Necromantics is our next planned November release."

-Tell us what Necromantics is all about then?

"Well, it's basically a pseudo 3D scrolling puzzle game with a difference. There are killer ants puzzling ponderations much brain teasing spondiferal dexterity required in hard mode (softies only play the easy levels)."

Have you got anything else lined up at the moment?

"Weathermine Software's Anthony Denton and Mathew Waters are currently working on the non-AGA version of XP8 which has the same five levels of the AGA version but with reduced, cut down in graphics and less sound effects but it's still very playable."

Given then that the software side is difficult and you've

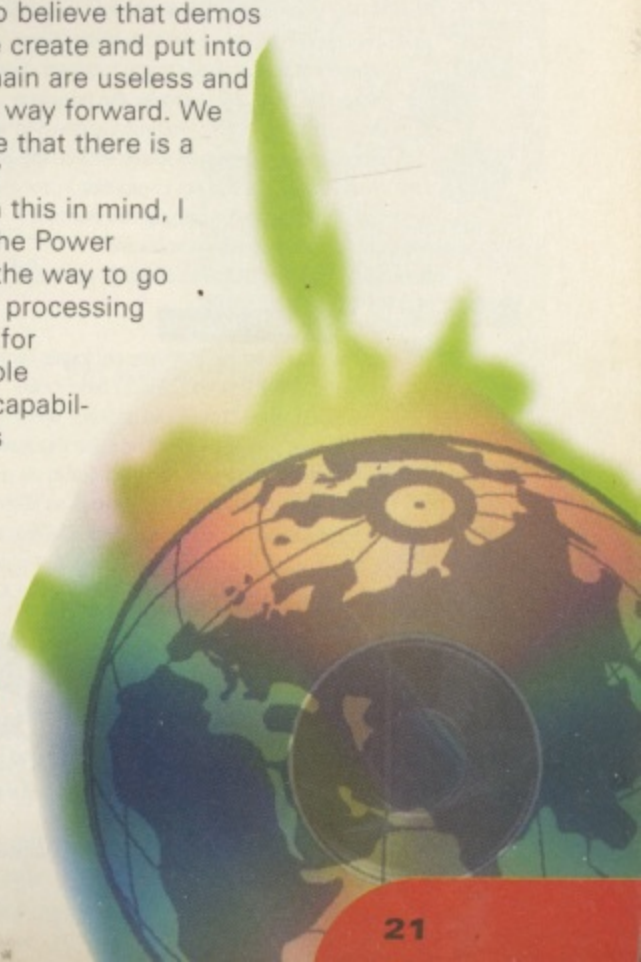
come up with the idea of dual format to combat this what else do you think is the key to the Amiga's survival?

"What we need obviously is not just a new machine but a continuation of the Amiga's history.

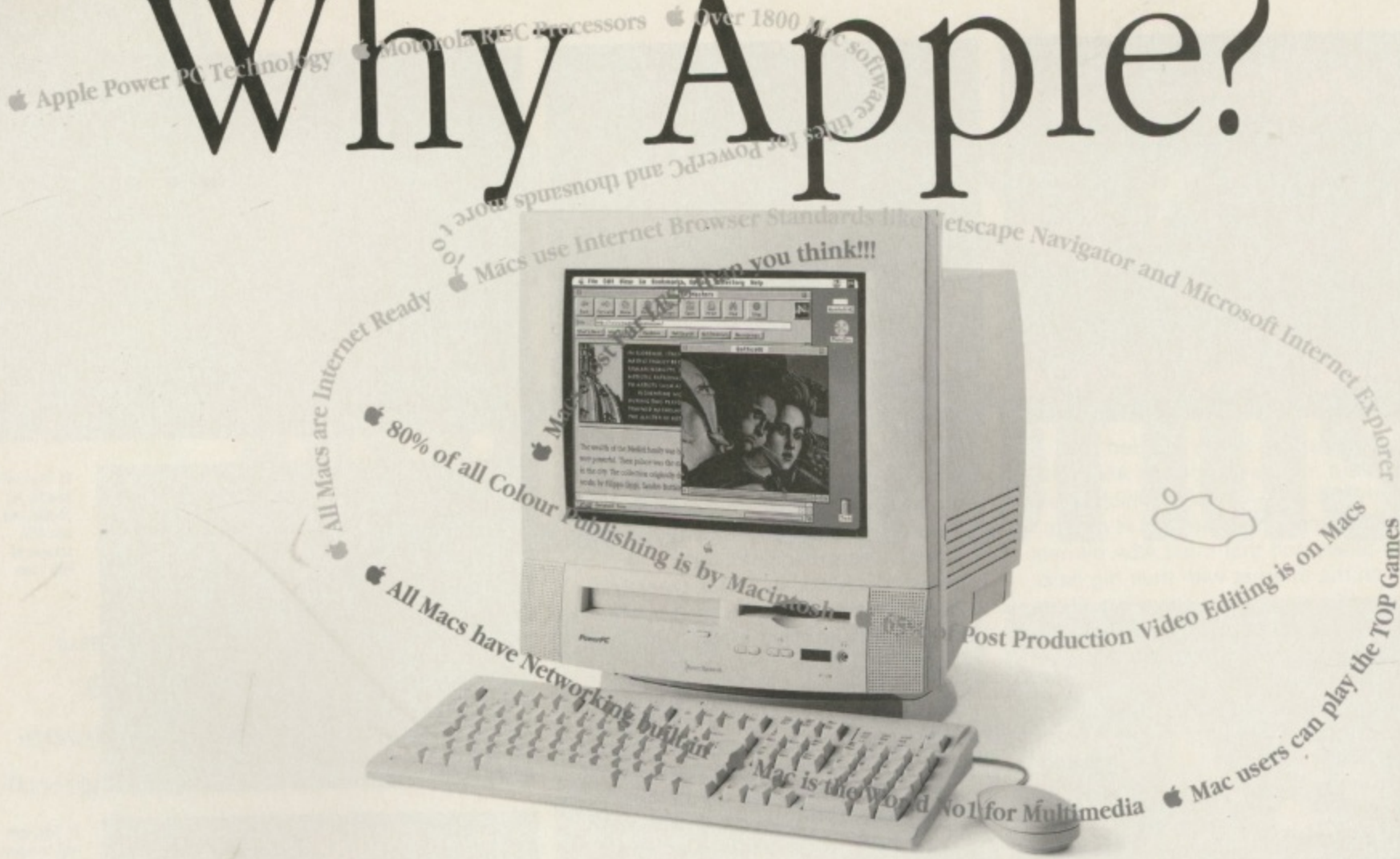
"We also believe that demos that people create and put into Public Domain are useless and are not the way forward. We need to see that there is a profit in it!"

"So with this in mind, I think that the Power PC chip is the way to go for not just processing power, but for its accessible emulation capabilities and its ability to nestle nicely into the highly successful multimedia market of the PC."

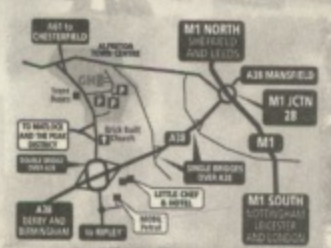

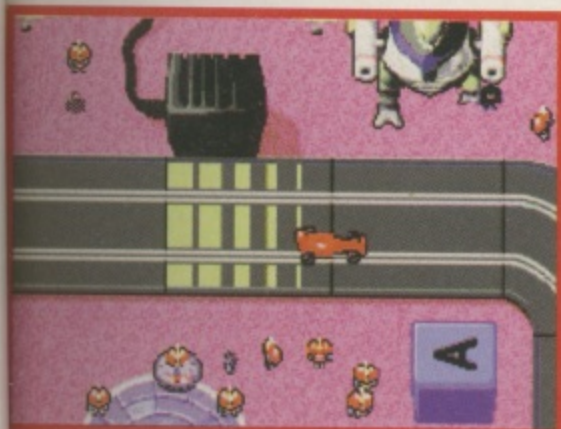

Guildhall Leisure are back with us again. After a period of absence, one of the main saviours of the Amiga games scene are preparing to launch another Amiga game. This time it's an adventure game.

If you liked the Monkey Island games, you'll love Teen Agent. Although it may share the same name as the movie starring 21 Jump Street's Richard Grieco, the similarities end there. Teen Agent is more like a Naked Gun game, without the license and is a point 'n' click comic comedy/adventure in the style of James Bond. It's really a spy spoof, with lots of gags, in the style of the 007 movies where you get to rescue lots of sexy damsels (007 had all the best jobs) and speak to strange men dressed in black.

Alex Amsel, the man who brought us the wonderfully

playable Extreme Racing is behind the game and he revealed to CU Amiga Magazine that there will be not one but three versions of the game; an AGA (with 256 colours) floppy, ECS (almost 256 colours, but more like pseudo AGA) floppy, and a dual format CD version that will carry both the PC/Amiga version.

The AGA and ECS disk versions will be on five to six disks but can be installed on the hard drive. While the CD version will be essentially the same as the AGA version, Alex said that it should have full speech and long interludes of spy style music.

Although, strangely enough the CD version will not work with the CD32 due to problems of

trying to get the CD32 to function properly. Hopefully, the programmers may find a way around this and we could see a version on the CD32.

Teen Agent certainly sounds

like fun and there are a lot of worse ways to spend your time. But can it be as successful as previous classic adventures on the Amiga? Let's hope so.

Well, we will be able to see whether it's going to be a corker or not soon and you'll be able to judge for yourselves when CU Amiga Magazine will investigate the game in full in the next month or so. Until then keep your spy glass well polished and your dark glasses in a safe place. ■

we may even see it in its finished form before Christmas.

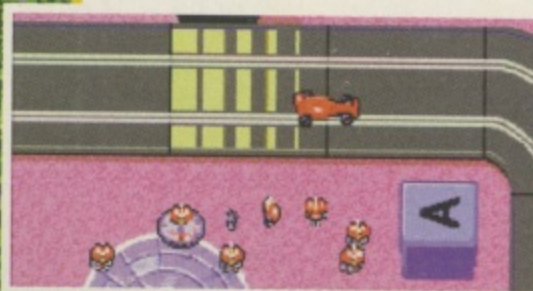

screenshots for proof) than Timekeepers, the sprites are much bigger and the backgrounds are a lot more varied.

The plot is simple enough, you decide at the start of each mission how many men you're going to need for each battle. (A nice friendly colonel throws a few handy hints at you beforehand as to the best tactics). Then it's up to you to decide your strategy from then on.

So good, so far. The demo version we received looked fine but I had some difficulty with the controls. So, I'll have to reserve my final judgement until the finished version comes in. We should have a full review for you next month. ■

Yeah! Like Worms is so 'broke' it really needs fixing, eh? Still, there's always room for improvement...

So what was wrong with the original Worms that needs fixing? Well, let's be honest, nothing. It was, still is, and probably always will be one of the most playable games ever. I've always wondered how Sting must feel when he writes a 'classic'. You know, songs like Every Breath You Take, or Message in a Bottle. I mean, what's it feel like to create something that will forever be referred to? Andy Davidson must know that now, because as sure as we

forever refer back to Pacman, Galaga and Donkey Kong in our sad, retro-way, you can be sure that ten years from now (when my goatee is long and grey) we'll be quaffing space beer in a virtual reality pub recalling the 'good old days and Worms' (and won't it be funny when the retro-nostalgia compilation releases include titles like Worms and Gloom!)

OK, I'll abandon my pointless musings for now, and instead ask you to do something for me. Now be honest ... as much as you love



Worms, can you say that you've never sat playing a game and said, "wouldn't it be AMAZING if you could drop weapons on people's heads while swinging over them!" or "I wish I had a bloody intelligent homing missile that could follow you down your bloody Dark Side tunnels!" Yes, I think we've all had our own little ideas during play, and so has Worm's author, Mr Davidson,

because this release is really nothing more than a chance for him to put right some wrongs from the original, while also allowing him to add some new, more-bonkers weapons to the proceedings.

As far as the 'righting the wrongs' goes, it's nothing more than a few cosmetic corrections and some bug killing. Now when you tunnel or dig, you no longer leave nasty-looking gaps that give the impression that the cave really ought to, er... cave in. Oh no, now the landscape has two layers: so dig away, safe in the knowledge that all you'll do uncover the 'inner background'. A silly little addition, I know, but one that does a lot for the presentation.

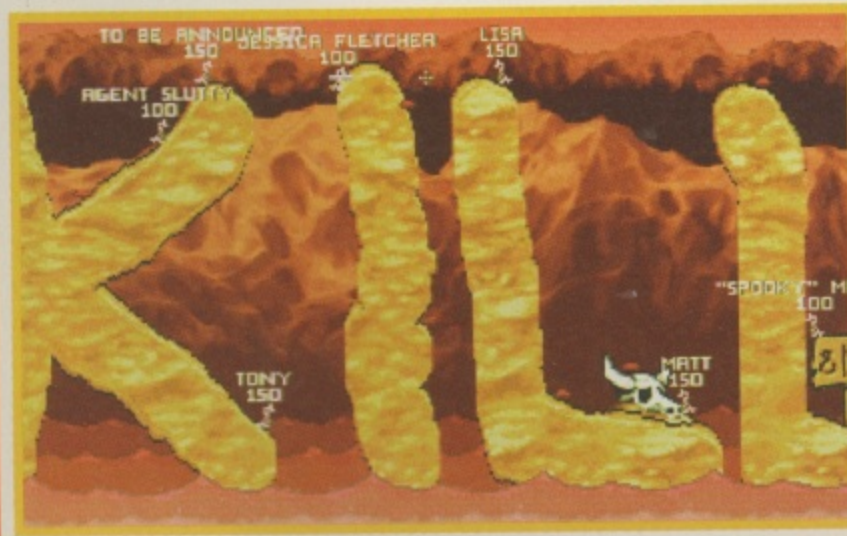
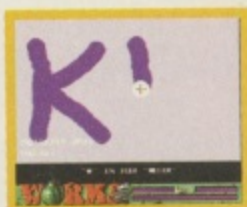
Other odds and sods have been included, again doing nothing more than making the game look nicer. Use the blow torch and a spray of dust will fill out the passageway behind you, call in an airstrike and the explosions will gout fire as well as devastate the landscape. That sort of thing.

SHEEP ON A ROPE

See an enemy across the screen but don't want to move from your position? Simple, just use new Sheep-O-Rope™ from Ronco! You control the sheep as if it were yourself, and then, once in position, detonate!

MINE VASE

This valuable ornament should be used like a Mine or Dynamite (ie drop it and then run!) only with the added bonus of having exploding shards as well as an initial explosion.

POSTAL STRIKES

Similar to airstrikes (only more humorous) this will send a drifting wad of letters on their way, spreading out as explosions blow them across the landscape.

MAD COWS

God speed my lovely heifers! Yes, mad they are, and more than happy to trundle off towards any beef-lover on the level. And guess what? They then explode. Great!

HOLY HAND GRENADE

A devastating new weapon with the power of our lord Jesus behind it (yeah, sure). This works exactly as a standard grenade, only with a set three second fuse and a low bounce. best of all is the sampled "Hallelujah!" that accompanies the explosion - along with the 100 points of damage that it inflicts. Powerful, non?

makes everything pretty for you. Create a corker of a level and you can even save your baby to disk for use another day. Should you find the graffiti drawing too crude, you can import your own customised landscapes using a paint package such as DPaint.

Following the well-explained guide supplied with the game (ie sizes and colour translations). And while we're on the subject of using levels over and over, you can now chose to play an entire match on the same landscape without repairing damage done in previous rounds. Needless to say, with four teams playing, by the last few round there are very few trees, bridges, and well ... any landscape at all left really!

You can also set the worms to take unused weapons from round to round with them. This means that the strategy goes that one step forward, with players hoarding weapons for those all important last few rounds.

Total control

Young Mr Davidson has gone to town as far as player control goes, allowing the user to alter just about every aspect of the game. As well as turning weapons on and off - as you could before - you can also chose to disable certain weapons until a set point in the game. If you always hated how much damage an early airstrike did to unorganised troops, simply disable it until, say, turn #3.

You can also alter the odds on which landscape will appear, upping the ratio of your favourites against your least favourites - or simply banning the ones you hate! Alter the sensitivity of mines; the damage each weapon inflicts, and even how many times you can fire off your new improved rope to Tarzan across the ceiling (ah, but I haven't mentioned that yet; have I!)

Oh yes, it's all change on the rope front. Apart from having a greater reach, a particularly splendid addition to this tool is that you can act out all your Spiderman fantasies. By pressing the space bar while swinging you send out another rope and 'Tarzan' across the terrain. Though you might not think this all that great, that's before I tell you about the new cavern levels. Yes, that's right, one out of every four levels (unless you change

the default) is a cave level that has a complete roof. This means that, not only do you have to be more careful with arcing weapons, but the rope takes over as the most important thing ever! Oh, and did I mention that you can now drop a stick of dynamite while swinging over somebody? Yes, I think you're beginning to get the idea now!

So much more

Well to be honest there's chockloads more, but there's more fun to be had finding all of the new touches by playing the game than just reading some fool go on and on about it, but I think you can see that, while this is an exercise in improving an already great product, it's also a chance to let your hair down and just have a good laugh. Come up against some dead-serious player who's perfected his bazooka shooting and you can simply



send an old woman his way (I kid you not) or perhaps order a herd of mad cows to attack. And the best thing about all these crazy weapons is that they're not just dumped in your lap, you have to search for them and, after each match, you'll be given a code that allows you to keep what you've found when you come to play next time - searching for the new toys as you go. Now it's not just brilliant fun, it's progressive brilliant fun. This is truly classic stuff. ■

The game's plot is simple enough. Skippy's Dutch cousin has to find or collect as many baby kangeroos as possible as he hops through through the landscapes to the exit.



Lots of nasties such as cockerels, dragons, wasps and even flying umbrellas, are out to stop him though. Luckily, our hero Klont, being your all-dancing, all-kicking, highly manoeuvrable kangaroo, has loads of specialised clever moves. By wagging the joystick you can get him to deliver a few specialised kicks and punches. And you've got a handy arsenal of weapons such as



guns, eggs and bombs at your disposal. The gameplay is promising but never gets above that of a sub-standard and dated platformer.

Graphically Kang Fu is a complete mess, as you can see from these screenshots. The green, purple and brown colour scheme is like a visual equivalent of smelling salts. If that wasn't enough to give you a raging headache then the jerky sprites and scrolling are sure to finish the job. Despite all of this I still managed to glean some fun from this rather sad little game. Maybe it's just the universal appeal of a platform game that won me over, or maybe it's my

love of marsupials that is to blame.

If you're not so fascinated by kangaroos and would rather retain the sight in both your eyes, this is probably not for you. However, interested parties should contact the address above as at the moment it has no official UK supplier. By the way, it's not CD32 compatible, which is a shame. ■

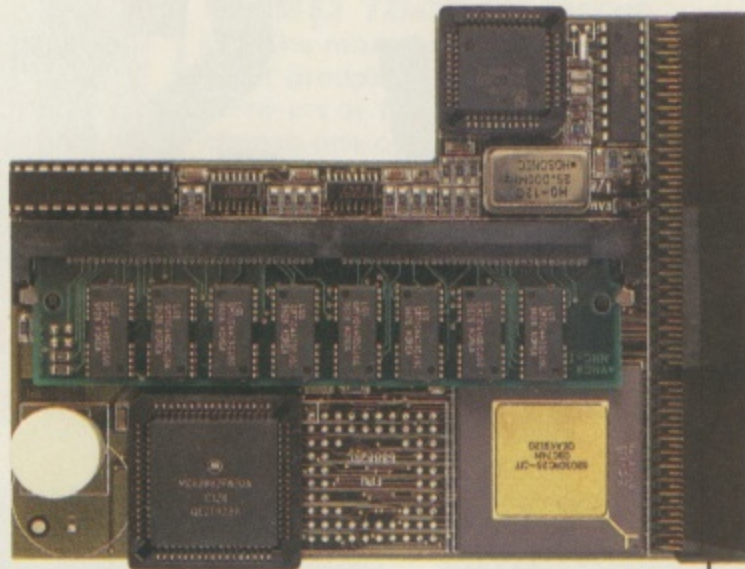

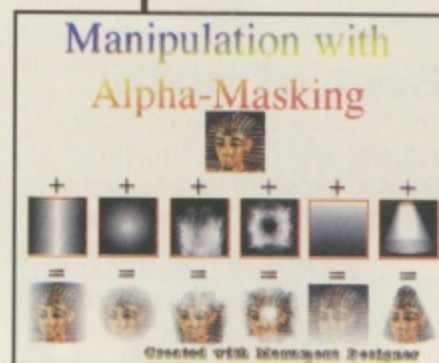

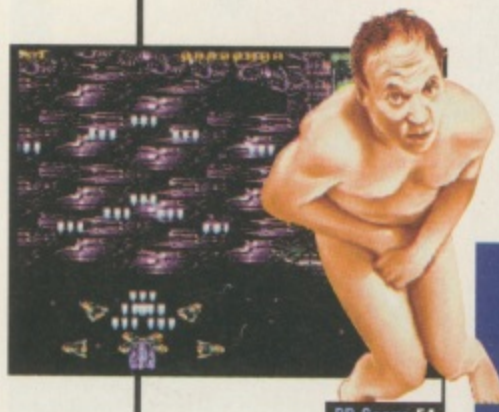

Draw Studio

An all-new DTP illustration system appears from the authors of Image Studio and Texture Studio. But is it quick on the draw?

Desk top publishing has always been a popular use for the Amiga but recent years have seen a sharp decline in the development of quality DTP software. SoftLogik's PageStream is the sole survivor of the once healthy Amiga DTP software scene that included a bunch of excellent packages such as ProPage and ProDraw. The rest have ceased development. However, all that has just changed with the release of Draw Studio, a package that looks set to give the Amiga DTP scene a hefty kick up the backside.

The signs are good from the outset. For a start it's been developed by those Amiga stalwarts, brothers Andy and Graham Dean. If the names sound familiar it's

not surprising, as they were also responsible for Texture Studio and Image Studio, two well respected applications from the recent past. While still on a graphics theme, the Deans have now moved over to the world of DTP illustration, spying a gap in the market and filling it with one of the most friendly and intuitive pieces of software to have appeared for ages.

Best of both

Still not sure what Draw Studio actually does? It's a structured drawing program for use primarily but not only in DTP situations.

The key to its appeal is its seamless integration of traditional structured art components with bitmapped graphics, so in theory you get the best of both worlds. In fact, you do actually get the best of both, so long as you have a good graphics package and a decent DTP system to back it up.

Basically the way it works is you import some bitmap images (IFF, TIFF, GIF, JPEG, BMP, PCX or anything else via datatypes) and

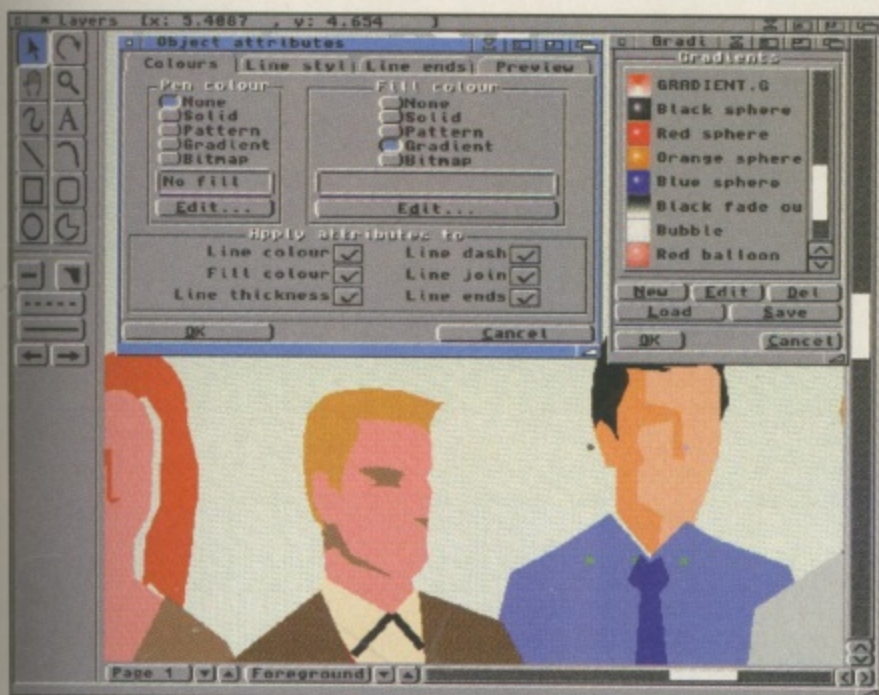
combine as many of these as memory will permit with your structured elements, such as lines, circles, boxes and so on which are built from scratch using plenty of the built-in tricks along the way to spice things up. Once your illustration is finished you can export it as an EPS file or a bitmap of your specified resolution. That's simplifying it a lot because there's a whole lot more you can do along the way. Got the picture?

DTP

Draw Studio's main purpose is to produce illustrations for use in DTP applications, whether that means amateur club newsletters or material for professional magazines and publications, but as it outputs its final images as 24-bit bitmaps it can be used for all kinds of graphic

work. In theory the output resolution can be as big as you like, although at the moment this is limited to available RAM. Actually there seems to be some other limiting factor, perhaps Chip RAM. There really needs to be an option to render a project straight to a file on hard drive. That would allow you to output a non-jaggie image at whatever size was required, which could then be used as large as you like, even if that meant importing it to a DTP system on a different platform (say, providing a massive front cover image or illustration for use in Quark XPress on the Mac). That's not possible at the moment but it looks as if it will be addressed in the next update of the program.

Bearing that in mind, at the moment it's limited to smaller illustrations, but it can still knock out some very slick images. Alongside the standard structured

art tools there are options for producing a variety of graduated tints, plenty of built-in arrowheads for lines and diagrams, Bezier curves, freehand drawing, dotted lines and more. Transparent colours can also be used. This is very welcome and has a number of uses apart from purely as an artistic effect.

Bitmaps

Bitmaps come into the plot via an effective bitmap management section. You can select and import any bitmap into Draw

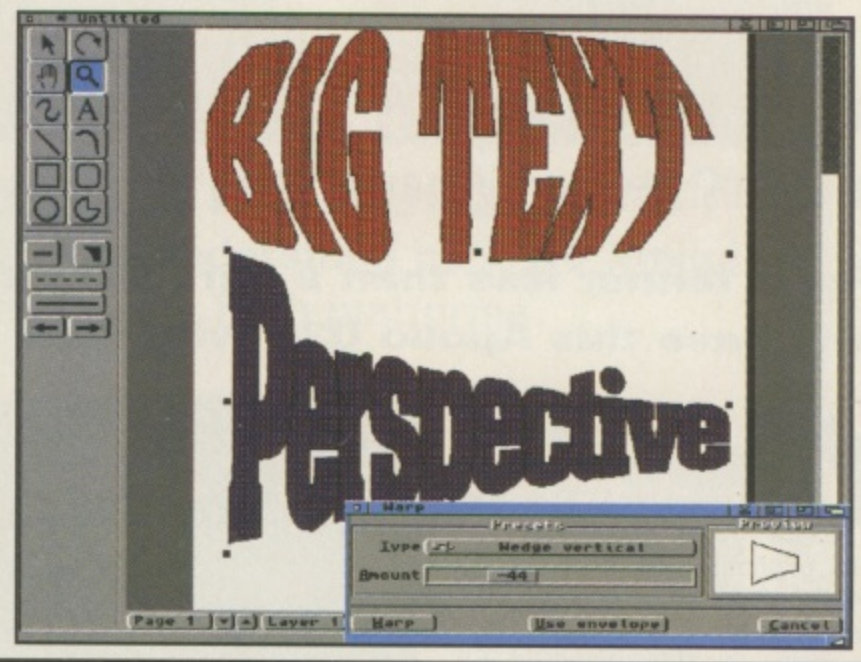
Super friendly

While there have been some good structured art packages released in the past, like ProDraw for example, they're hardly ideal for getting the most from a nice big fast AGA or 24 bit-equipped modern Amiga. Draw Studio is a totally new application and has been written with today's requirements and hardware in mind. The result is a program that's incredibly easy to use, with plenty of options for you to adjust everything to your specific needs.

One of its most endearing features is the layout of the controls and menus backed up by standard DTP hotkeys. Anyone who's used a DTP package will feel instantly at home with Draw Studio, importing and exporting, drawing shapes, moving and resizing objects with ease.

Warp factor nine

One the more fun tools to play around with is the warper. After grouping together a number of elements of structured art or text (it doesn't work with bitmaps) you can choose one of the preset warps from the menu and alter the amount of stretch and squash from a slider. You get a small outline preview too which is nice. Alternatively you can mould your own warp using the Envelope option. This is especially useful for spicing up text and adding a sense of movement.



Studio's bitmap manager, where it can be given a name tag that's different to its original filename. When you want to use a bitmap, for example to fill another object or text, you go to the bitmap manager and select it using the lister which displays all the currently loaded images as thumbnails along with their tag names. This approach makes it possible to use the same source bitmap in a number of areas in a variety of ways, without having to reload the bitmap image or have it duplicated in RAM.

Compatibility

Draw Studio isn't yet the total DTP graphics package but it's moving in the right direction. Many will feel compatibility with other platforms and systems is an important quality in such a program, and thanks to its support of importing and exporting EPS, IFF, TIFF, PCX, GIF, JPEG and BMP file types it won't have any trouble interfacing with PC and Mac systems, should that be necessary. However, the limitations on the size of the final output is something that definitely needs to be sorted out, and I'm lead to believe that it will be very soon.

For anyone working on less demanding projects, especially those working purely with Amiga systems, Draw Studio will provide a whole new creative avenue when it comes to illustration. No

longer are we limited to dated, unstable software with no user support. While its use of MUI may not find favour with everyone, this has the side effect of making it a very flexible program that offers plenty of power and options from a simple interface, with all the usual MUI features including 'balloon help' and loads of configurable preferences. This is a particularly important consideration with a creative tool such as this, where the interface needs to be as transparent as possible, allowing the user to realise complex ideas with minutes. As it stands, Draw Studio is an excellent program, which for a version 1 release is quite an achievement. ■

For a tenner less than a bare Blizzard 030 you can have this Apollo 030 with 8Mb of RAM.

Accelerators are pretty much standard equipment on A1200s these days. We need not harp on the fact that the stock 14Mhz 68020 is not up to much when compared to modern software. As with other platforms, the specification required to run the average application has risen and risen. So accelerators are always welcome in my book.

There's a key difference between extra memory and CPU power. Memory such as RAM dictates what specification the software needs to work at all whereas CPU power only affects the speed the software will run. To that effect memory is more important but presuming you have enough to do what is required, you don't want to be left waiting around for it to happen. It used to be that RAM cards were a lot cheaper than accelerators until the Apollo 1230's predecessor, the 1220 arrived. Like the RAM cards available then it also cost only £99 but it significantly sped up the A1200 given an onboard 1Mb or 4MB SIMM.

CPU power

This new version, the A1230, is unsurprisingly fitted with a 68030



instead of a 68020 and comes equipped with an MMU making virtual memory a possibility. The 1230 also very usefully accepts either a 4 or 8Mb SIMM but unfortunately 8Mb is PCMCIA unfriendly so you can forget any PCMCIA activity if such a SIMM is fitted. This stems from the fact that the 1230 is really a souped up 1220 which was never designed with

the logic required to map the memory above the PCMCIA space.

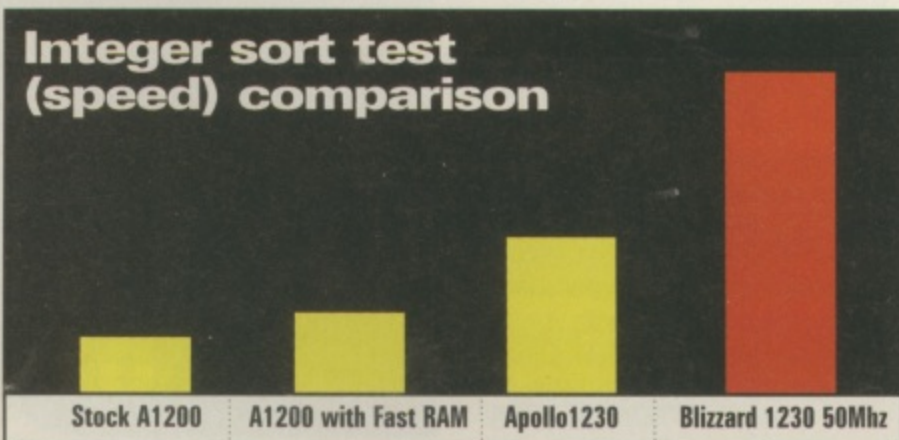
MMU and FPU

Performance wise, the 1230 is virtually identical to the 1220 card since the 68030 isn't much of an advance on the 68020. The only main difference is the addition of a tiny data cache and the MMU of course. However, this benefit is negated by the 1230 being clocked at 25Mhz instead of the 1220's 28Mhz. I'm told this was due to public sensitivity to 'overclocking'. Surely no-one cares about 3Mhz? The fitted 68882 is a 20Mhz unit which is clocked at 25Mhz anyway!

The Apollo 1230 is a competently built card even if PCMCIA is of no use. And with 8Mb of RAM it's £10 cheaper than an unpopulated Blizzard 1230MK IV. Memory, speed and a real time clock all for a ton and a half is a pretty good

deal. A good card for the price, shame about the PCMCIA but it's a worthy consideration if the wallet can't quite stretch to a Blizzard. ■

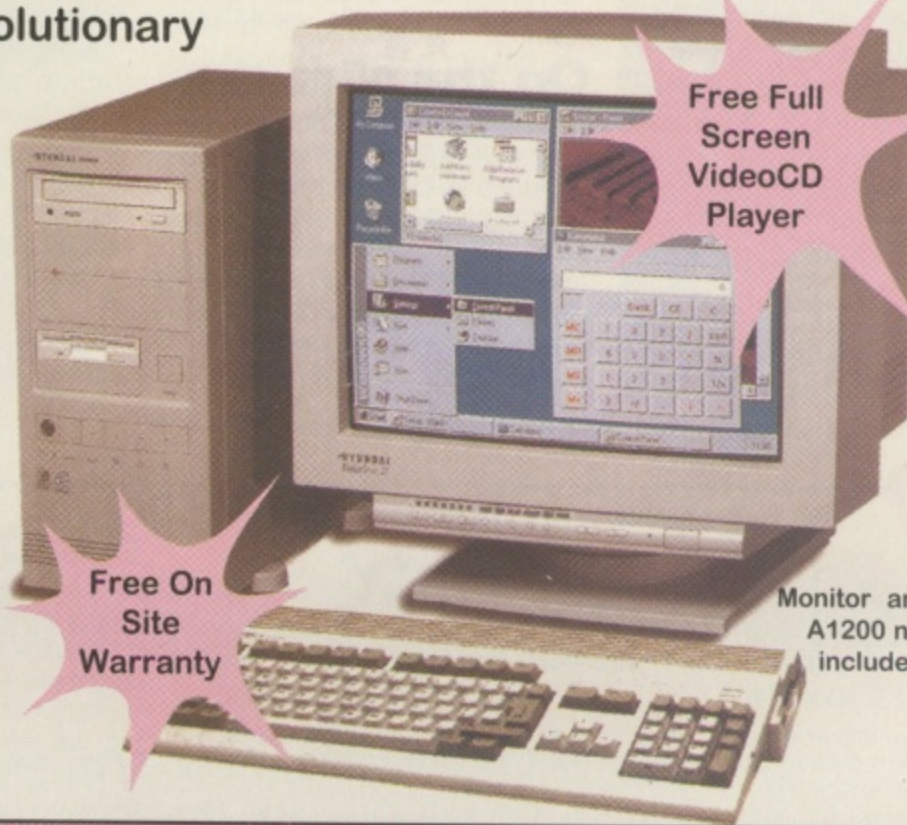

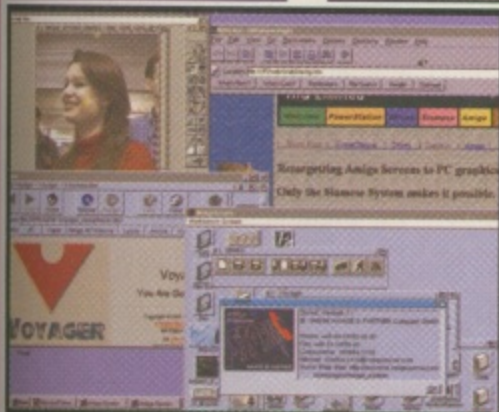

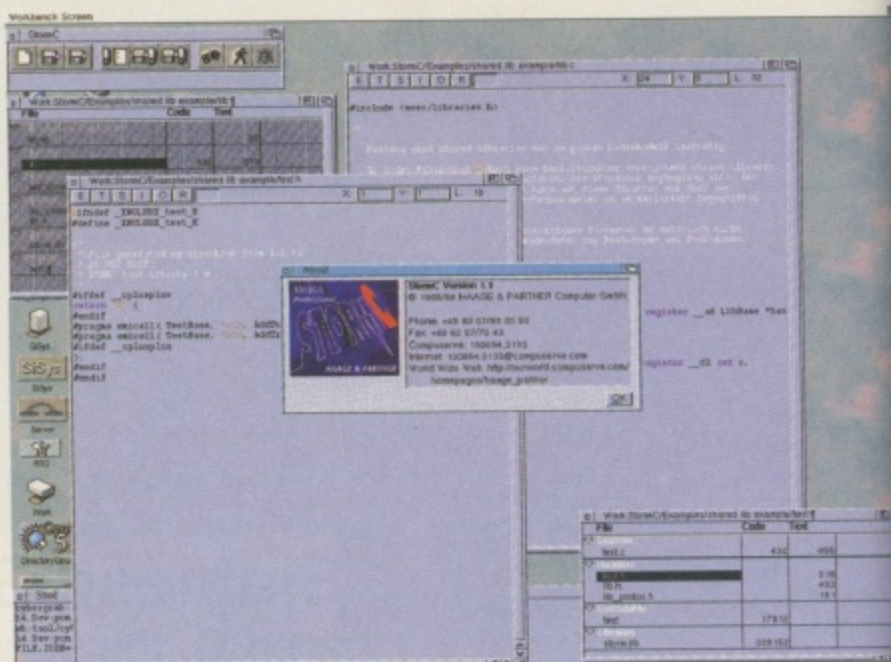
Murphy's law. Along comes something that you've been waiting for forever and it's what you've always wanted but ...

O was really looking forward to reviewing Storm C. I'd just added a C++ Classes to the PC Side of the Siamese System and was looking forward to being able to do the same on the Amiga side. What I really needed was a powerful integrated editor and debugger to use on the Amiga and it looked as if Storm C was going to be the answer. SAS's C++ has never really been too useable as it's pretty slow and doesn't have any support for things like excep-

tions or templates. So, I had more than a passing interest as to how the Amiga's only remaining commercial C++ compiler would fare.

On the slim side

The small poorly-written manual that accompanies Storm C didn't make a great first impression. Compared to the two huge tomes and massive AmigaGuide files that come with SAS C, it shapes up extremely poorly. This is a big oversight. As a programmer, I understand that its more fun to



write code than documentation, but it's impossible to program without documentation! Luckily, though there is online help to get you started.

Aside from the manual however, there are some excellent new features. For example, Storm C has a Visual Project Manager which organises your projects and saves lots of time by removing the need for makefiles. This enables you to easily add and remove files from projects and all

components are neatly displayed in an overview window. From here you can open source files just by double clicking on their name which is far more advanced than SAS C. A toolbar is also provided with commonly used features such as load/save, compile/debug

The Storm Editor where all the source files are opened up has keyword highlighting, which if tastefully setup (my default system colours are headache-inducingly loud), can make editing code much

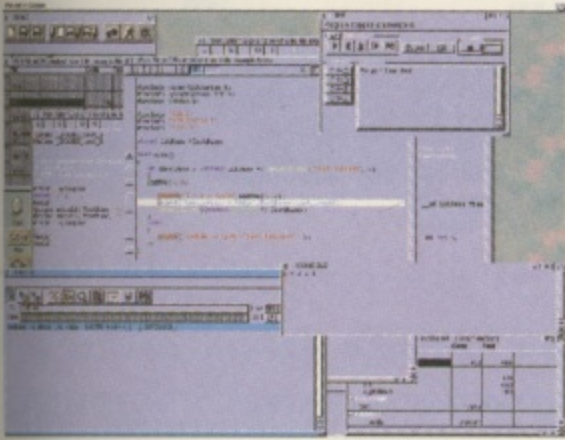

decided it wasn't that good an idea after all. Several things about Storm C such as library pragmas, and library function prototypes are subtly different to SAS C. These differences should really be explained in the manual and it really needs a chapter on how to successfully port SAS code to StormC.

less eye straining. Real time updating as you type is another handy feature here as it shows up common errors such as typos or misspelled function names as you go along. After the novelty wears off though, you start to wonder where the other power features such as multiple views are. Fortunately it's possible to use any third party text editor to make up for the shortfall.

Debugger drag

A good debugger is essential. I've never found SAS's Code- Probe to be that friendly so as I was having a hard time debugging my AmigaDOS packet handler, I thought this would be a good thing to try Storm C out with. A few frustrated hours later, I

StormC repeatedly refused to compile my program a second time, always complaining that "An error in the ARexx protocol accrued. The program cannot be compiled. Try restarting the system".

I rang up Storm C tech support for help. They weren't in, so I Emailed them a few times. A month later, no reply. Ho hum. I tried compiling one of the few example programs, the C= ColorWheel example and it worked first time so I suppose it just didn't like my code.

Limited libraries

One of Storm C's most notable features is how it lets you define your own library structure base, it's brilliantly easy. You define your

structure, then use a #pragma statement to tell the compiler that its your library base. This is a very useful thing to be able to do, for example you can give other programs access to your structure in the same way as C= libraries such as the intuition. library do, ie struct MyBase *MyBase=(struct MyBase *)OpenLibrary ("my.library", 1); To do the same thing in SAS C you have to provide your own library startup code, which makes using many SAS/ANSI C functions unusable.

Now for the bad news; you can't step into your own library functions using the debugger (cue sounds of heads thudding against walls). This alone makes Storm C unusable for nearly all of my projects. Libraries are a very important program component, to be unable to debug them properly is a massive oversight. Another missed opportunity is the inability to create C++ libraries, unlike SAS C++. StormC also does not provide library startup code for multibase libraries, only single base.

Falls down

What Storm C does, it does well. The things it doesn't do, I can't wait for. If development is continued,

Storm C can only overtake SAS C. Once my various gripes are sorted out, I would like to switch to StormC. Future developments include StormC for ProDAD's P-OS, and support for Phase5's PowerUP PPC project. In a recent press release, fat binary and integrated cross compiler development environment is outlined, that should allow quick and easy development of mixed 68k/PPC software. So, I can only wait in anticipation. ■

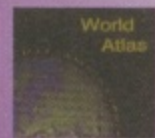

A new video titling program steps into the ring. Will new ideas be enough to make it a winner?

Let's face it, when it comes to video titling software, the Amiga is more than well catered for. There's the likes of Scala, VideoStage Pro and MediaPoint offering professional results in exchange for very little effort, Adorage doing a good job of churning out special effects and a range of shareware titlers backing them up. So what more can a new player in the field offer us? Quite a bit actually.

New approach

There wouldn't be much point in trying to emulate the likes of Scala, so Monument Designer takes a rather different approach. It uses a multi-window interface which can be directed to any available screen mode. This houses a preview window, a timeline, an effects selection window and a main layout window. This last one looks more like something from a DTP package than a video titler, which is a reflection of the way the program works.

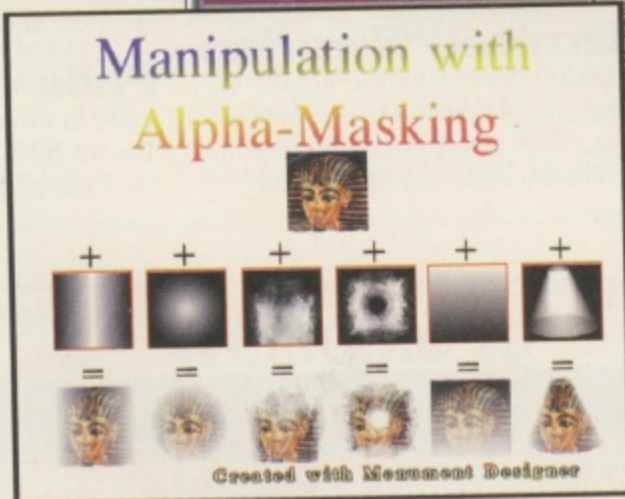
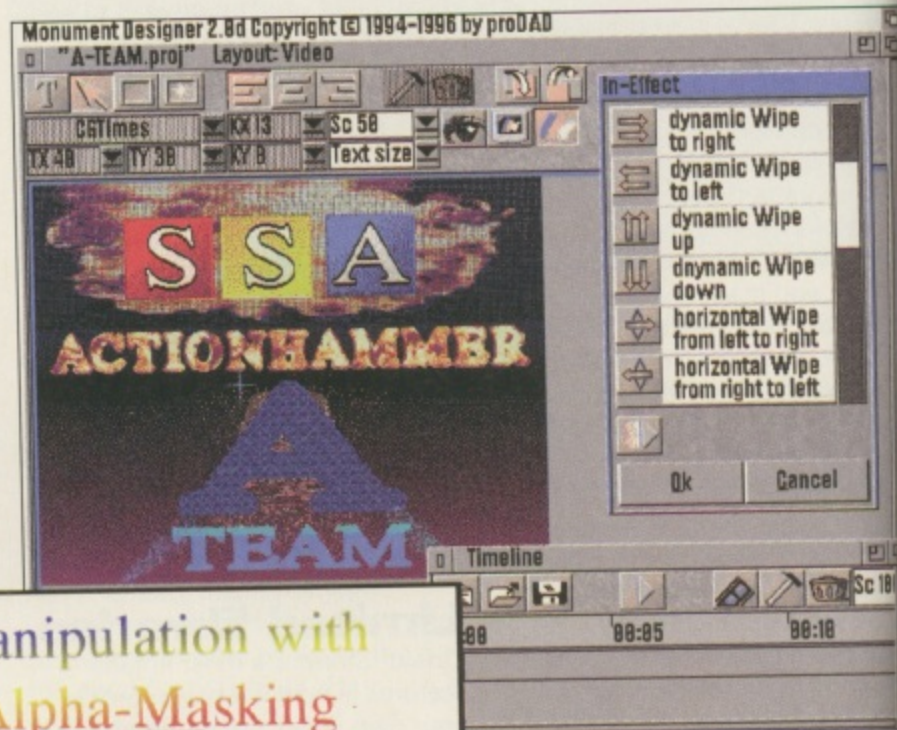
Titles, credits, presentations and such forth are created by combining text and picture elements into a sequence. However, for the text

you are limited to using Compugraphic fonts. Bitmap fonts are not supported. This is unfortunate, as many videographers will have amassed quite a collection of bitmap fonts for all occasions. Surely it wouldn't have been a problem to incorporate support for these?

Text is entered into a box which can then be manipulated as in a DTP system using grab handles, while the text itself can be formatted using justification and centring tools. Text can be rotated but they've messed up a bit here. You have to rotate each letter separately, so if you want a line of sloping text, you need to adjust each letter in turn and then position them by hand so that they all line up properly. I can think of better ways to pass the time.

Alpha channels

If the thought of using Compugraphic fonts for your titles



brings to mind visions of dull black and white screens, don't worry because there are ways of sprucing up your text. Words can be filled with bitmaps or gradient fills. You can even use animated alpha masks to give them some movement.

For example, if you had an animation of rippling concentric circles, this could be used as a mask to displace the main display. There's also a range of alpha channel effects included which work in a similar way, offering effects such as fog, stars and flames. Compiling a complete sequence is fairly simple. The combination of the timeline and wipe windows makes it easy to set up keyframes and render an animation.

Conclusion

While it's good to see new ideas and approaches being taken with software, ultimately Monument Designer is not overly impres-

sive. It does offer some neat ideas and if you're used to working with DTP you may well prefer its interface to that of Scala and company. However, it lacks the 'quick and dirty' features of many of its rivals, so if you want to bang up some title sequences in a few seconds you might find this is rather unwieldy. However, the fact that it outputs to animation files makes it suitable for more than just video applications – you could put it to use for creating intros and presentations to complement a variety of Amiga based applications. ■

A fresh approach

For the presentation of video effects and titling software you need to display two screens: one for all the control panels and another for a constant display of the screens and titles you are building up. Most video software uses a split-screen method, so the controls are packed onto a small strip at the bottom of the screen, leaving most of the main screen visible behind it. This has the advantage of allowing you to view your graphics as they will appear, while your control panel can be toggled on and off.

However, the trouble with this is that it's not very flexible and doesn't take into account anyone who wants to use their own screen modes or graphics cards. Both Monument Designer and Animage address this problem by using a system of resizable windows, one of which contains a preview of the display you're currently building. Old guard fans, however, might not like this as the preview display is an approximation of what will actually be displayed in the final presentation. It's up to you.

Animage

From the same stable as Monument Designer comes a new video effects package.

Astute readers will have already noticed similarities between Animage and ProDAD's previous animation effects program Adorage. With Animage, ProDAD have started over again, dropping the functional but dated interface of Adorage and totally re-thinking the whole thing. However, it would be unfair to link Animage too closely with Adorage, as it's a far superior system capable of knocking out some extremely slick and professional looking results.

Watching the output from Animage you could easily be convinced that you were watching

a video effects machine. It's basically an animation composition tool but it allows you to combine and process a number of animations in some pretty dynamic styles. The working environment is very much like that of Monument Titler, so instead of a customised screen of buttons as in Adorage, you get a nice system compliant window-based front end that can be used on flicker-free high resolution displays including graphics cards via Cybergraphics.

Mix and match

What makes Animage so special is the way in which you can combine your animations. For a start, you are free to completely resize and scale each of your component animations, so we're not just talking about merging or crossfading from one anim to another. Each part can also be given its own flight path, speed and special effects. So this means you can emulate those

SSA animation

Animage and Monument Designer both output Anim5 animations as used by most Amiga animation packages, plus a special custom format called SSA.

Anyone who has used ClariSSA or Adorage will be familiar with ProDAD's inventive and highly effective SSA animation format. It stands for Super Smooth Animation and increases the maximum frame rate your Amiga can push out when playing animations, with higher frame rates leading to smoother movement.

SSA exploits the Amiga's interlace mode which flickers between two displays 25 times every second (or 30 times in NTSC mode). An interlaced picture actually is made up of two parts (fields) which are 'interlaced' between each other in alternating lines.

Each frame of an SSA animation holds two fields, which in this case are two consecutive animation frames. With a big helping hand from the video hardware that controls the flickering of the interlace mode, these animations quite often live up to their Super Smooth monicker.

tumbling, exploding live video effects that are so popular on TV. Even though you're not actually processing live video signals, there's no reason why you can't use digitised video animations.

Because the final output of Animage is an animation, you can even import and process animations that you have previously created with the program. The ability to add fading trails to your components gives even more scope for super-slick cuts and fades.

Very slick

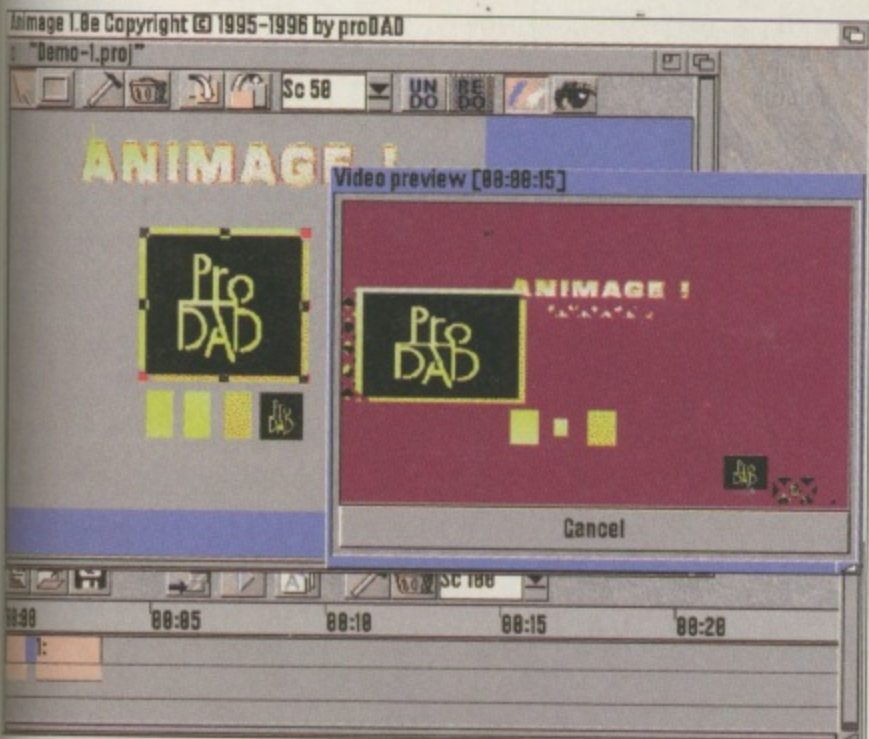
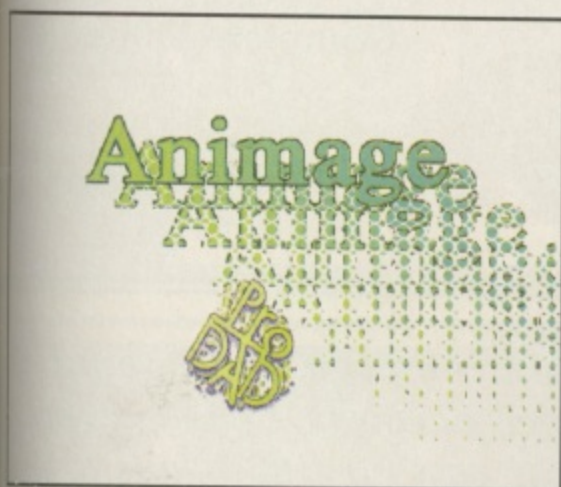
Although Animage is far from a complete video effects and titling package it does have some very clever tricks up its sleeve.

There are many things you can do with Animage that would be either impossible or at the

very least extremely time consuming to replicate with other software. If you're serious about flashy video titles and presentations then this should definitely be on your shopping list, as it will give you a substantial lead over any competition you might have.

Once you've got a series of Animage projects down onto videotape you could have yourself a very impressive showreel that would otherwise require a rack of dedicated video effects units to achieve. For this reason alone it's well worth looking out for. ■

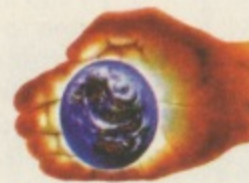

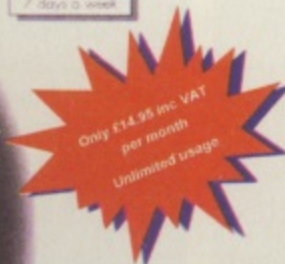

Unlike the film industry, this sequel looks like it's going to be even better than the box office smash original.

The original Siamese Amiga to PC network package achieved a top rated award and was dubbed: "Most revolutionary product of the year" at the time. However, the lads from HiQ haven't sat back on their laurels since the original Siamese system rolled off the production line. They managed to pull a new version of the Siamese out of their hat that has impressed us to the extent that we had to do a special preview of the product before it's finished.

So why are we so impressed? In a word - RTG. Not the normal kind of RTG in which the Amiga's screen is ReTarGetted to a third-party graphics board, normally only possible on Zorro slot Amigas. No, not that kind but one where the Amiga's display is miraculously teleported across to a PC. We kid you not.

Display card superior

"Why have they added this capability?", you ask? Reasons are many and varied. Firstly, any old PC usually has a display card sadly superior to the Amiga's custom chip set in terms of speed and resolution if not graphical tricks. Next up, a nice cheap (and large) SVGA monitor can handle both the PC's output and the Amiga output in one. As with the Siamese original, there's only need for one keyboard and mouse, the A1200 could be slung under the table.

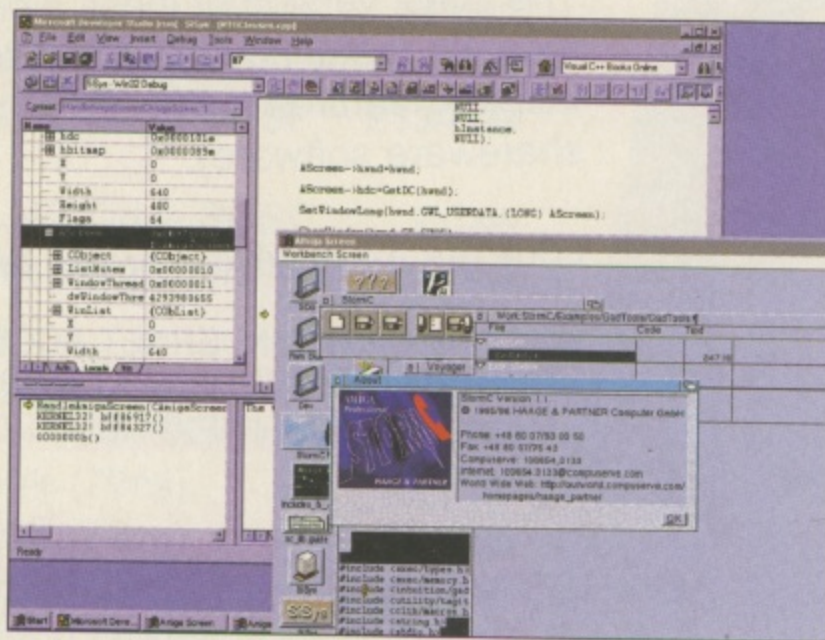
We don't mean to suggest you'd relegate the Amiga to a simple bolt-on for the PC - far

from it, running Amiga applications on separate screens appears as windows on Windows 95's desktop. All of the top Amiga applications will carry on multitasking but with graphical output many times faster than normal. Next to a native Windows applications it'll be instantly apparent which system is superior.

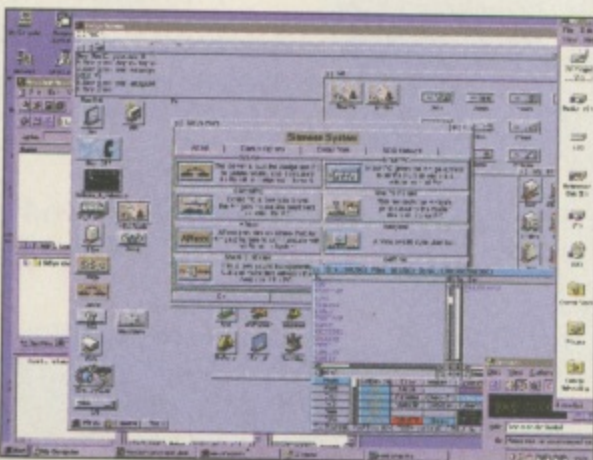
Shocking example

For example, we ran a moire pattern benchmark on native AGA, a CyberVision 64 in an A4000 and the Siamese RTG system. The pattern pulled off only 440 lines in 10 seconds on AGA in 256 colours, 10832 on the CyberVision 64 at twice the resolution and 65536 colours while the Siamese RTG miraculously dropped jaws with 24820 lines in 10 seconds. Paul Nolan, the system's programmer, was quick to state that it was the PC graphics card's hardware acceleration which was responsible for the ridiculous results. Needless to say we'll be taking an indepth look at the Siamese RTG system which promises to give a new lease of life to the Amiga or a proper operating system to the PC, depending on how you look at it. Either way we're sure you'll agree it's pretty exciting stuff so keep an eye out for it in a future issue of CU Amiga Magazine. ■

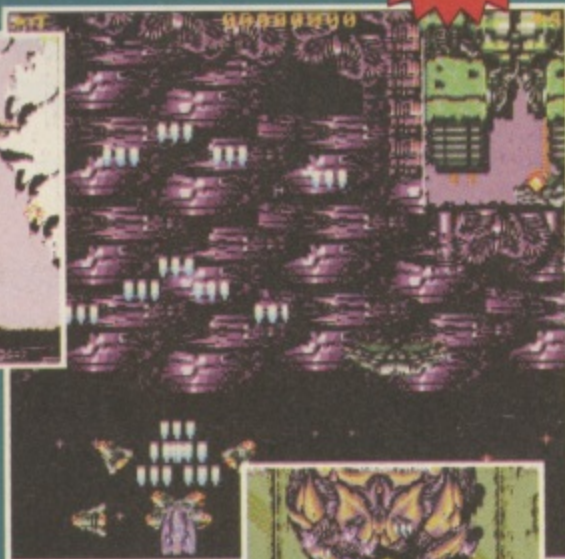

MegaTyphoon game

Demo of the Month



Stunned. That's the first word that comes into my head after giving this game the once over. And I'll bet good money that you will be too. This has got to be the most technically accomplished shoot 'em up for years. What's most impressive is the amount of sprites flying around the screen at such a super-smooth rate. You may have even seen the PD game Blaster a couple of years back - it was the quickest thing the Amiga had ever coped with. This one beats that and lots of the commercial zappers hands down. It really is that frantic. The sprite designs aren't as good as some of the commercial offerings such as the wonderful XP8 and Project-X, but hardcore action is what it comes down to, and Mega Typhoon delivers that in abundance. It's a taster of the full game so you'll need to order it from the authors directly, but I doubt it will be too long before some smart company picks it up for a full commercial release, so get in fast. It's even got funky music on the title screen, and some trainer options for the those not accustomed to shoot em ups. Very highly recommended.

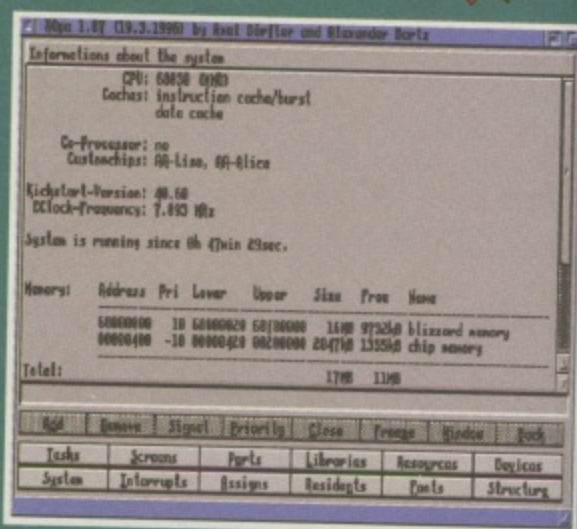
Yet another Directory-Opus clone, I thought when I first saw RO. Don't get me wrong, there isn't much wrong with plagiarism providing you improve on the original work and Directory Opus was never original in the first place. Either way, this is one kind of program that everyone needs, or else keeping things tidy becomes practically impossible. RO does much the same as all of the rest, but is well worth a look for several reasons, the first being that it's actually pretty good. Everything is laid out in a logical way and it has a very tasty preferences program that offers a lot of configurability. A lot of people use tools like this as a direct replacement for Workbench and with the features that RO offers, you could do it with this too. Another good reason to get RO is that, while it doesn't offer the incredible range of options that Directory Opus has, it is a lot cheaper being shareware rather than commercial. Give it a whirl and it may well become your first choice for general file management tasks.

I never cease to be amazed every time I come across one of Vark's compilation disks. Just where does he find all this stuff? Not content with putting together a one-disk compilation this time, Vark has excelled himself and put Vark15 onto two disks or one file



if you pick it up from Aminet. These compilation disks are always worth picking up as there's always several tools you find there that are useful no matter where your Amiga interests lie.

Unfortunately, Vark is leaving the Amiga so I suggest that fans of the series Email him directly at vark@enterprise.net to see if we can try to change his mind.

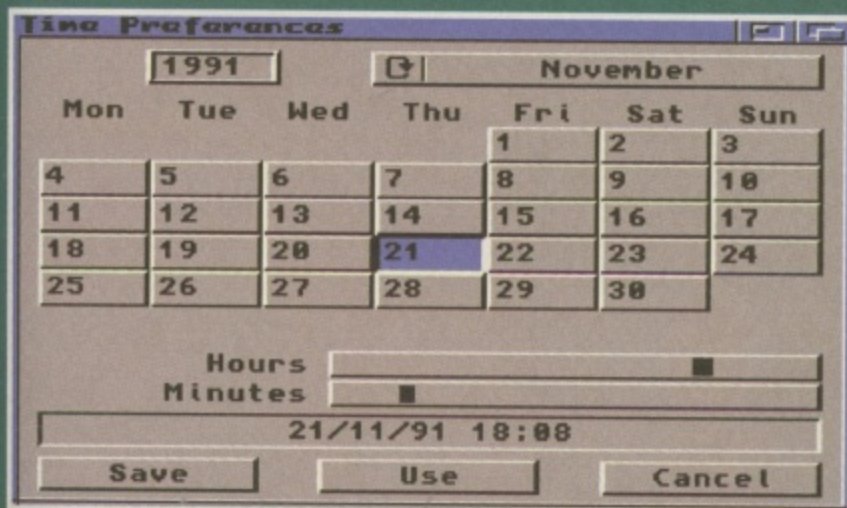
Amongst the gems on offer this time we have CleanDisk for removing deleted files from hard drives, DundeeDir which is an extended Dir command with extra features, DiskFull for using every bit of a floppy disk when copying files, a new lprefs replacement, a new Env: handling device to save memory, Kick2File for creating a file of your ROM image (which Blizzard accelerator owners will love as they can use these to up and downgrade their machines) and my favourite Xopa, which is a system monitor similar to Asp that lets you remove dead tasks and close inactive windows (a lifeline if you're a programmer). As usual this a superb compilation. Vark will be sorely missed.

Datelspector

Clock monitoring utility



One of the major oversights in most of the Amiga models has always been the lack of a built in clock. A lot of software uses the current system time and date for processing data. Some backup tools use the file datestamp to update their files so you have problems if the date gets set in the future and no copy is made. Fortunately there are clocks we can use in our Amigas that we take for granted until they break down. This tool can save a lot of problems should your machine suffer a bad crash that messes up the clock. You may not notice it but Datelspector will. Drop it into your WBStartup drawer and it sits there performing some intelligent checks on boot up to see if the date has changed drastically since last boot, and warning you with a requester, as well as the option to launch the preferences program directly, if the time is wrong. I won't do without it now, even though it is such a tiny program and it's saved me from problems many times already due to bad crashes.

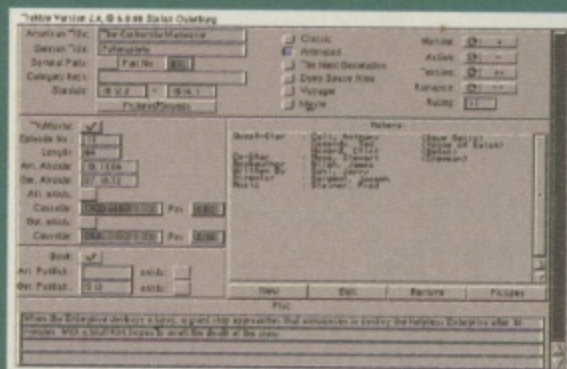

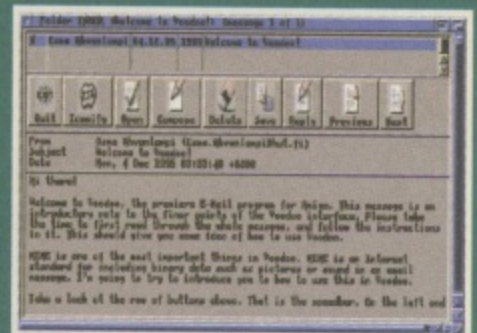

Voodoo

Multi-threaded graphic Email reader for OS3.0+

If the Porsche is the best looking car in the world but still comes down to being just a car, then Voodoo is the equivalent of the Porsche of Email readers on the Amiga. Originally intended to be part of AT's surfer pack, the Voodoo looks great once you get past the friendly installation process. Voodoo is different to YAM (Yet another mailer) in that it has no inbuilt programs for delivering and receiving Email, relying on external utilities (some of which are supplied and installed for you) to be set up to use SMTP or POP formats. This is handy if you're a Demon customer, for example, and have to pay extra charges for POP mail, and use SMTP instead. It also has support for MIME (Multipurpose Internet Mail Extensions) and UUEncoding, as well as using PGP, if installed, for encrypting and other security features. Multiple folders can be defined for mailing lists, and configuring an external editor is easy with the excellent Arexx port. It uses the ClassAct GUI system which MUI-haters will appreciate too. Voodoo is shareware compared to YAM (which you can register for free) so it comes down to personal preference and cost.

IconInstaller

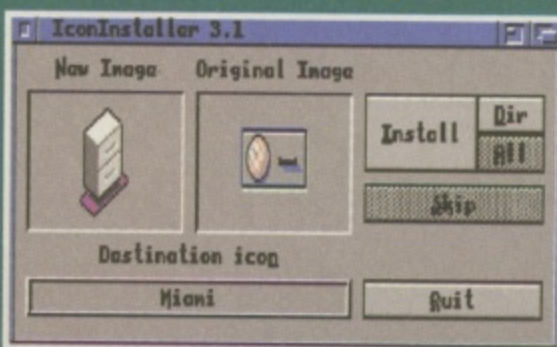
GUI for converting icon graphics

Now this is really smart, Amigas should come with a program like this in the first place. Although we have a wonderful GUI system, with a nifty icon and window environment, there is no easy method of changing icon images to your preference.

We have Icon Edit since Workbench 2.0 and better PD equivalents (like Iconian) but until IconInstaller there was no painless way of replacing icons without manual editing. The Icon types would need to be changed to project, tool, trashcan, disk or drawer and the tooltype definitions would need to be replaced by hand.

IconInstaller comes to the rescue with a beautiful GUI that you can drop source and destination icons onto and it converts the images, leaving other data such as tooltypes fully intact. It even has options to support NewIcons (written by the same author) and batch operations on whole directories. IconInstaller comes in the NewIcons archive, as well as Aminet separately.

CD on the Cheap

A CD-ROM drive for £50? You must be joking. No, it's true you can make up your own CD-ROM drive without spending lots of cash. And here's how you can do it ...

Last time we looked at CD-ROM connections we concentrated on the SCSI options. This time we're looking at using ultra cheap IDE CD-ROM mechanisms with the existing A600, A1200 and A4000 IDE interfaces.

With a bit of knowledge about what's involved in getting and setting up your own CD-ROM drive you'll be in the best position to decide which package is best for you, whether you're deciding on a cheap DIY set-up or a more expensive complete fuss-free package from an Amiga dealer.

When it comes to choosing a CD-ROM drive the main choice is between SCSI and IDE. SCSI is one of the easier beasts to get up and running, mainly due to

HiSoft's plug 'n' go Squirrel. However, boxed SCSI CD-ROM drives are quite expensive and you may not want to fork out for the extra expense of a Squirrel if there's no need for additional drives. In this case IDE CD-ROMs are a good option as they are reasonably priced and very easy to set up.

IDE CD-ROMs are the norm on the PC hence the lower cost. Unfortunately, the standard they use to talk to the host computer is not the same as for hard drives. In fact it's called 'ATAPI' or even more accurately 'SFF-8020'.

However, if we can ascertain that a CD-ROM mechanism is 100% compliant with that standard then it should work with your standard IDE interface and the ATAPI Plug 'n' Play software

provided on this month's cover mounted cover disk and CD.

Make connections

Connecting up the CD-ROM mechanisms is fairly straightforward but it does involve opening up the Amiga and making sure you have the right cables. The AA600 and A1200 have a high-density 44 pin connector located at the top left of the motherboard which was designed for small 2.5" hard drives. So, similar to fitting cheaper/faster 3.5" hard drives internally, we need a cable which has the larger low-density 40 way connectors on one end with the high-density job on the other end to plug into the A600/A1200.

The simplest scenario is a cable with a single 44 way connector plugged into the A600/1200, trailed out to the left, terminating in a 40 way connector plugged into an IDE CD-ROM mechanism. This means that the case should happily screw back on with the cable between the top and bottom of the machine's case.

Note that the nearest screws should

not be fully tightened so as not to damage the cable. However, it's highly likely that you'd also have a hard drive connected. The cable(s) you'll need then depend on whether your drive is a 2.5" unit or a 3.5" unit. We found a few ways to do this so we're not going to put forward a definitive solution as it also depends on what happens outside of the machine.

There's two basic ways to proceed here, one is to leave the hard drive fitted internally and the other is to relocate the hard drive and the new CD-ROM device into a PC mini tower case or the like. This creates the next problem of how to house the CD-ROM mechanism and how to power it.

If a 3.5" hard drive is fitted internally as well as an accelerator card then your Amiga is already tempting fate power wise. Hacking the CD-ROM into the A1200's power supply is possible but whether your power supply can cope with it is uncertain. It might lead to crashes when the CD-ROM fires up as the 'final straw' barrier is reached. Solutions include using a replacement power supply such as the MicroniK unit or going down the PC mini tower route; powering the hard drive and CD-ROM separately.

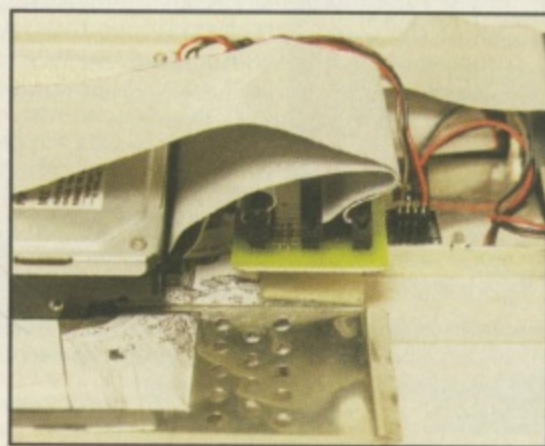
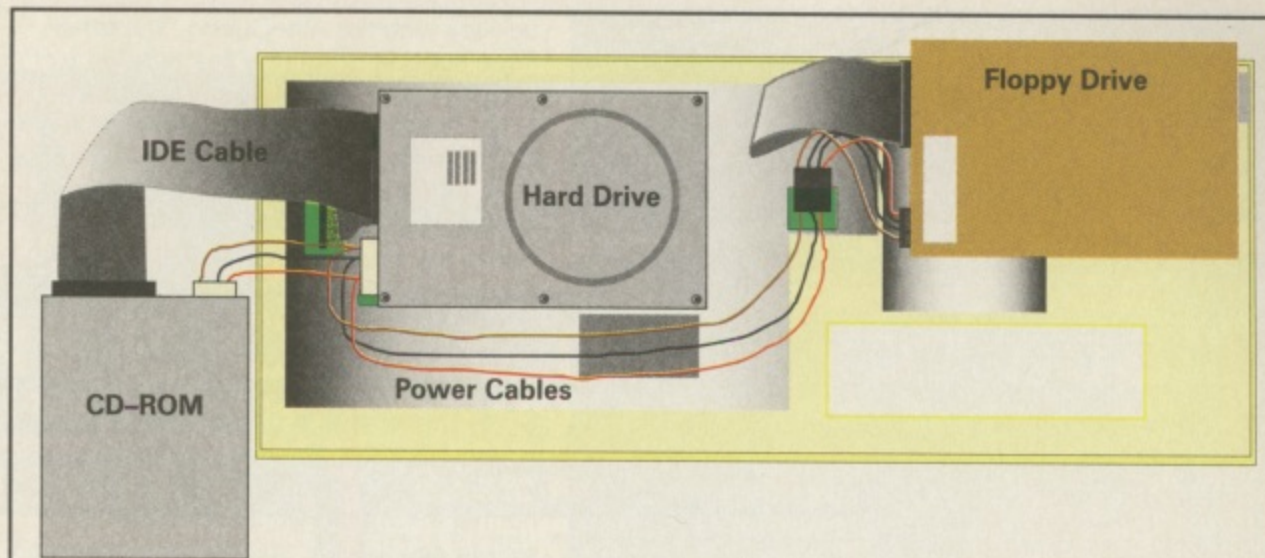
HiQ in particular have an extremely useful mini tower system which has SCSI and IDE leads pre-fitted. What's more it has an Amiga power lead wired into the 250W power supply so it'll power a hard drive, CD-ROM, A1200 and provide housing and cabling. The HiQ 'Power Station' is priced at £99 but it could still be easily worth it for many considering a power supply alone costs already half of that.

The Amiga 4000 doesn't have these same sorts of problems. In fact adding an ATAPI CD-ROM is quite basic. An IDE CD-ROM mechanism is simply loaded into the front panel 5.25" drive bay and connected to the internal power leads. Lastly the IDE cable connected to the internal hard drive already has a spare connector which is fitted to the CD-ROM mechanism. A jumper will need to be added to the hard drive if it's the original Seagate unit, (see the panel to the right for details). All that's needed then, is CU Amiga Magazine's cover disk software and Bob's your uncle.

The software on the cover disk this month is the ATAPI Plug 'n' Play version 3, demo. Don't let the demo tag put you off, it works fine and doesn't time-out unlike the demo versions of IDEfix. You'll just be subject to a screen popping up occasionally reminding you that registering would be a good idea. It costs £15 for CU Amiga Magazine readers and can be obtained from Georg Campana with the coupon on page 64. You can also Email the author at georg@etruscan.li.it too.

Up and running

Installation of ATAPI is simple hence the Plug 'n' Play name. Firstly you'll need to click on Extract_ATAPI_PnP on the cover disk from Workbench. A requester will

appear asking you where you'd like to extract the archive to. This is a temporary location where the package will be installed from, so RAM would be a good idea if you have the memory. After extracting, open up the drawer it created and click on the Install icon.

The installer will want the location of

your boot drive; normally Sys:. It will place a preferences icon in Prefs, and three utilities in the Utilities drawer of your Workbench. ATAPI_PnP is quite happy to use any CD filesystem such as the superb AmiCDFS or AsimWare's commercial filesystem, however it also comes with its own superb FS called

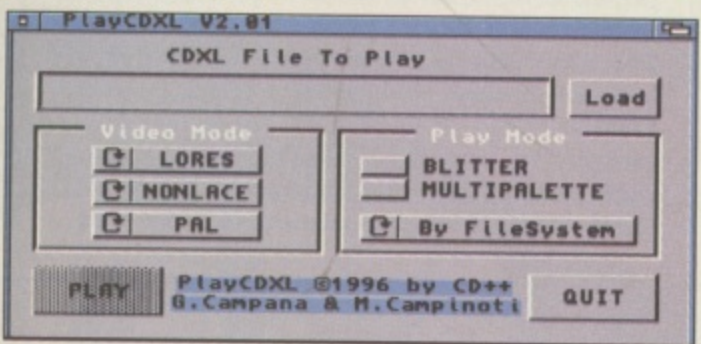
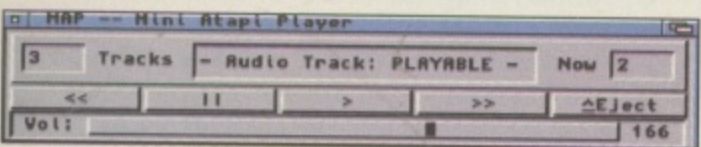
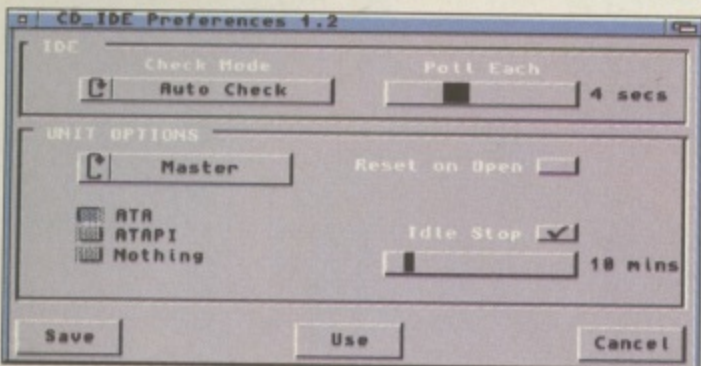
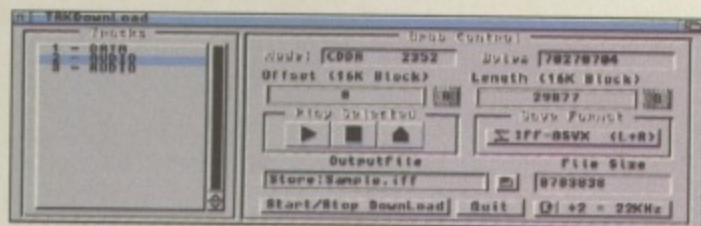
Masters and slaves

There are some issues concerning getting IDE CD-ROMs working with existing hard drives that need to be clarified. It is easier if you have documentation on your hard drive, specifically the details of the jumpers on how to set the drive from Master to Slave etc. Some thoughtful manufacturers have inscribed such diagrams on the hard drive itself. Sadly the problem is more serious with 2.5" drives, ours were totally undocumented and refused to work in their standard configuration. We do know that modern 2.5" drives are known to function correctly with second drives, providing the settings are known.

IDE hard drives have two or three mode settings as a rule: Master in a single drive system, Master in a dual drive system and Slave. Some drives only have Master and Slave. Most 3.5" hard drives will be set to Master and work right away. Some, such as the Seagate drives provided in A4000s, need the 'two drive system' jumper added. CD-ROMs are always set to Slave. Fortunately their jumpers are always labelled and it should come out of the box in Slave mode but check and make sure.

The sad part of using IDE is that some rare drives don't support the standard correctly and don't work with two drives, regardless of the other being a hard drive or a CD. If your 3.5" drive isn't very old then this shouldn't be a problem but it's unfortunately much more common with 2.5" drives. For safety's sake, we recommend testing 2.5" drives with another hard drive, if you're able, before lashing out on an IDE CD-ROM. Either that or make sure you're at liberty to return it or change hard drive for a newer model.

We'd like to stress that it is possible you may run into problems trying to get two devices working on the IDE bus. It's far less likely to happen if your drive is a modern 3.5" drive but still possible. In the advent of any problems, feel free to experiment with the jumper settings until your Amiga boots. You won't damage your machine by doing this so long as you confine any changes to the Master/Slave settings. Lastly, it's possible to have your hard drive boot but the system not recognise the CD-ROM, again this is usually remedied by jumper changes.

CDFS++ which is recommended. When installation is complete, it should be a simple matter of rebooting your Amiga. If the IDE CD-ROM is correctly connected, an icon should appear for a CD if it's present in the CD-ROM, it's that simple.

The support programs provided with ATAPI_PnP are also simple, easy-to-use and impressive like the filesystem itself. Newly installed into the Prefs drawer is the CD IDE preferences. In all probability this won't need to be touched but it's possible to hard set the types of devices on the IDE bus including the so-called second-channel which provides two more

devices with the Alfa Quatro. The other three support programs are installed to the Utilities drawer of your Workbench drive. TRKdownload downloads CDDA or CD Digital Audio direct from CD and converts to IFF samples. It will even down-sample it from 44Khz to 22 and 11Khz as needs be. You will need an IDE CD-ROM that supports CDDA access over the IDE bus for this program to work.

Next up is a CDXL player which is extremely competent if you have any CDXL animations to play, rare as they are. Finally, MAP is a tiny mini audio player which controls the IDE CD-ROM to play as normal through its audio out jacks. It's nice to see the IDE standard must incorporate a volume control for the audio level out as the slider actually changes the volume which is quite handy. And that's it now you've got your own CD drive ready to rock and roll with.

Q&A

Connecting up your own CD drive is a very complex matter which would need a small book on it to cover everything. However, here are some of the more common problems that you may come across.

■ Q I have a Squirrel and a Zip drive but I want to add a CD-ROM. Will IDE be cheaper for me?

■ A Perhaps but Siren's Compaq SCSI CD-ROM complete with power supply is £89 and will be much easier to connect.

■ Q I have an A600/1200 with 60Mb 2.5" hard drive internally but I want a bigger hard drive and a CD-ROM.

■ A While it may be possible to get three devices to work on your IDE bus, your 2.5" unit, a larger hard drive and a CD-ROM, it's quite likely that your 2.5" drive won't want to play ball. For that reason it will be far easier to get rid of it totally and replace with a cheap 3.5" hard drive which will work perfectly with a CD-ROM. You won't even notice 60Mb after upgrading to a cheap-540, 850 or 1Gb hard drive.

■ Q OK, so I have or will buy an internal 3.5" hard drive, what do I really need to get it working with my A1200?

■ A This is the most common set-up so we'll look at it in some depth; You'll need a cable first. It will have to go from the A1200's high density IDE port, then go to the 3.5" IDE and then have some length to leave the case and go to an IDE mechanism. The DIY option is to make the cable by buying the necessary cable, connectors

and creating the lead, external box and wiring it up to a power supply. In this event it should be possible to put together a CD-ROM for £50.

Alternatively, it can be done with a single cable (such as HiQ's but Golden Image also sell useful cables) or with Golden Image's Alfa Quatro (which you can buy without software) and the 3.5" adapter cable you should have got if you bought the drive from an Amiga dealer. The single cable can be bought from HiQ for around £15 according to your own specification.

The CD-ROM can be powered either from an external power supply (the Micronik unit has very handy power connectors) or wired up to the A1200's floppy drive power connector with a bit of DIY soldering. This will get messy since there's already your 3.5" hard drive wired up to this. Golden Image's external IDE CD-ROM kit is idea as it takes power from the floppy drive port with a special cable and provides neat audio cables and a case. There's even a connector for using a separate power supply externally if the need arises.

Golden Image's kit costs £40 but unfortunately it's supplied with the wrong cable (no 2.5" header) so you'd need to replace it with a HiQ cable or the like or couple with an Alfa Quatro but that's getting expensive for a simple splitter PCB to make up for the lack of the right cable. The Golden Image external case and a HiQ IDE lead comes to about £65. With a dirt cheap dual/quad IDE CD-ROM, it could be done nicely for around £100.

Alternatively grab HiQ's PowerStation which will power the Amiga. You can fit your hard drive and CD-ROM and power those and it comes with the cables and audio connections. Expensive just for CD at £99 with no mechanism but that includes the superb power supply. HiQ will supply the Power Station with a wonderfully fast 8X Samsung CD-ROM for £179.95 or the Samsung 8X CD-ROM and IDE cable by itself for £99.

■ Q I have an A4000 and want to add a CD-ROM.

■ A Easy, get a cheap ATAPI CD-ROM of your chosen specifications. Try to find a shallow model since the A4000's drive bay is remarkably small, otherwise it might poke out the front panel or if forced back obscure the power supply cooling fan. If you've got the original Seagate drive, you'll need to add a jumper on the 'two drive system' jumper then simply attach the spare IDE header and power connector to the CD-ROM.

■ Q I have an A4000 but I've got two hard drives and want to add a CD-ROM.

■ A It's still possible since the ATAPI standard allows four devices. You'll need something like the Alfa Quatro, reviewed last issue, since this will connect to the

motherboard IDE connector and allow your existing drives to plug into it as well as another cable with two connectors. The second cable should be connected to the CD-ROM.

■ Q I have an A4000T, it's got IDE as well as SCSI, which one should I use?

■ A On our A4000T, using the IDE port seems to crash the machine so from our experience it would be better to add a SCSI CD-ROM mechanism.

■ Q I want to add an extra hard drive and CD-ROM to my A1200 which already has an internal 3.5" hard drive.

■ A Not a problem though again you'll need the Alfa Quatro splitter PCB. One cable with two connectors will run off the second 'out' connector to connect to the hard drive and CD-ROM externally. Housing and powering a hard drive and CD-ROM will prove tricky so a mini tower would be the best bet. In that case it would be better to locate both hard drives and CD-ROM to the tower. That way the Alfa Quatro PCB would be placed inside the tower with a single cable going from the A1200 into the tower and the PCB splitter board.

■ Q It's vital that you can download audio (CDDA) directly from CD. Are IDE CD-ROMs capable of this or should I go for SCSI?

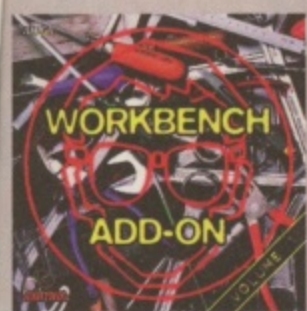
■ A Yes they are and you'll find software to do this on the cover disk. The problem is that not all IDE CD-ROMs support this feature. If this is particularly valuable then you'll need to enquire as to whether an IDE CD-ROM supports direct CDDA downloading. HiQ's 8X Samsung is one that does.

■ Q I have an A500 and I want to add a CD-ROM

■ A The best bet is to try to obtain a secondhand A570 external CD-ROM, if you have a hard drive box with a SCSI connector, Siren's Compaq external SCSI CD-ROM would be a good option for £90. Alfa Data controller owners could take up Golden Image on their quad speed CD-ROM unit which costs £129.00

■ Q I loved your feature on setting up CD-ROM drives. However, I still have lots more questions that I need answering. Please help?

This CD is not the biggest or most comprehensive collection of 3D objects ever but it's certainly the most usable and best presented we've seen.

The 442Mb of data on the CD is accounted for with approximately 24Mb of 24-bit backdrop images, 30Mb of LHA-archived

objects (for use with BBS systems), 9Mb of DEM landscape files, 102Mb of pictures and animations, 10Mb of graphics software, 56Mb of Imagine objects, 24Mb of LightWave objects, 19Mb of preview renders, 3Mb of PostScript fonts and 178Mb of textures.

Instead of having to sift through the contents with a combination of picture viewers and 3D programs you can use the neat AmigaGuide index. This allows you to list and view all the objects, backdrops, landscape DEMs, pictures and animations from one place which makes it easy to get a good overall view

of what's on the disc. The AmigaGuide index uses small or low resolution preview renders from the Prev drawer on the CD. However, some of the objects also have their own preview JPEG renders in their own drawers which tend more detailed.

One of the most entertaining sections, if not the most useful, is the Gallery. This is home to some excellent 3D animations and loads of pictures. Even though the animations are fairly short there are a few gems, like the LightWave rendered campfire complete with crackling sparks, and the Blade Runner sequence also created with LightWave.

So while you may be able to get larger object collections elsewhere, X-Ray 1 offers a good quality, well-rounded CD for general 3D rendering work. At the

moment we don't have details of a UK distributor but there should be quite a few of the regular CD-ROM crowd supplying this one.

The Kara Collection



You've probably come across Kara fonts – they're the multicoloured fonts that seem to get everywhere in Amigaland, all created by the same person, a particularly dedicated Amiga user called Kara. Font fans will be pleased to hear that this CD is the ultimate archive of these colour typefaces, official-

ly compiled by the Personal Paint people at Cloanto. There are 28 colour fonts on the CD included in a number of different sizes, bumping up the total to 80.

One of the most popular uses for colour fonts is within video titles. Anyone looking to go a step further with their titles will be delighted to find a set of special 'anim fonts' on the CD. These are like normal Kara fonts but each letter is stored as an animbrush. These allow you to make up titles that spin around (one letter at a time) or are drawn out on screen as if by hand. The animbrush format allows them to be used with all sensible animation software, including DPaint, PPaint and Brilliance. However, as a special bonus for PPaint users there's an ARexx macro script included on the CD which automates the animation procedure – all you have

to do is select your font, enter the text into a box and the letters are then animated in your chosen style. The final result is a standard animation. These are fun to work with so it's a shame there are only five of these animated fonts.

Two font design programs are also included: Personal Fonts Maker for standard bitmap fonts and Colour Type for colour fonts. The rest of the 650Mb of data on the CD is mainly taken care of with backdrops referred to as 'Plaquegrounds', specifically stone and wood textures with bevelled edges useful for mounting text. A few starfield animations are included too.

Everything is tied together neatly with an AmigaGuide document that not only details what's on the CD, but also launches slideshows and tutorials to give you a better idea of how to use

the contents. Anyone still looking for a complete colour fonts collection need look no further. Should be available from Digita International in the UK soon.

How to use CUCD5



As with prior cover CDs, CUCD5 can be used either by booting on a CD32 or A1200/4000 with adequate CD32 emulation. The CD will not boot under any kickstart earlier than 3.0. If using the CD via Workbench and intending to run software directly off the CD then it's important to first click on the 'Init CD' icon.

This sets up various assigns and makes MUI 3.6 temporarily available if it is not already installed.

It's worth noting that running software directly from CD is a touch-and-go business. While we've gone to a lot of effort to make many programs run from the CD, others may have to be dragged to your hard drive either manually or by running an included installer. 'Init CD' also runs the New Icons patch so don't be surprised if the icons change afterwards.

A word on demos and games

Demos and games are almost never coded in a so-called OS Legal way. That means that while they may work for us, they might not work for you for several reasons. Either your hardware set-up is slightly different or some third party software running on your Amiga may upset the demo or consume resources that the demo/game requires. Please do not assume the CD is 'faulty' if any of this software refuses to run.

There are things you can do to make the software more likely to run. Closing down any exiting running software, screens and such forth will free up resources. It might be better to cut to the chase and copy the demo/game onto your hard drive and then boot with no startup sequence. This involves resetting and holding down both mouse buttons, then press start with no startup-sequence.

You'll then be placed into the AmigaDOS so you'd need to know enough about that aspect of your Amiga to navigate to where the offending software is and run it. As a general rule, if the game or demo still doesn't work then it's incompatible with your machine. Some demos will only ever work when run in this fashion. If you get a requester asking for a specific volume then the software needs 'assigns' set up and so is fairly likely it has an installer that should have been run.



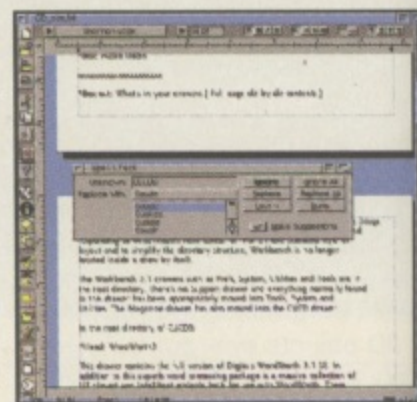
What's in your drawers

When the Super CD 5 icon (called CUCD5) is opened from the Workbench you'll notice that things have changed yet again from CUCD4. We're striving for the best lay-out and responding to what readers have asked for. For a more standard style of layout and to simplify the directory structure, Workbench is no-longer located inside a draw by itself. The Workbench 3.1 drawers such as Prefs, System, Utilities and Tools are in the root directory. There's no Support drawer and everything normally found in this drawer has been appropriately moved into Tools, System and Utilities. The Magazine drawer has also moved into the CUCD drawer.

In the root directory of CUCD5;

Wordworth 3.1

This drawer contains the full version of Digita's WordWorth 3.1 SE. In addition to this superb word processing package is a massive collection of IFF clip art and Intellifont scalable fonts for use with WordWorth. These are housed in the drawers called ClipArt and ExtraFonts. Note that WordWorth 3.1 SE will run from the CD (providing it was booted or InitCD has been run) but it's recommended you install to hard drive with the HD-Install icon.



Worms - The Director's Cut

At last Team 17's Worms gets an update on the Amiga. Even better, this one is the personal baby of the programmer, Andy Davidson and so features a great deal that other platforms will never see. This very special Demo of Worms - The Director's Cut, can also be run on CD32s and CD32 emulation by simply holding down the left mouse button when booting from the CD.

Multiview, Clock and some tools for working with NewIcon images can be found here.

Tools

Contains the Workbench 3.1 tools drawer.

Prefs

The Workbench 3.1 preferences drawer and NewIcon prefs.

System

The 3.1 system drawer in addition to the Support drawer from CUCD4. The latest versions of MUI 3.6, PPSHOW, Visage, Flick, Parnet, NewIcons, HappyENV, GMPlay, Play16, DeliTracker and SuperView are all crammed here to aid access to the rest of the CD.

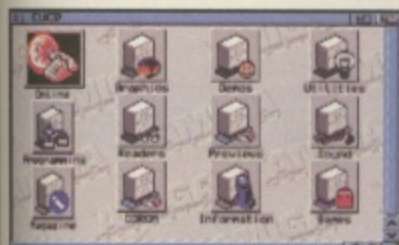

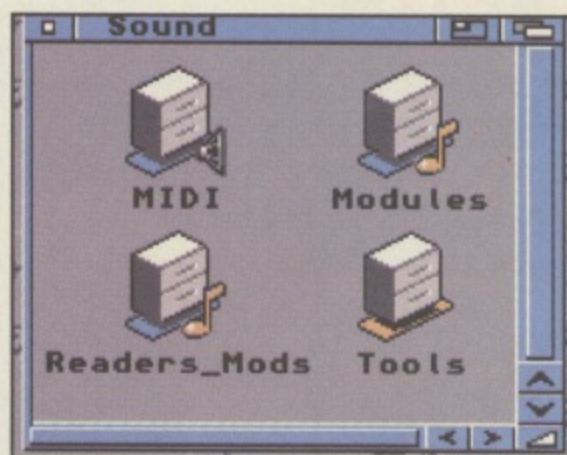

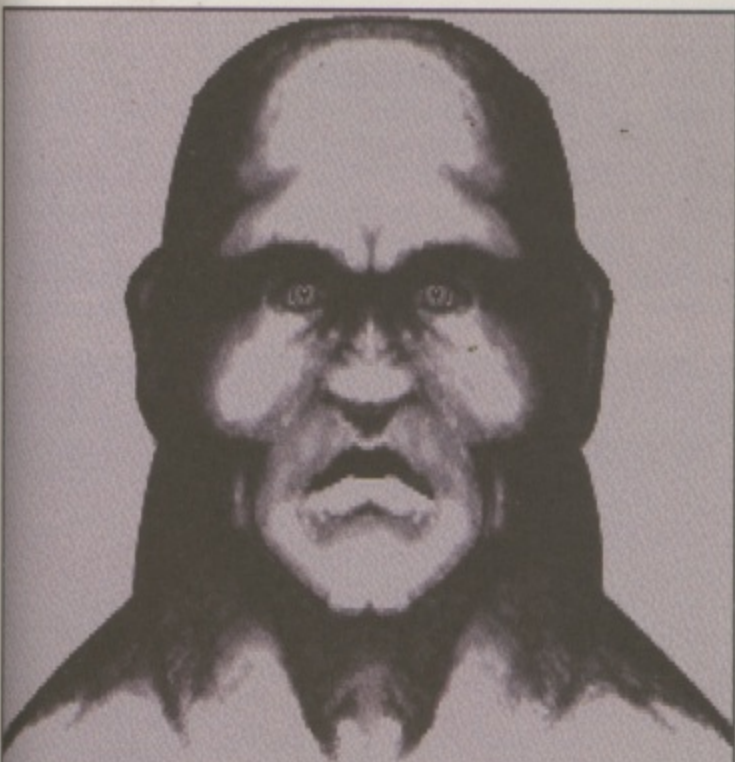

3D Rendering

PART 1 The perfect pair: rendering and the Amiga. Welcome to a new series dedicated to their heavenly union.

Ray tracing and the Amiga go back a long way, as anyone old enough to remember the Juggler demo will tell you. The Amiga was the first affordable computer that could create realistic images out of thin air. To its credit, it was also the first that could display them with enough colours. However, that was a long time ago when the A500 was state-of-the-art and I earned the occasional crust by reviewing awesome hardware such as a 68020 accelerator and unbelievable software like Sculpt3d.

Things have progressed much further since then and rendering is pretty much par for the course, these days, with high profile programs such as Babylon5 and practically all big feature films demonstrating how good computer graphics can look.

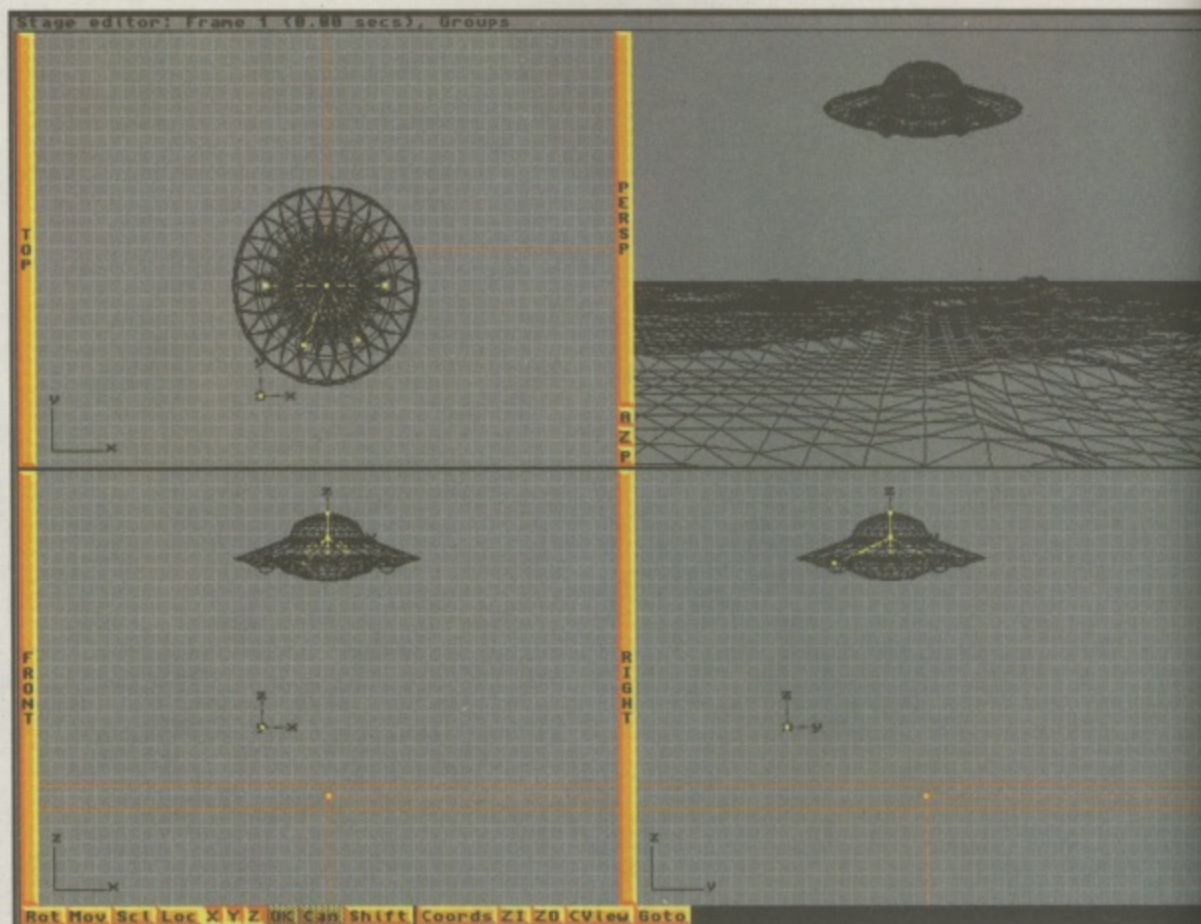
So, in the first of a new series, we take a look at the past and present of image rendering on the Amiga.

What is rendering?

A rendering program takes a three dimensional model held in computer memory and creates a two dimensional image. The model is then created using a special program which allows its shape, colour and other attributes to be altered as the user sees fit.

The model can then be placed in a virtual world, moved around and scaled. Other objects can be included such as light sources to provide illumination, backdrops and the ground. A virtual camera can then be positioned and pointed in the right direction. Finally the image will be rendered, as the computer determines what the camera would 'see'. The image is then displayed or saved to disk.

The sums involved in this process can be extremely complicated and so rendering the image can be a very time consuming task. Even on the fastest Amiga, a detailed high-resolution image can take many hours to create. That said, a simple image in low-resolution can be generated on even an unexpanded A1200 within a few moments.

Ray tracing

Ray tracing is a special case of image rendering. However, not all image rendering is ray traced, far from it. Most of the images you'll see are instead generated with 'scan line' algorithms which calculate how the image appears line by line, pixel by pixel.

For every pixel the computer arranges the objects by depth and then calculates which the camera would see. It takes into account the colour and texture of the objects and how any light reaching them will make them appear.

Ray tracing works slightly differently to the scan line method. Instead, every pixel in the display is imagined as a beam of light reaching the camera. The software then traces it back into the scene, calculating how it will have been reflected off surfaces or distorted by passing through transparent objects.

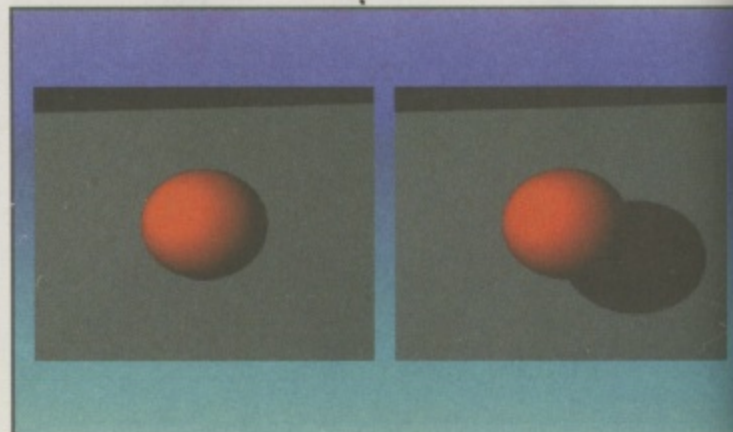
Ray tracing takes a lot longer than scan line algorithms but it makes it possible to accurately create shadows and complicated optical effects. A lot of the time

you won't need to use Ray tracing until the very end of the creation process and even then, it still may not be necessary.

Animation

A rendered scene can be impressive, but images really start to come alive when they are animated. A moving scene has real depth, with objects in the foreground moving faster than objects in the background.

Most rendering packages are designed to deal with animations. They allow objects to be

Desirable Hardware

If you are serious about image rendering, you'll need to splash out on a little, or maybe a lot of extra hardware. The complexity of the rendering process means that a fast processor is essential, so aim for a fast 68030 or better. A maths-compressor (FPU) will make a large difference, because all rendering programs will detect and make use of the faster maths abilities.

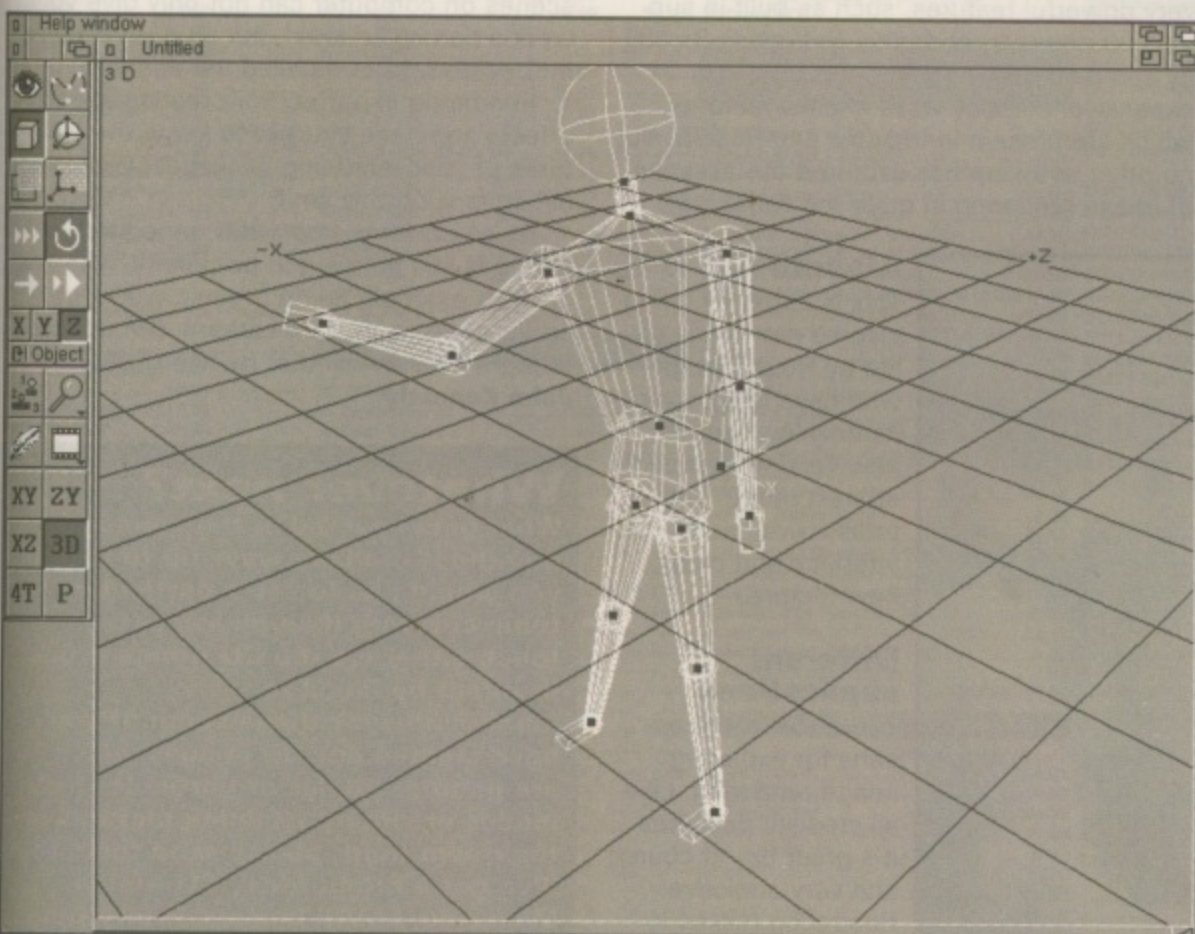
Memory is important too, especially if you are dealing with complicated models, lots of textures or high-resolution images. As much as possible is the general rule, but try for at least 8Mb. If you are interested in creating animations, the more memory you have the better: more ram means longer and smoother playback.

A hard drive is so useful I shouldn't have to even mention it. Having to load and save objects and images to and from floppy is such a tedious business it can quickly drain you of any creativity. Put it high on your list.

'key framed': for example, in frame one a car may be on the left of the screen. In frame 100 it may be on the right. The in-between frames are calculated by the rendering software.

There's a lot more to it than that of course. Cameras and light sources can move too: your camera can fly through a cityscape for example, whilst the sun rises and sets. Or the objects themselves can change over time: altering their shape, colour and textures.

The best rendering packages allow objects to move in realistic ways by allowing them to be linked in a hierarchy: for example, given a human hand object constructed from a disk

and five cylinders, it should be possible to move the hand in one go rather than having to move all the parts individually.

What's on offer?

There are still a reasonable number of image rendering packages available for the Amiga and most are still in development. Some have been with the Amiga for as long as it has existed, others are relatively new. All of

them are capable of creating excellent images however.

Imagine

Imagine is one of the original image rendering programs on the Amiga, having been called 'Turbo Silver' in its previous lives. It's currently in release 4.5 (the .5 was merited by the addition of ARexx and CyberGraphics support).

Imagine is an excellent package, although it can seem more than a little complicated to beginners. Once you get the hang of its multiple editor screen approach though, it becomes reasonably easy to use. Imagine's vast library of special textures are nothing short of fantastic. If there was one problem with Imagine, it would be its non-standard Amiga interface. It doesn't look or act at all like an Amiga program: in fact, the PC version is identical in all respects.

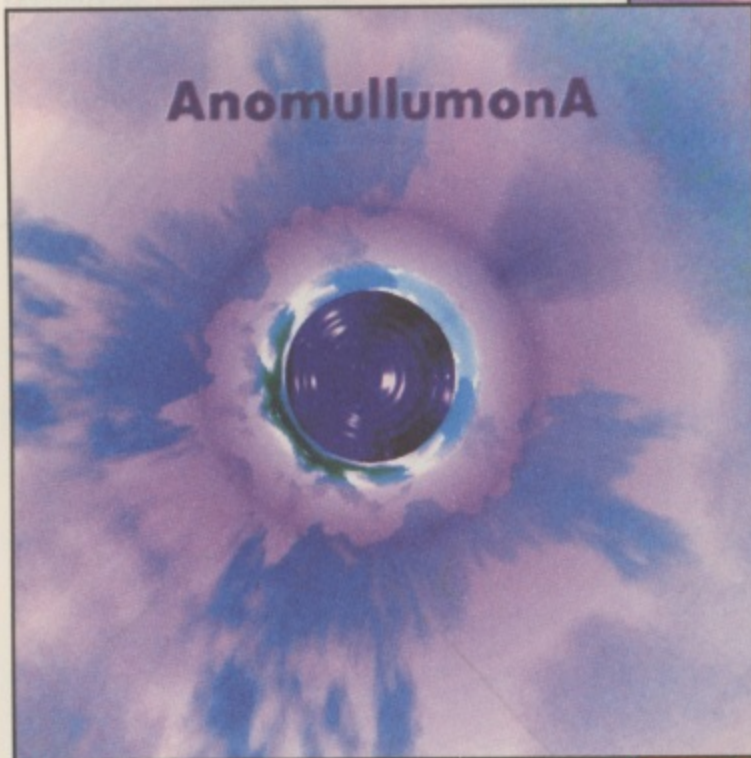
Cinema4D

Cinema4D is the most recent package and it's being distributed by HiSoft in the UK. Its user interface is very modern and a complete contrast from Imagine. Like Imagine though, objects are built up using tiny surfaces called 'facets'. This makes it possible to create extremely accurate copies of real objects, although it can take quite a while. Cinema4D has a very easy to use inverse kinematics system which makes it easy to animate complicated objects, such as human figures. There are other nice touches, such as the fractal object animator which makes it a five second job to manufacture complicated landscapes.

Real3D

Real3D works in a different way from other packages in that objects are constructed

from primitive objects which can be manipulated in many different ways. It can be easier for the beginner, because it's a lot like making models from clay or modelling bricks.

The hierarchical structure used by Real3D is also superb, as every object can be easily planned and constructed from smaller parts. However, the most amazing feature is the ability of Real3D to deal with objects as though they were real: objects can have 'mass' and when 'pushed' they react realistically. This makes animation easy, for example a pile of bricks will collapse in a very convincing way.

LightWave

LightWave is the tool of the professional and it really put the Amiga on the rendering map. Originally part of the VideoToaster bundle, LightWave is currently a stand-alone product and is at release four on the Amiga. Although it might appear a pretty ordinary package, the images it produces are incredibly smart: good enough to be used in

Babylon5, Star Trek and Seaquest.

LightWave is easy to use and offers some very powerful features, such as built-in support for network rendering. Reflecting its ability and pedigree, LightWave is also very expensive. In many ways it lacks features which are present in Imagine and Real3D, but no other software has captured the essence of image rendering in quite the same way.

Aladdin 4D

This is currently being given a new lease of life by Nova Design who have taken over its development. A new version is expected next month with a totally revamped interface and many new features.

Different applications

There are many reasons for exploring image rendering. Like all creative pastimes it's great fun of course and very addictive. Rendering makes it possible to create amazing animations.

For example, if you are keen on making your own pop videos or short films, generating scenes on computer can not only give your work a particular 'look', but also save a lot of money on sets or detailed models.

Rendering is perfect for creating special effects and once you get to know the features of your rendering packages, your imagination is your only limit.

As an art form, computer generated rendering is still growing in popularity, with one obvious example being organic works of artists such as William Latham. (What, you thought he drew all that by hand?) ■

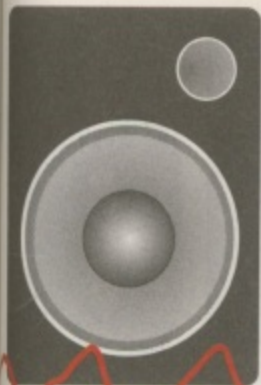

Sound Lab

Is your music sounding a bit lifeless and limp? Try breathing some life back into it with some thumping, adrenalin-rushing build ups.

You can't beat a good crescendo. Whatever style of music you're making, if you want to get the blood boiling and bang up the excitement level then a powerful build up is winner every time. In fact it's a technique that's been used as far back as the original classical composers, and even dating back to the most primitive tribal rituals. But good music never dies, it just comes back with a different width of trouser leg and new hairstyle, proof of which is the presence of crescendos in just about all forms of modern music, even if they're more popular in some styles than others.

So how do they work? Basically the idea is that the music builds up from something fairly minimal to a feverish state of excitement. Once it reaches its peak, it might then drop right back down to basics again, sustain the intensity, kick in with some bass or a riff, or shoot off in a completely different direction. There's no single formula for creating a crescendo but there are a few techniques that can be easily adapted to suit your requirements. Let's take a look some of them.

Techniques

Snare rolls. We'll get this one out of the way first. The biggest

cliché in house and techno over the last year or two has been the long snare drum roll that fades up over 8, 16 or 32 bars, with snare drums placed on every quarter beat. It works in a club but frankly it's been done to death and if individuality means anything to you, you'll want to steer clear of this. That's not to say you can't use drums for the job. Gradually layering up rhythm tracks is a good way to hype things up.

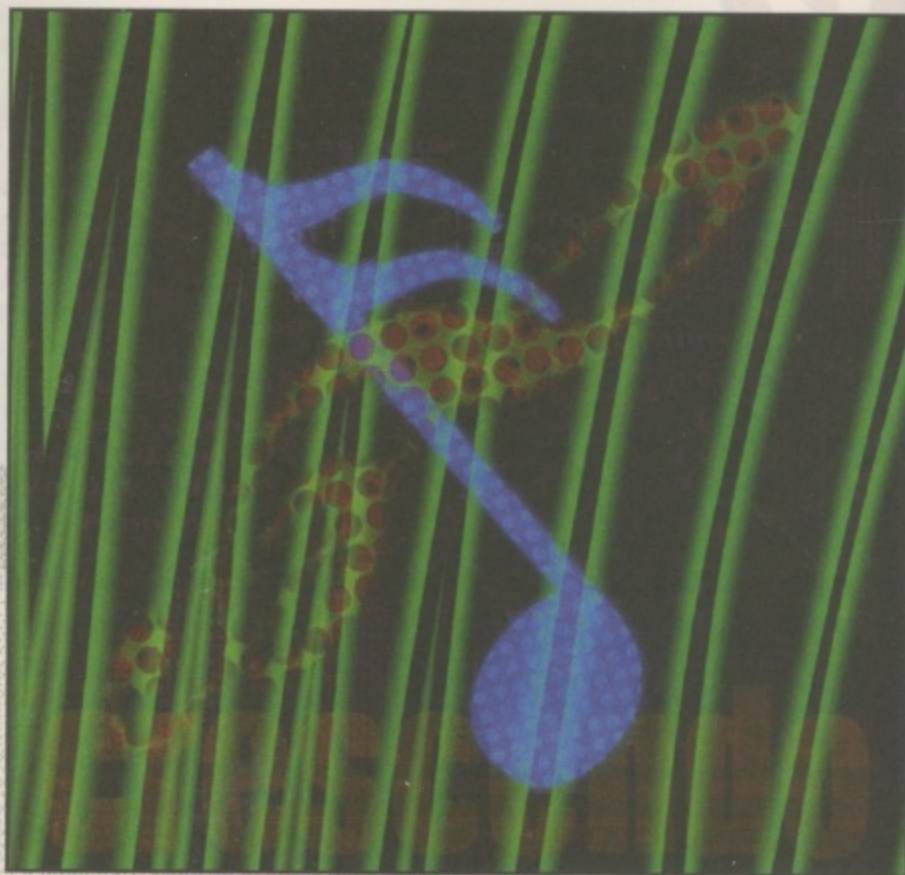
Crank it up

Increasing intensity. This is open to your own interpretation and ideas and can take on a range of forms. If you're fortunate enough to have an outboard synth you can alter the parameters of a sound using sliders and knobs or with MIDI control data from your sequencer. Cranking up the level of certain effects works well (distortion or echoes for example) and if you've got an analogue synth you can push the resonance control to max, then increase the filter cut-off from minimum to maximum. That works well on chord sequences as well as the more obvious acid riffs. If you're really lucky and have the facility to pass an audio signal through an analogue filter you can come up with all kinds of weird variations on this idea. Try it with vocals, drums, even the entire mix.

Bangin' mate, nice one!

The world of techno has spawned many classic and highly influential records which have used the crescendo to create stunning effects. Underworld's 'Rez' is a brilliant example of a long relentless build up, while Jam and Spoon's main remix of Age of Love's self-titled track pioneered the raw resonant filter crescendo. Check Size 9's "I am Ready" for the original over the top snare roll and the too-classic-for-words 'Acperience 1' by Hardfloor for the acid drop-out and build up blueprint now used by so many others.

Introducing elements. If you choose your sounds well, so that they all have their own space in the overall mix, you can go on introducing new sounds every few bars for quite a while before it gets clogged up. One of the best ways to do this is to start off with a good minimal section that's maybe a bit strange, or particularly catchy or funky. If this part is good enough, everything else that's dropped over the top should sound like a bonus and take the track to another level.

Trade secrets

It's worth bearing in mind that if you want to build to a crescendo, then bang in with an addition part, you'll need to leave a suitable gap in the audio spectrum during the build-up. If the build up is more intense than what follows, you risk spoiling the whole effect with an anticlimax. The trick is to make the audience think the track has got as intense, loud and climactic as possible, then blow their heads

off with a new element, such as the bass for example. On the other hand, you can be a bit more devious with your use of a build-up, using it as a turning point to skew your track off in a different direction, which can be even more dramatic than crashing in with a killer riff. If it's done well, it's a bit like having a bucket of cold water thrown in your face, sort of.

There are all kinds of tricks you can use. It's worth checking out some masters of the art for inspiration. Jean Michel Jarre has a few good examples on his live Rendezvous Houston album, Brian Transeau and the rest of the 'epic house' brigade do a nice line in extremely long sweeping builds, Spicelab's recent 'Feathers' single is a top example of subtle builds and offshoots, and check out any of Hardfloor's self-parodying remixes for the more conventional acid build ups. ■

Wired World

PART 17 Getting down to the nitty gritty, here's how you can find out all those little extra details about who you are talking to on the Net.



It's one thing providing material for everyone to look at on the Web, but it's quite another if you'd like to learn anything about the people who are viewing the fruits of your work. What we need is a way for people to be able to enter details, make selections and such forth and then be able to send it to us. Normally this is impossible for dial-up Internet users but with a few tricks we can bend HTML 'Forms' to make it happen for us.

So what exactly are Forms and how do we get the data? If you've been on the Web you won't have missed them - they are those

gadgets, buttons and text boxes which require data to be entered into them. There's usually a 'submit' button at the bottom which when pressed sends the data off instantly. The Web site then can act upon that data instantly. However, since dial-up accounts users don't usually have access to special 'CGI' binaries which normally process the data, we need another trick to process the information.

For the purpose of this tutorial we'll be using a special type of Form which will actually Email the data to your account since every dial-up user has this function. Unfortunately, this means we must rely on the Amiga

browsers having their 'mailto:' function properly configured. With Voyager and AWeb this relies on scripts which activate external programs. IBrowse has it built in. For this reason, some kind of warning note above the Forms would be a good idea.

Complex beasts

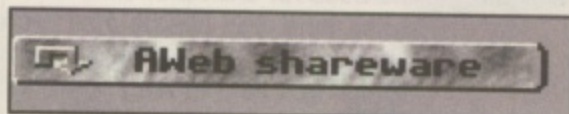
Forms are quite complex beasts but are certainly worthwhile adding to your HTML skills. In simple terms, a Form must start off with a <FORM> tag. It must then be followed by a METHOD and ACTION attribute. The kind of <FORM> we need would be as follows;

OU-EE-GUI

Now let's get onto the real meat of the matter. Here's the different GUI elements of Forms listed with examples;

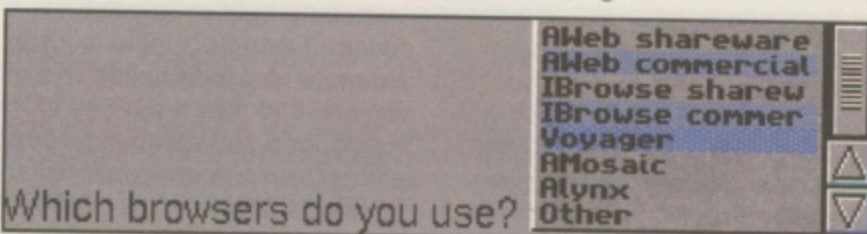
SELECT:

The first real GUI function. Normally this creates a pop-down lister but it's also a cycle gadget. You specify the choices and the user must pick one of them. For this reason, it needs some nested code within the select statement, easiest explained with an example;

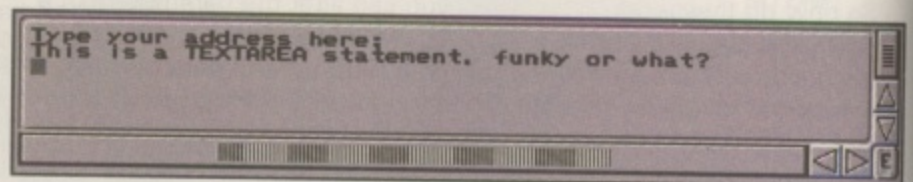

Here the data item will be named 'browser' and the user will be able to pick from any of the browsers listed above. When one of them is selected, the data item 'browser' will be filled with the value specified with the value attribute, rather than the full name. We've specified SELECTED on the AWeb 2.x item which means that the cycle gadget/pop-down lister will default to that setting.



<SELECT> also sports a special attribute called 'MULTIPLE' and if this is enabled, instead of a pop-down lister/cycle gadget, a lister appears with all the selections and they may be multi-selected in the browser. The lister will be equipped with scroll gadgets but you may set the size with a SIZE attribute. IE <SELECT NAME="browser" MULTIPLE SIZE=10>



TEXTAREA:

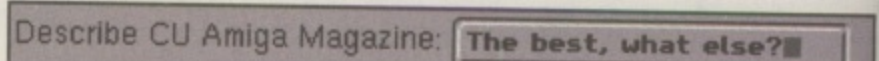
The TEXTAREA type creates a mini text editor window on the browser. As usual it needs a NAME field but also needs to be told the number of ROWS and COLS for the rows and columns. Text can usually be typed beyond these limits as the editor should scroll. For example;

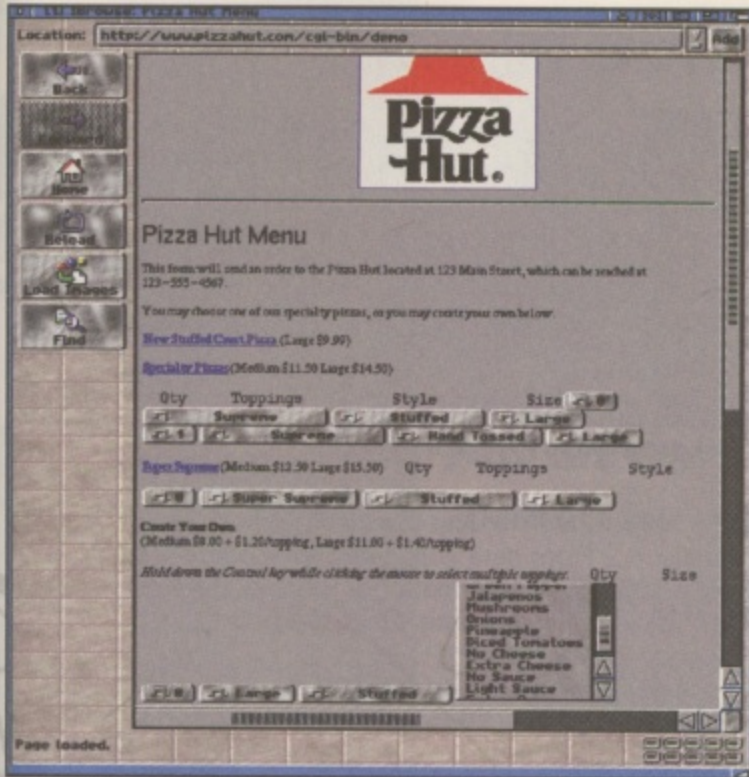

Next, TYPES of <INPUT> tags. All of these functions are accessed by specifying a TYPE within <INPUT> like <INPUT TYPE=xxx>. The following are a list of handy functions that you can use for your Forms;

TEXT:

The obvious Form element is a text box which needs filling out with data. This is also the default so if you don't specify the TYPE, a TEXT type is assumed. There are three attributes and they are,

This tag will mail the data to joe@thenet.co.uk, (obviously insert your own Email address here). If you're the lucky owner of an SMTP mail type account

then you could dedicate a unique Email box for Form data. Otherwise just use your standard Email address.

We need to follow this line with the Form code itself. This is made up from <INPUT> tags which ask for certain types of information and name them. The named data is then Emailed when the Form is submitted. First, we need a special <INPUT> tag to identify the Form when we use an Arexx script afterwards to make the results readable;

```
<INPUT TYPE=HIDDEN →
NAME="formid"→
VALUE="first">
```

GUI devices

The above <INPUT> tag shows the three attributes normally used for each input gadget. First there is the type of GUI device we're using, next the name of the data item and thirdly the default value of the data item. In this case the browsers will not display or ask for information since the type is 'hidden'. The reason for this is that we are specifying a data item 'formid' and making it equal to the name of our form. The name doesn't matter but you must make it unique to each of the forms you create.

Now let's look at a real live example and what it will do; (→ means don't hit return.)

MAXLENGTH which specifies the maximum amount of characters the user can type, SIZE which sets the size in characters of the text box (defaults to MAXLENGTH) and VALUE which is the initial value. An example would be;

```
<INPUT NAME="uname" MAXLENGTH=10>

HIDDEN:

With TYPE=HIDDEN, the user doesn't interact, instead the VALUE attribute specifies the value of the data item of name NAME. An example is given earlier, this is necessary at the start of each of our forms if the Arexx script, looked at later, will be able to identify the data out of your Email box.

RADIO:

Radio gadgets are simple on/off buttons. This can be used either singly or by using multiple statements with the same NAME. This will mean only ONE of the options can be picked. Example;

```
<P>Which Browser is the best?
<INPUT TYPE=RADIO NAME=browser CHECKED
VALUE="Aweb">Aweb is best<br>

Note here that in this example there will be two buttons (ie you choose between Aweb or lbrowse) but you may only click on Aweb or lBrowse. Depending which is selected, the appropriate VALUE will then be sent. You can specify which is the default with an additional CHECKED attribute.

CHECKBOX:

Same as the above except that you may select any, all or none of the settings.

RESET:

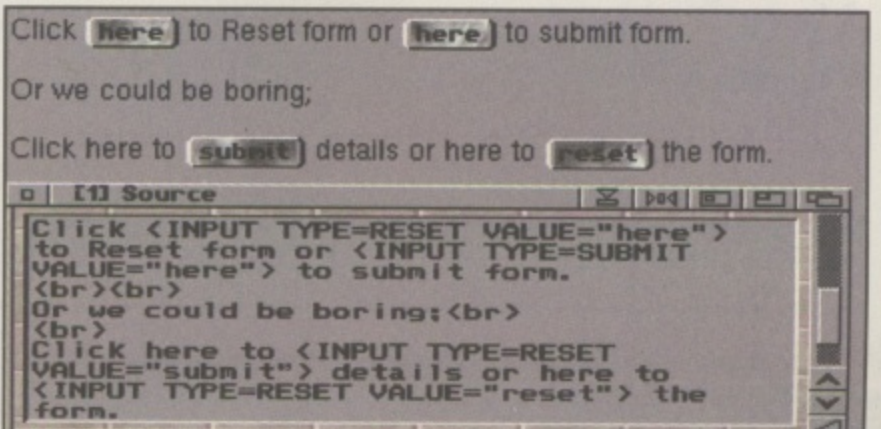
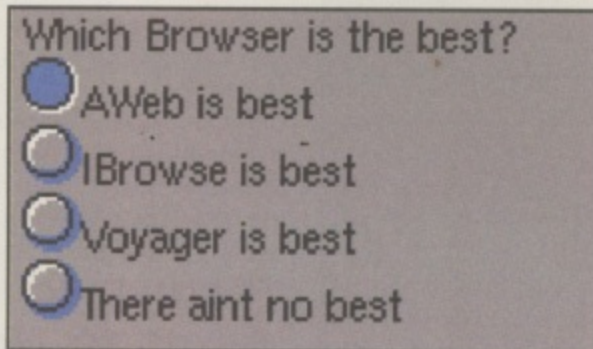
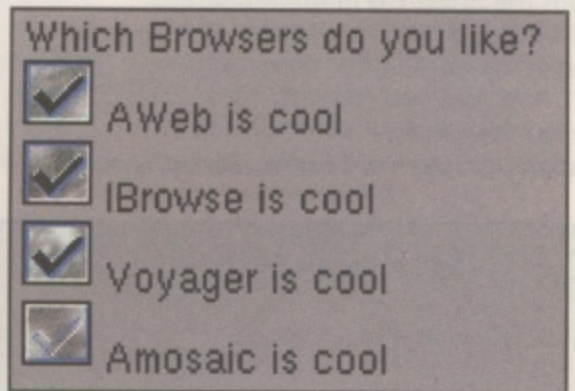
This is a special TYPE which returns/resets all of the Form to it's initial default state. This time VALUE sets the label of the button rather than a value. You could use it like this;

SUBMIT:

Finally, you'll need a button to press which will send the contents of the Form, specifically to Email it in this case. Again VALUE sets the label of the button like;

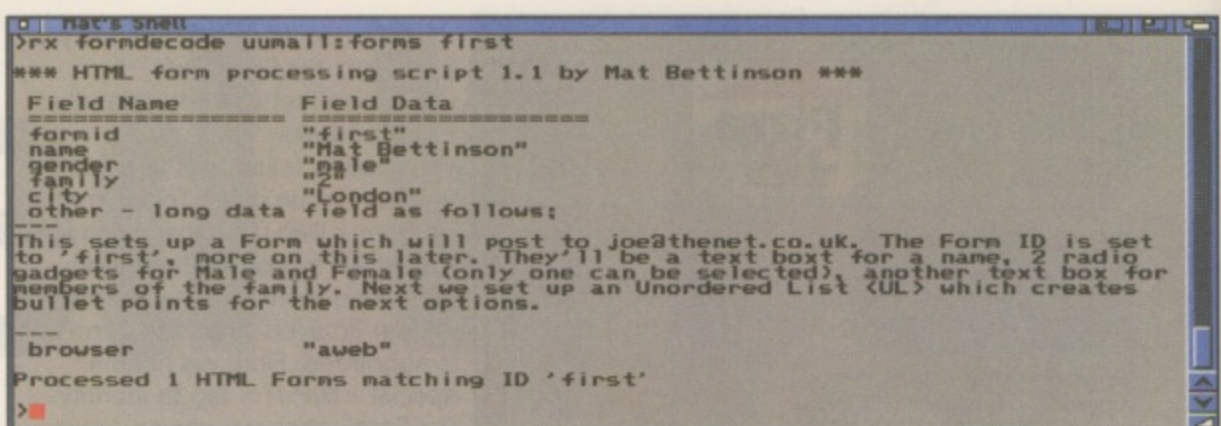

This listing sets up a Form which will post information to joe@thenet.co.uk (fill in your address here, of course). The Form ID is set to 'first', (we'll cover this later). There'll be a text box for a name, two radio gadgets for Male and Female (only one can be selected), another text box for members of the family. After that there'll be an Unordered List which will create bullet points for the next options such as checkboxes for which city you live in. The third option is 'other' which will sport a text box of 48 x 4 characters in size. Finally, we'll round up with a browser cycle gadget/pull-down menu and two buttons, one for clearing the form and one for sending it. Try out this example or get it from the cover CD in the Magazine/WiredWorld directory where you can locate it at

Making it readable

Unfortunately, when the mailto: Form data is sent to your Email address it will make no sense at all. It will appear something like this: the form name1=data1&name2=data2... and so on across a single line. Spaces will be converted to '+' signs and all other characters will be converted to % codes representing the ASCII code in hex. Not something you can read easily.

However, with the aid of a Rexx script, the text can be converted to a more readable form. We've provided the script on this month's cover disk in the Wired World directory and on the CD in the Magazine/WiredWorld directory. Called FormDecode.rexx, naturally it assumes that RexxMast is running and it's executed from the AmigaDOS shell. To begin copy the FormDecode.rexx script into your rexx: assign and adhere to the following.

Saving out Email

First, what you need to do is to save out all of the text related to the forms. You may have it separate anyway if you're using an SMTP account. Otherwise, simply mark all of your

Email (or just the messages you know to be Form data posts) and save out as a text file. It's then a matter of running the ARexx script on the resulting text as follows;

```
rx FormDecode <Name of Text File>
<Form ID or ALL> [QUIET]
```

The first argument will be the full pathname to the text file previously saved out. The Form ID should match the Form ID created with the very first <INPUT TYPE=HIDDEN NAME="formid" VALUE="xxx"> line where the Form ID should match 'xxx' here. This allows you to only view data matching a particular form. You can also specify ALL here if you'd like to view all of the Form data as you can tell which relates to what, as seen later.

QUIET switch

Finally there's a QUIET switch which is optional. Insert this at the end and the script will print out less formatting and statistics. This is useful if you want to redirect the text to a file and don't want the extras. Here's a couple of examples;

```
rx FormDecode ram:EMail.txt ALL
rx FormDecode ram:Email.txt first
QUIET >ram:Results.txt
```

The first example will scan the text file ram:EMail.txt and print all found Form data to the shell. The second will scan the text file for the specific questionnaire Form example provided earlier, print nothing but the data and output to a text file in ram:Results.txt. Just the business for perhaps another script to compile statistics? Which is beyond this tutorial, but a little Arexx can go a long long way.

What to do with it

So what could you do with your new found Forms knowledge? Everything from running a club, asking people for their address to send them details, the obvious questionnaires and even selling products of your own on the Internet. The best way to get up to speed is to experiment with your own Forms and view them locally in a browser. You can always post them to yourself if you're on-line.

Next month we'll cover some advanced HTML text formatting techniques including so-called 'Tables'. Until then, stay in Form and keep on webbing. ■

FCI and Demon Form script

Shortly after this month's Wired World went to press, we discovered CGI scripts for Forms on both InternetFCI and Demon, the subject of the tutorial this month (see pages 84-86). Using this new method negates the need for the ARexx script as detailed in the tutorial. For InternetFCI, the <FORM> tag needs to be changed to something like the following:

```
<FORM METHOD=POST
ACTION="http://www.thenet.co.uk/cgi-bin/ifci-mail-form.pl? joe@thenet.co.uk=Subject">
```

Please note that this example needs to be all on a single line, so don't hit return on line breaks. Also, change 'joe@thenet.co.uk' to your own Email address and change 'Subject' to the subject of the Form data Email.

Using this version, if someone fills out your Form and hits submit, you will then be Emailed the Form data in an easy-to-read form. Since you have the ability to set the Subject field, it would be also possible for YAM and other mailers to sort the mails into a separate folder for even easier processing.

Demon's script is a much more simple beast however, for example;

will post the Form data to webmaster@yourdomain.demon.co.uk so for this reason it's important that you are able to process Email to the webmaster on your system.

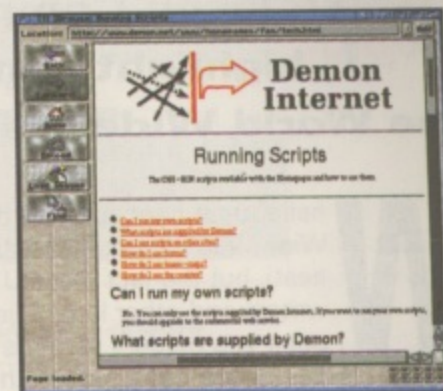
IBrowse gets update

Last month we reviewed AWeb 2.1 and IBrowse 1.0. At the time of press, IBrowse had stability problems such as crashes when exiting the program. However, CU Amiga Magazine are pleased to announce that HiSoft have now released an upgrade batch to 1.02 on IBrowse author Stefan's site at <http://www.efd.lth.se/~f94sbu/ibrowse/> and we can happily report that IBrowse now seems far more stable. After a week of solid use there wasn't so much as a Task Held on the CU Amiga office machines.

Congratulations to Omnipresence for sorting the programming out. This now means the Amiga Browser competition is neck and neck once again.

Dal.net is go

Regular IRC goers can't have escaped the fact that the Efnetwork, where the busiest #Amiga channel resides, is a little flakey at times. Netsplits and severe lags have become an increasing problem and the permanent US/Euro split doesn't help matters either. Other networks are better in this regard but suffer because they aren't as popular as Efnetwork. However, the newest IRC network, Dalnet, seems to be making inroads popularity wise and sports advanced features such as registering your nickname and channel. This means that channel take-

overs will become virtually impossible and no-one will be able to steal your nickname.

Currently, the most popular Amiga channel is #AmIRC, which is named after the popular Amiga IRC client. HiQ's Siamese site

And since the implementation of the Agnes search tool, there's virtually no Amiga topic that you can't find information on from the CUCUG site. Plug: Agnes will even search back issues of Amiga Report, and CUCUG has an extensive back-issue collection of the digital magazine.

CUCUG will get you to almost anywhere else you want to go for Amiga related informa-

tion, but there's a new page that's worth at least an honourable mention where Amigas are concerned. It's not much to look at, but the Freely Distributable Datatypes Page has the best treasure trove of OS 3.x datatypes I've ever seen. Datatypes are little routines that sit in the background and automatically convert file types for use with various software packages, including Web browsers.

Palmtop Page

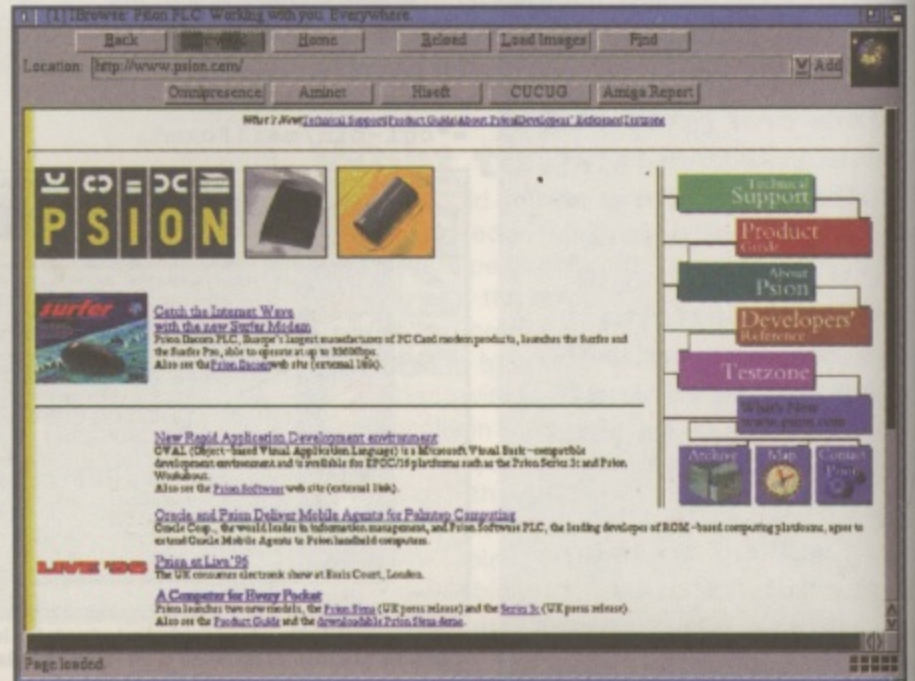
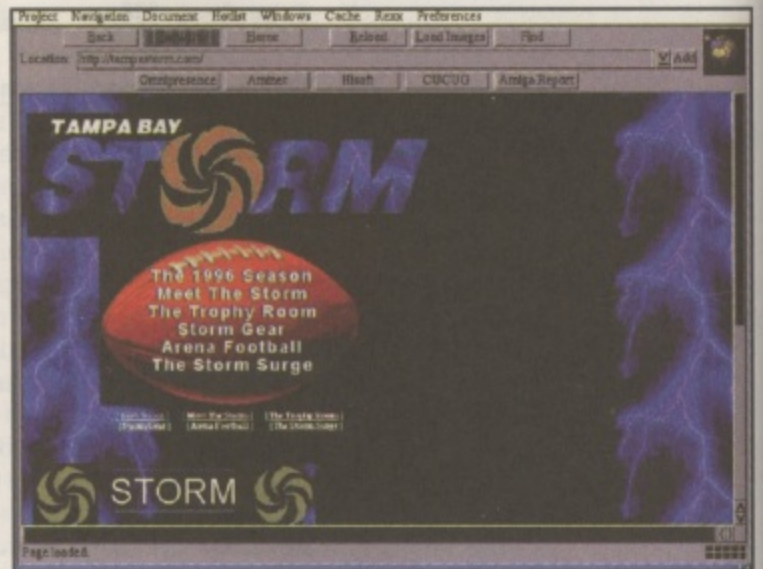
When I'm doing serious computing, I'm using an Amiga. But when I'm out and about, I sometimes feel the need to write a quick document, make an appointment record, or just play a good game. That's why I picked up a Psion palmtop computer (or PDA as they're often called) from the UK company of the same name (as featured in the previous issue of CU Amiga Magazine). In the field of palmtops, the Psions have one of the best operating systems and built-in software around, and they have the extra advantages of being easy to program (there's the aforementioned games, including a full-blown Infocom interpreter so you can play any of the dozens of

classic text adventures out there while you commute) and they're exceptionally easy to network to an Amiga. Check out <http://www.pSION.com> for more information on these neat devices.

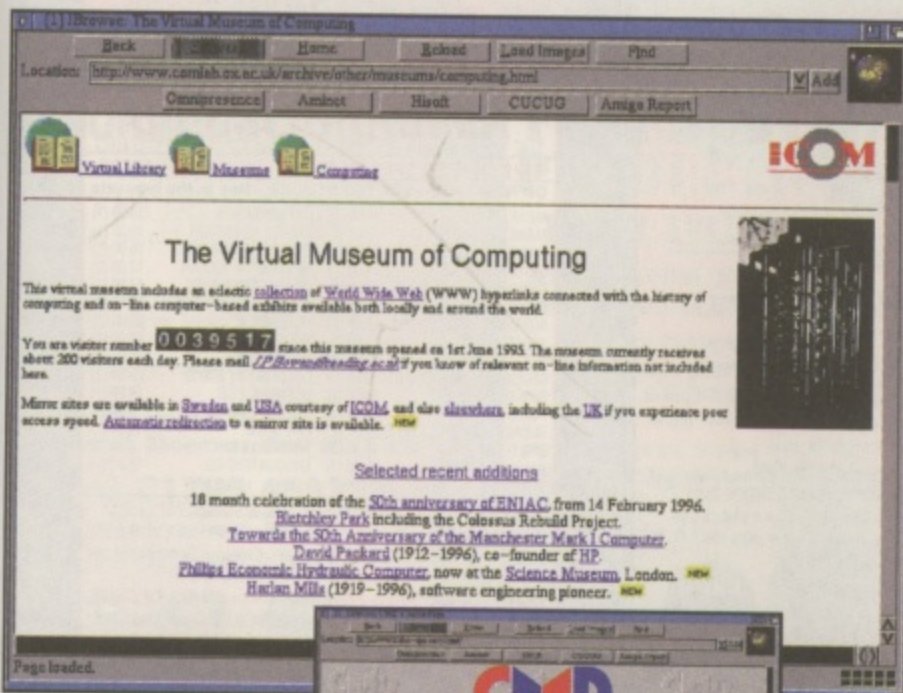
Euro-US Football

Blake's 7

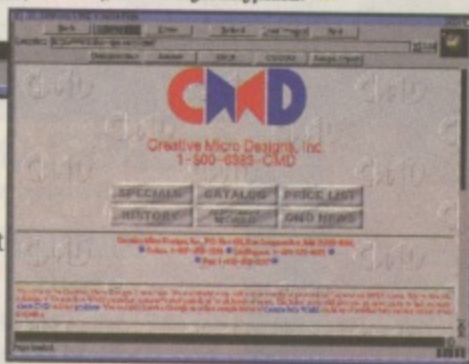

For the ultimate reference guides on television and film check out the Internet Movie Database, <http://www.imdb.com>.

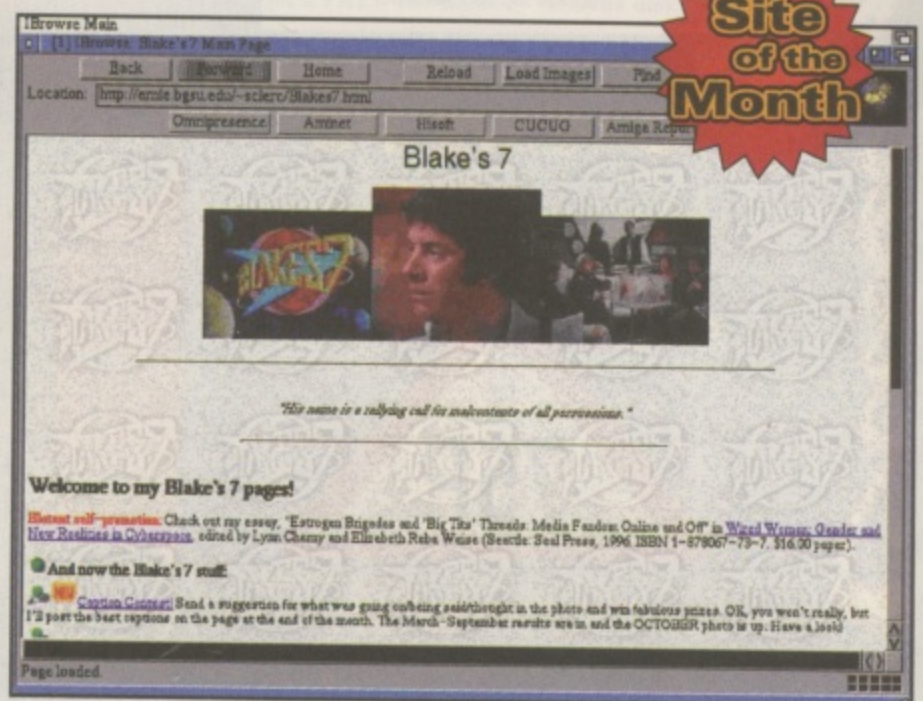

You'd be surprised what you can learn by simply punching up a favourite actor, actress, or director and investigating their earlier works which are presented for you.



C-64 Lives!

The "C" in CU Amiga hasn't stood for Commodore for quite some time, but the origins of the magazine are indeed rooted in Commodore 64 history. If you're out there and still use your C-64, or you're interested in the recent history of the machine, stop by Creative Micro Design's web site at <http://www.the-spa.com/cmd>.

CMD have been designing C-64 peripherals and software for over 10 years and have done some truly amazing things with the old work-horse. How does a 1 gig hard drive, 16 megs of memory and a 20mhz accelerator grab you? Not as nice as a CyberStorm 060 card, I'll bet, but they're still impressive feats on a C-64,



and CMD will gladly sell you those exact items, along with software, high density 3.5" floppies, and much more to go along with it.

If all this has got you reminiscing, don't miss the opportunity to brush up on some more computer history (<http://www.comlab.ox.ac.uk/archive/other/museums/computing.html>). There are sites all over the world that deal with the past decades of technological development, and this is one of the best places to get started.

You'll find dozens of links to various stories, glossaries, biographies, and anecdotes about the past half-century or so of the growth of 'thinking machines'.

FAQ

Frequently Asked Questions

Budding animators and film makers take note. The Amiga and video are the perfect creative combination.

Q. Why is the Amiga so good for video work?

A. The Amiga was always designed to work with a TV set as its primary display. Back in the 1980s the Amiga was designed to be a games console and home computer and as few people had the money to buy a dedicated VDU or monitor, the TV was first choice. As a result, the Amiga has a video friendly output which can be used in RGB or Composite video modes for great results.

Q. How do I connect to my video recorder to record Amiga graphics?

A. It depends on your model of Amiga but A1200s have a phono-style socket for Composite video. Some video recorders have an input socket (often designed for use with Camcorders) called 'CV' or 'Composite in'. Others have Scart sockets which you'll need a Scart adaptor lead for.

A500s and A2000s have RGB outputs but you'll need a modulator or a genlock to record the output onto video tape.

Q. What's the difference between RGB and Composite? What's RF? And what's SVHS then?

A. RF is the 'Radio Frequency' signal. This is the easiest, though not the best quality, way for the video recorder to display a picture on a TV as it is a low-power TV signal transmitter. All the signals – sound, colour, luminance – are combined into one. An Amiga

fitted with a modulator (like the one shipped and used with most A500s) does the same thing. Composite video contains all the video information in one cable, whereas RGB keeps the colours separate (Red, Green, Blue). It produces a better picture than composite and is used mainly with monitors and good TVs where the three colour signals are fed directly into the three video guns which make up the display. A composite signal must be first split into the three colours again, which affects quality.

SVHS is important when recording as it divides the video information into colour and brightness (chrominance and luminance). The CD32 is the only Amiga with an SVHS output, although some genlocks provide an SVHS output. SVHS is the best quality video signal available for home use. VCRs which support SVHS recording provide images which are much clearer than standard VHS.

Q. Can't I make use of the better RGB signals with my video? It's fitted with a Scart socket round the back.

A. Although the pins are in the schematic of the Scart socket, few video recorders implement RGB input. Yes, they'll send out RGB for display on TVs but don't accept incoming RGB signals.

Q. What will the Amiga let me do with my video?

A. You can record anything the Amiga can display, which means

you can create title pages, scrolling credits, sub-titles, animations, your own cartoons ...

Q. Which screen mode should I use?

A. Always use a PAL screen mode, such as HIRES PAL. It's sometimes OK to use Interlaced mode – although it flickers on a monitor it can look good when recorded on video tape.

Q. How can I create sub-titles?

A. You'll need a genlock for that. It's a piece of hardware connected to the Amiga's video output. It allows the Amiga graphics to 'overlay' the live video: for example, you can overlay a black rectangle containing white text and create subtitles.

Q. How can I display computer graphics 'behind' the live video?

A. For that sort of effect you need an extra box of tricks called a 'Chromakey' which can electronically remove certain colours from video and replace it with a computer generated backdrop: such as a weathermap for example.

Q. How can I create animated subtitles and scrolling end credits?

A. Use an Amiga art program such as Deluxe Paint or Personal Paint. An authoring system such as CanDo is excellent for linking together multiple animations.

Alternatively use a dedicated video titling program such as Scala which will provide excellent text and scrolling features. Dedicated video titles often come with their own special fonts which

look very smart indeed on video.

If you want to record very long animations, use a program such as Viewtek which can spool animations directly from disk. So for example, you could create a huge animation with Imagine and then use Viewtek to play it back whilst you are recording it all on your video recorder. Happy day!

Q. How do I get rid of the ugly borders around the screen?

A. Use OVERSCAN. Paint programs will allow you to open a screen in Overscan mode and this will stretch the screen out on all directions so there is no border. It's therefore possible to create animations and display pictures which fill the entire video screen.

Q. On my Amiga can I control editing between two video recorders/a VCR and a camcorder?

A. Yes, there are various hardware/software packs around which can achieve this. For more details see some of the specific video based magazines available.

Q. Can I digitise live video, edit it and then play it back?

A. Yes, but not easily. This is 'non-linear video editing'. For best results you'll need a very fast Amiga fitted with a huge SCSI hard drive and a hardware M/JPEG capture and replay board. VLAB Motion is one such card.

You can get a budget version called VideoMaster from Eyeteck (tel 01642 713 185) which will record quarter-sized screens in 16 colours. Not broadcast quality, but excellent fun nevertheless. ■

Masterclass

PART 4 Which is the most important file on your Workbench disk? We reckon it's the startup sequence and here's why.

Ever wondered what the wait was for when your floppy or hard drive booted? Or why the same requester 'Please insert...' keeps popping up asking for a disk you haven't got? All is explained ...

S Revisited

Although we have touched on it before, the S directory is so important, it's worth taking another look at its contents. The far left screenshot on page 97 illustrates what you will see if you open up the S directory on a Workbench 3 machine. You'll need to use the Window menu and pick Show... All Files to see the contents of S, because by default the files do not have any icons attached to them. If you have Directory Opus 4 (which we gave away on the on February 95's cover disk) use it to view the text files in S, it's easier.

For the purpose of this tutorial we'll look at exactly what S contains and will go on to explain what the various files do.

Startup sequence

This is the most important file of all. When the Amiga starts to boot up after being switched on, it looks in the S: directory to see if startup-sequence is present. If it is, it loads it and then starts executing the list of AmigaDOS commands it contains.

Several very important things are done by the startup-sequence, including patching any bugs in the operating systems, setting the keymap used by the keyboard, creating important directories and copying files to the RAM disk. Eventually, startup-sequence loads the Workbench environment.

The list on the right shows what a typical startup-sequence looks like. I've added the line numbers — they aren't present in the file. (See Figure 1).

The following is an explanation what some of the more important lines are doing in the sequence:

[3] Use the SetPatch command to fix any bugs in the operating system. The Quiet option stops any text from appearing on screen: this would cause the Shell to be displayed instead of the blank screen suddenly being replaced by the Workbench as it pops up.

[4] Use the Version command display the current Workbench and Kickstart release. However, the output is not printed on screen — it's sent to the dummy device NIL: So, why do it? Because the command also passes the version into special variables 'Kickstart' and 'Workbench'.

[5] This command sets aside some memory to act as a buffer for the internal floppy disk. This speeds up access. If you have a reasonable amount of RAM you might want to increase this number to 25. You can also add buffers to hard drives and other floppies if you wish: five are always added by default.

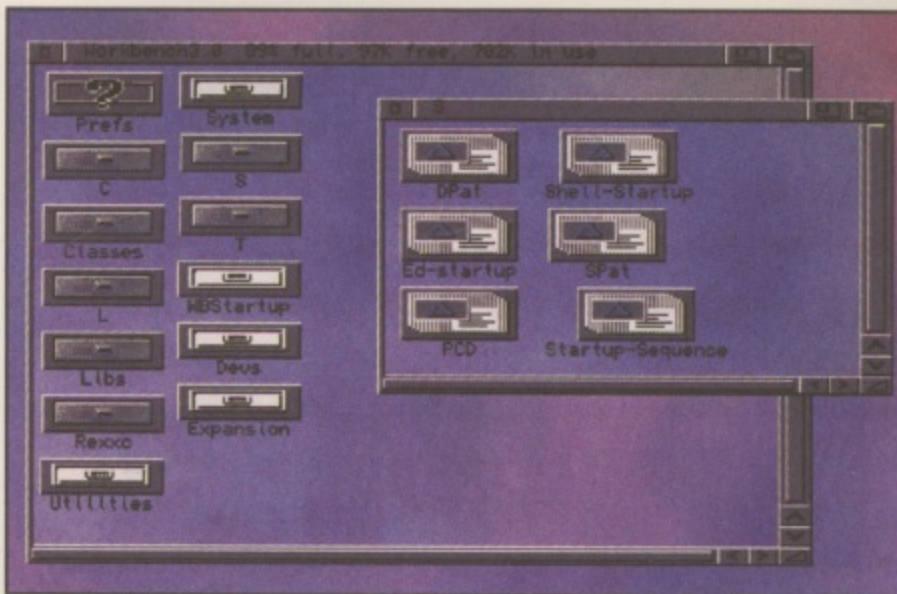
[6] This makes sure the script won't stop with an error if something bad happens. The error will be reported but the script will carry on to the end.

[8] Four directories are created in the RAM disk: T, Clipboards, ENV and Sys.

[9] The contents of the directory ENVARC (including any sub-directories) are copied from the boot disk to the ENV directory in the RAM disk. It's here that many programs store their preferences and so copying to

▲ Using the 'Show all' command you can view files that have no icon. Unfortunately for WB1.3 users this function is unavailable, it's only on WB2.0+, time to upgrade I think ...

RAM can speed them all up quite a lot. It also ensures that any changes made to them are temporary until the contents are also saved to ENVARC. The NOREQ keyword stops any requesters from appearing on screen.

[11] Makes the command Assign resident, which means it is copied into memory to speed things up a little. Notice the use of the keyword PURE to force the command to become resident.

[12] Makes the command Execute resident.

[14] to [26] Makes some important assigns, that is, creates a new device name (such as REXX:) which points to directory or device which already exists. It's a way of creating shortcuts.

[28] BindDrivers is hardly used, but when it is it causes any extra hardware to appear on the Amiga by instigating its driver software.

[29] This line mounts all the AmigaDOS devices present in the directory DEVS:DOSDrivers. This could include CrossDos devices, CD-ROM drives or specialist virtual devices such as PIPE:. Notice how all the files are mounted, except the icon files (which all end in .info) because of the use of -(#?.info) which means 'Not any file ending in .info'.

[31] to [39] These instructions process the list of monitors available by creating one large file (stored in T: and called M), executing it and then deleting it.

[41] Creates a variable in ENV: called Workbench, which contains the value in the variable called Workbench. This was defined way back in line [4].

[42] Creates the Kickstart variable, as above.

[43] Deletes the temporary variable Workbench. The variable in ENV: is still available though.

[44] Deletes the temporary variable Kickstart.

[46] Runs the IPrefs program, which sets the preferences in the Workbench (colours, fonts, background and so on)

[48] Starts the console clipboard manager program.

[50] This long line defines the various paths which AmigaDOS will use when looking for commands. When you open a Shell and enter a command, Amiga DOS will examine all these directories in this order until it finds the command.

[52] to [54] If there is a file called user-startup in the S: directory, execute it. This means that instead of adding commands to s:startup-sequence, you can add them instead to the file called user-startup.

[56] Remove the resident command Execute from memory.

[57] Remove the resident command Assign.

[59] Load the Workbench!

[60] Shut down the (invisible) Shell which has been executing this start-up sequence.

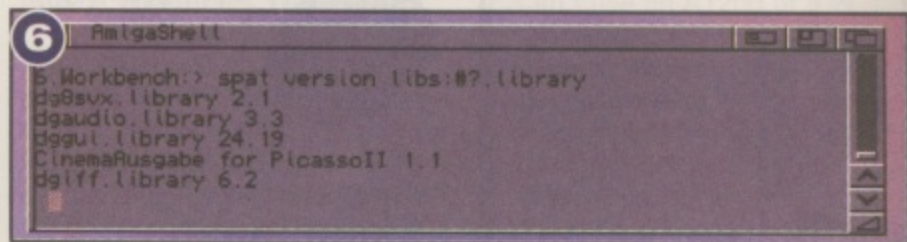
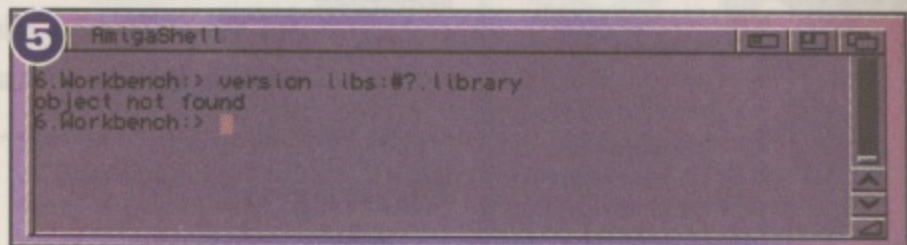
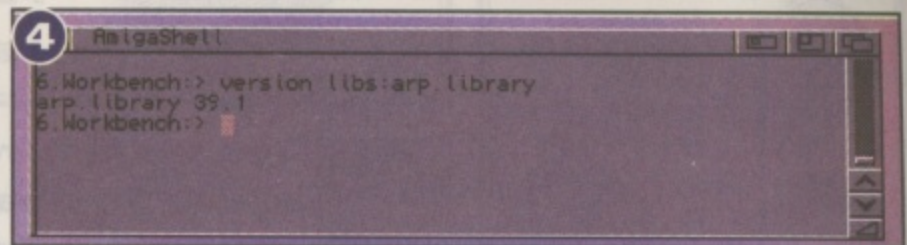
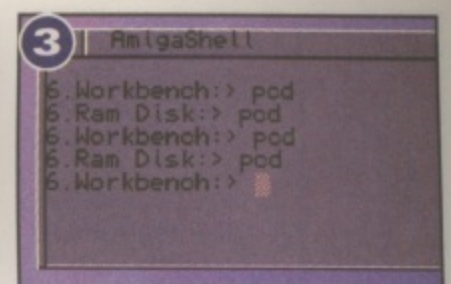
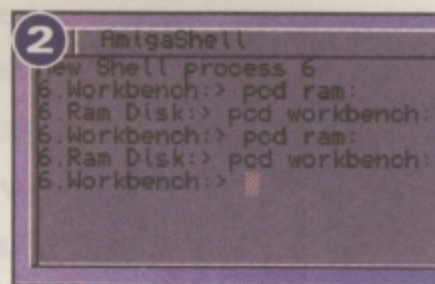
Shell-startup

Every time you open up a Shell window to enter some commands, this script is loaded and executed. The default script is pretty tame:

```
; $VER: Shell-Startup
40.1 (9.2.93)

Prompt "%N.%S> "
Alias Clear "Echo
***E[0;0H*E[J*" "
Alias XCopy "Copy CLONE "
```

You can see that it defines the prompt which each Shell will use and creates two more commands called Clear and XCopy. Clear will clear the window using a sequence of control codes. XCopy is useful for copying entire disks or directories in one go. If you would like to include your own



AmigaDOS commands, this is where you define them.

Ed-startup

As you may know, AmigaDOS comes with its own text editor called ED. ED is a lot smarter than many people realise. By editing this file, you can customise the menus which Ed uses. There isn't enough space to go into detail now, but take a look at the file and try creating your own designer ED program to impress your mates.

PCD

This is another script, but one designed to be used as a command. It's based on the AmigaDOS command 'CD' which is used to change the current directory. If you use the command in the same way as CD, you won't notice any difference for example: (see Figure 2)

However, when you enter PCD by itself, it returns to the last location you moved to, like this: (see Figure 3)

DPAT & SPAT

These are two more scripts which can be treated like commands. They are used when you want to perform the same command on multiple files, and although their use is limited (not least because many commands

already allow use on multiple files) they can occasionally be very useful.

SPAT is a 'Single file PATtern' program. It allows you to include wildcards in commands. Wildcards are special symbols which can represent multiple files:

#? Means "all files"
#?.info Means "all files ending in .info"
test.??? Means "all files starting in test. and ending with three letters, e.g. test.doc, test.iff and test.bak"

Here's an example. Let's say you wanted to examine the version number of a library in the LIBS: drawer, you could do it like this: (see Figure 4)

Now if you wanted to do it to all the file in the LIBS: drawer, you might try this. As you can see, it doesn't work. (see Figure 5)

That's where SPAT comes in. Use it instead and you'll achieve the original aim. (see Figure 6)

DPAT works in a similar way except that it allows you to enter two filenames.

1. Will an FPU in my A1200 RAM board make games such as Colonization run faster?
2. How can I stop my screen flickering on a Commodore 1084S when I play SimCity 2000?
3. Is there any way of preventing a picture becoming tiled in my Workbench background?
4. I am seriously thinking about buying a CD-ROM drive and an external hard drive. Can they both run simultaneously if connected via a Squirrel SCSI interface?

1. No, it won't.
2. Unless SimCity 2000 allows you to select a non-interlaced screen mode there is no way you can stop it flickering (unless you had a flicker fixer and a big box Amiga).
3. Pictures are tiled when they are smaller than the size of the Workbench screen, so make sure that your backdrop picture is at least as big as this.
4. Yes, you can use up to seven SCSI devices.

CD-ROM rage



I have a CD32-SXI and a hard drive, but when it boots it doesn't seem to recognise that there is a hard drive. It's not the power supply because I bought a Goliath to replace the original. Please help, because I don't have a lot of patience and I don't want to hurt it?

The first thing to check is the cabling. Is everything plugged in properly? Is the drive 'spinning up' as you turn on the power? If it's not, and it's showing no signs of life at all, then there's something up with its power feed, or the mechanism may have been fried.

MMU query



1. What exactly is the MMU (Memory Management Unit) used for and what software takes advantage of it?
2. I have seen internal PC IDE 4 speed CD-ROMs for £50. I have fitted one in a PC before and connected one to a sound card. Is it possible to do this with my A1200?

1. An MMU manages memory, as its name suggests. The most common use of an MMU is virtual memory, a system that uses hard drive space as if it was RAM. This is particularly useful for graphics applications especially if you're working with very large 24-bit images.
2. You bet! Check out our feature in CD-ROM Scene this month for all the details.

Imagine crash



I have recently come across a problem with Imagine 3.0. I have installed it on my hard drive when I try to render anything it crashes invalidating my drive. Please help?

Have you checked that you've installed the correct version? If you have no FPU then you need to install and run the Integer version. Attempting to render with FPU version will crash the machine.

Sprite errors?



My A1200 has problems with DBLPAL, MULTISCAN, or other high resolutions above PAL and NTSC. After about an hour horizontal flickering lines appear on my 1960 monitor. Someone told me it was 'sprite-errors'. What can I do about it?

Presuming these lines are analogue glitches (as opposed to pixels being written by the Amiga) then it sounds like your monitor is faulty. If it's the Amiga introducing the glitches, that may be the result of some tampering with the monitor drivers using the MonEd program.

Memory swop



1. I am thinking of buying an 030 accelerator board with 4Mb RAM. Could I use the 2Mb off my Hawk RAM board to give me a total of 8Mb?

2. What would be the best way to add a CD drive to my Amiga?
3. How can I use CrossDOS without it stripping the filenames down to eight characters?
4. When I try and compile some of my programs in AMOS I get the message 'Program not Tested'. I have run and tested these programs and they work fine, so

what exactly is the problem?
 5. Can I get the 'Say' command working on the A1200?
 6. Is it possible to set up keyboard short-cuts for Workbench?
 7. When I try to write to disks I get told the disk is write protected, even when the disk is write enabled.

1. If your new accelerator has two Simm slots and can accommodate both a 2Mb and 4Mb SIMM at once this will be possible. Shop around and check the specifications and features before you buy.
2. See our feature in this issue for various cost-effective options. The easiest way is to get a Squirrel CD-ROM kit.
3. You can't. It's based on the old PC DOS format which only allows eight characters for a filename and three for an extension.
4. Have you actually used the Test option? If so, you've stumped us there.
5. Yes. You need the narrator.device in DEVS:, the translator.library in LIBS: and the Say tool in C:. You can get these from Workbench 2 disks.
6. Yes, you can define the function keys so that they perform various tasks. The tool called FKey can be found on your Workbench in the Tools/Commodities drawer. It's very easy to use.
7. It sounds like a mechanical fault with the drive mechanism. It's also worth checking the cabling inside the case.

RAM raid



1. Are there any RAM boards on the market that accept 16Mb or larger SIMMs?
2. If not would the 50mhz Viper or Apollo accommodate 16Mb and which is better?
3. Are all FPUs compatible with all RAM and accelerator boards?
4. I would like to buy 64Mb of RAM. Is this too much?
5. Are there going to be any 300mhz upgrades for the A1200 in the near future?
6. If I bought a 2.5Gb internal hard drive, will I have to take the existing 170Mb drive out?
7. I installed SCALA MM300 but when I ran the program it came up with an error saying 'File SCALAMM.SYS not found'. Since scala say they cannot be contacted what should I do?

Simon Evans, Hook.

1. Yes. The Blizzard range can take

SIMMs as large as 128Mb. With an add-on you can use two at once to give 256Mb of Fast RAM and 2Mb of Chip RAM.

2. The Viper II boards can also take up to 128Mb SIMMs. Both work very well, although the Blizzard boards get our vote for superior build quality.
3. No. Check with the supplier of your board before buying an FPU. There are two main types of FPU: PLCC and PGA.
4. 64Mb of RAM sounds lovely! No, it's not too much if you have a use for it, and there are plenty of advantages of having loads of RAM.
5. It looks unlikely at the moment.
6. Yes, there's only room for one hard drive inside the A1200.
7. Try phoning Scala on 01920 444294. They should be able to help you out.

A new look



I have had my 1.3 A500 for about a year and I want to somehow upgrade it to a WB 2.04 and add 2Mb RAM, please help.

You can buy an operating system upgrade that consists of new Kickstart chips and Workbench disks. You don't see these upgrades advertised much these days but if you call around you should find someone selling it. If you can't, then it might be cheaper to buy a second hand A500 Plus (which comes with OS 2 as standard). You'll find plenty of adverts for A500 RAM upgrades in this issue.

Drive connect



My children have an A500+ with an A570 CD drive. Is there any way I can attach a hard drive to the port on the rear of the A570 unit? Also are there any Internet providers which have support for an ISDN modem? Are there any drivers for the Syquest EZ135 parallel port version available? Does the HP870cxi printer have a driver on the Amiga.

You should be able to connect a SCSI hard drive (or any other SCSI device) to the connector on the back of the A570, although there are some models of the A570 which actually use IDE connections instead. While there are Internet providers offering ISDN

links, to our knowledge there is currently no way of using an Amiga directly with ISDN. There's no driver and never will be for the parallel version of the EZI35 (or Zip), because the Amiga's parallel port is incompatible. Go for the SCSI version. You've stumped us on the printer driver question. Try some PD suppliers or shareware CD-ROMs.

Monitor match



I have just bought an A1200 for my son. Where could I purchase a manual for it? I also picked up two monitors in an auction, both are digital models, VR201-C and a VT-320. They have no leads or cables. Can I use them with the A1200? If so, what cables would I need to buy?

There's no-one selling Amiga manuals at the moment. Your best bet is to try to find some second hand, or give Bruce Smith Books a call on 01923 894 355. They don't publish official Amiga manuals but they do have a good range of their own Amiga reference and tutorial books. As for the monitors, it sounds as if they're probably PC monitors.

You may be able to get them working if you get an adaptor to link the monitor cable to your Amiga's RGB output. You will need a compatible PC monitor driver in Devs/monitors. If the monitors have a video input then you can use them without any of this messing around.

Apollo trouble



I have recently fitted an A600 with an Apollo 620 with 4Mb RAM. Once fitted the board seems to work fine, then after a few minutes any program being used crashes and the computer will not reboot, or even recognise any floppy inserted into DF0. I've tried disconnecting the external drives and printer to no

avail. What's going wrong?

It could be that the 620 card is not fitted tightly enough in the A600. It needs to sit firmly on top of the CPU, which can be a bit of a problem. Try calling Wizard Developments on 01322 527800.

Interfacing



1. I am thinking about buying a MIDI interface to use with my Yamaha keyboard which has two MIDI ports on the back (in and out). Will this enable me to use the Yamaha keyboard instead of the Amiga keyboard? Which MIDI interface would you advise me to get?
 2. Can I use an A1200 or a PC keyboard with my A600?
 3. I'm still puzzled about the World Wide Web. Do I need to just have a program to access it or do you need to have an Internet site such as Demon. If you just need a program which is an ideal one to use?

Jonathan Archer, Blackburn.

1. You will be able to use your Yamaha keyboard to record music notes into a MIDI sequencer, which will then be able to replay the music from the Yamaha unit.
2. No you can't.
3. To access the World Wide Web you need a modem, which will allow you to link up to an Internet Service Provider (not an Internet site as you suggest) such as Demon or Internet FCI. These companies link you to the Internet. You will also need TCP/IP software which handles the low level communications between your Amiga and the Internet (Miami is definitely the best one to go for, see the review in the October issue of CU Amiga Magazine for more details). Finally you will need a Web browser, such as IBrowse or AWeb. Both of these were reviewed in the November issue of CU Amiga Magazine. ■

Grabbers for Pete's Sake

I'm constantly having to explain to PC and Macintosh users why I use an Amiga. It can't have escaped the attention of many Amiga users that a good deal of their compatriots have deserted to other platforms. I'm not

going to labour over any hard feelings for the lack of official Amiga development but I can back up why I continue to use the Amiga.

I have a PC myself and it's been a learning experience to discover its strengths and weaknesses. It's important that we do not kid ourselves about the PC platform even if it may be depressing at times. It's not a one sided argument though, I can hold my own quite well explaining to a PC user why I use an Amiga, based on facts and experience, and certainly a demonstration!

Without a blow by blow technical comparison between platforms, it's enough to say that the PC is a good machine for running big applications. It's also got oodles of 3D games and you can mix and match powerful inexpensive hardware (which it needs to do anything). These areas the Amiga is weaker in for a variety of reasons. Those who have departed the Amiga platform usually count those aspects as being important and didn't invest in additional Amiga hardware.

The flip side of the coin is surprisingly a software issue. If I need a program to do virtually anything, it can be found in some form on the Aminet, free and usable. It will fit into my system nicely and the most I'll have to

pay is a shareware fee if it's indispensable. Not so on the PC. Not only is there far less PD/shareware, it's harder to find, totally non-standard, more likely to have been crippled and more expensive to register (which is almost always obligatory).

In short, it's a pain. I once had to download five screen grabbers (actually Windows does the job but I needed a program to save out) before I found one that didn't obscure the pictures with a load of 'Unregistered' text all over them. A screen grabber for Pete's sake!

Being a bit of a techie type, I love to have dozens of small programs and a few big packages running on my Amiga on different screens, happily multitasking away. This is not the sort of thing the PC is good at. For that reason, I use both and can appreciate what they do well, though the Amiga is firmly my favourite.

Depending on your own needs, it may well be worth investing in Amiga hardware on the basis of the Amiga's superb PD and shareware catalogue. For instance, why not compare what you get on CU Amiga's cover CDs to the contents of those on PC Magazines. It's a good example of the Amiga's massive shareware software base that the PC just can't touch. ■

Giving the Game Away

Recent stories in the trade press about magazine cover disks are worrying. The general consensus amongst software houses appears to be that cover mounting demos of their latest releases is harming potential sales.

When I spoke to Ian Jenkins of Effigy Software recently, he admitted to similar fears saying that he felt a general a rule of thumb was that if someone gets a cover disk version of a new game from a magazine they feel they don't need to buy the full version as they have enough of the game on the demo. And can boast to all their mates that they have it already without actually buying it.

I disagree. Surely from the software publishers' point of view, the idea of cover disks is to create as much interest as possible in any forthcoming game? It's much like running a trailer for a new movie at the cinema. If gamers are satisfied with just

one or two levels of a game then that would be the standard size of all commercial games. Clearly it is not. While we do our best to make sure our cover disk game demos give you as much entertainment as possible, no-one expects them to take the place of the full version. How do games companies expect to create any awareness of their game apart from adverts and perhaps a news story or a preview a few months before the game is released?

Where will it all end? Will we have software publishers ringing us up now telling us not to print anything about their latest release in case it might harm sales? I think not. Because any sort of publicity is good publicity. If software houses are seriously worried about cover disk demos affecting their sales than they should release a shorter version of the game or a timed out demo. Not decide to scrap cover disk demos altogether. ■

I Have a Dream ...

I was talking to someone a few days ago about the future of the Amiga – basically whether it had one or not. It's a topic we've all discussed before, often with people who don't know much about the Amiga and the whole philosophy behind the Amiga scene. What was notable about this one, was that the other party was supposedly well up on the personal computer industry and markets, with a substantial business interest in the Amiga market, but was convinced that not only would there never be another Amiga, but there was not even a demand for such a machine. Apparently this was a belief shared by their colleagues too.

The basic theory for such an opinion went a bit like this. IBM PC clones have now achieved global domination in the home and office. With such high 'market penetration' it would be impossible for another platform to take over. Therefore, PC=computer, computer=PC, end of story.

The suggestion that there might be room for an alternative computer platform, even if it sold in smaller numbers than the PC, was brushed aside as pure commercial naivety.

Unfortunately this is a commonly held belief among almost everyone outside of the Amiga scene, or at least among the people that matter, those at the top of the major computer manufacturing companies who decide what goes into development and what rolls off the production line. Of course there is room for a next generation Amiga, whether it bears the Amiga name or just takes the idea on to the next stage. A new Amiga, and I mean a brand new one, not an upgraded A4000, has the opportunity to start from scratch, to totally redefine the way personal computers work, to put in place new standards and practices for the next millennium.

Imagine that: a completely new breed of personal computer that is not tied to any of the limiting computing conventions that hamper the current machines. Do you remember how revolutionary the graphic user interface was when it first appeared? Or what about the first time you saw an Amiga running a bunch of programs all at the same time? These were some of the innovations of the 80s that have changed the way we work with computers for ever.

Don't expect similar innovations to be led by the PC scene. So long as they are locked into their on-going development based on ancient technology, held to ransom by a single software developer demanding huge amounts of money for the most inefficient operating system, there is never going to be any radical progress.

No, the only way we are going to see a true next generation computer platform is if someone manages to bring out a machine that goes right back to the drawing board to completely rethink every aspect of the personal computer, from its architecture to its operating system to its software.

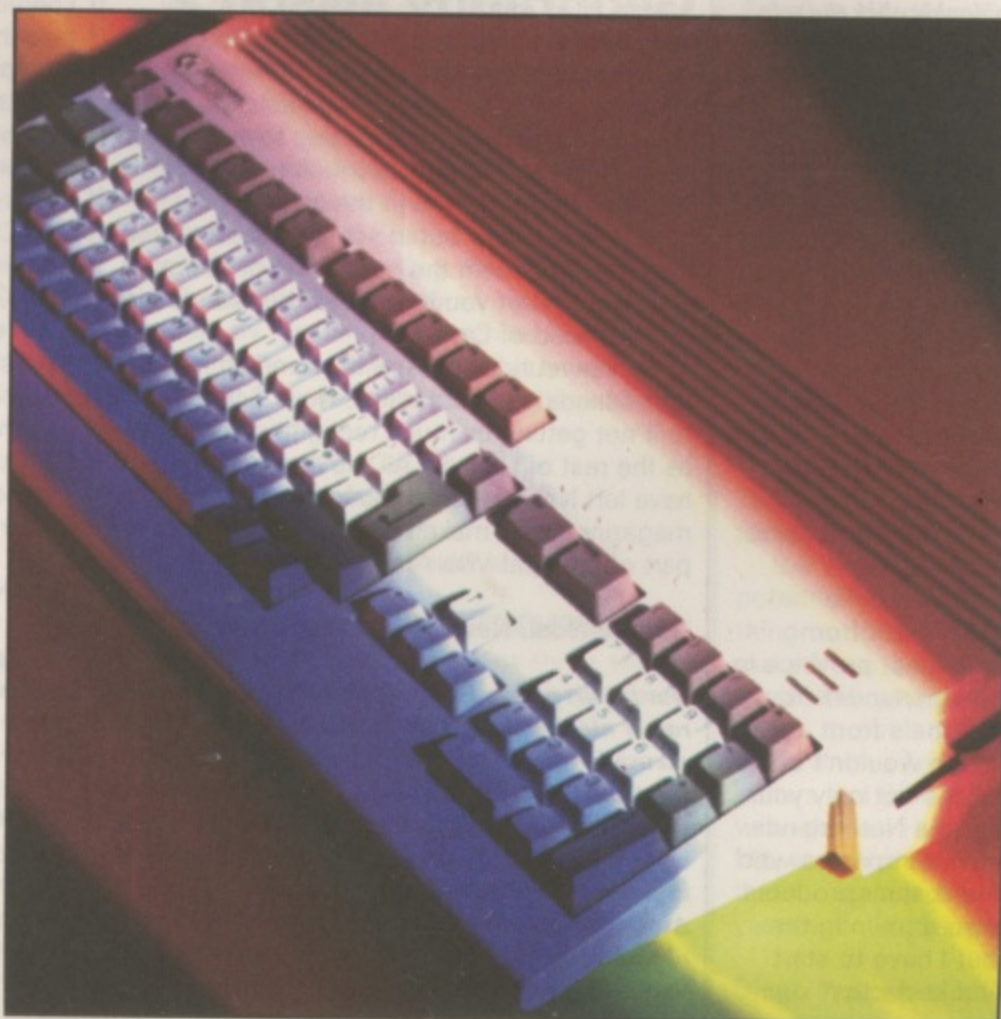
As long as there are computer enthusiasts who think for themselves, question the hype from the monopolies and know what they want to do with their machines, there will always be room for a computer like the Amiga.

Here's the big question though: is there a company with enough vision, passion, drive and (most importantly)

the finances and marketing clout to make a commercial success of such a ground-breaking machine? At the moment, the gulf between those companies with the cash and those with the vision is vast. It's all very well a small company developing a revolutionary new platform, but if they can't manufacture it at a realistic price and tell the world about it, it's never going to get very far. What's required is some kind of joint venture between a powerful international player in the computer industry, and one of these smaller developers. The crunch point is whether anyone can combine business sense, finance, a rock solid vision and a deep understanding of how to design a new kind of people's computer. It's a very tall order, one that so far has not been met by any one company.

But whether or not it bears the Amiga name in the end, I firmly believe there will be a next generation personal computer that re-writes the rulebook, blows us all away as the Amiga did when it first appeared and steals another 10 year march on the competition. Just you wait and see. ■

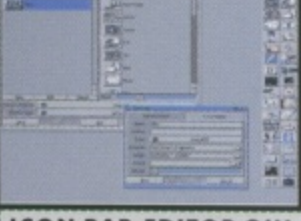
